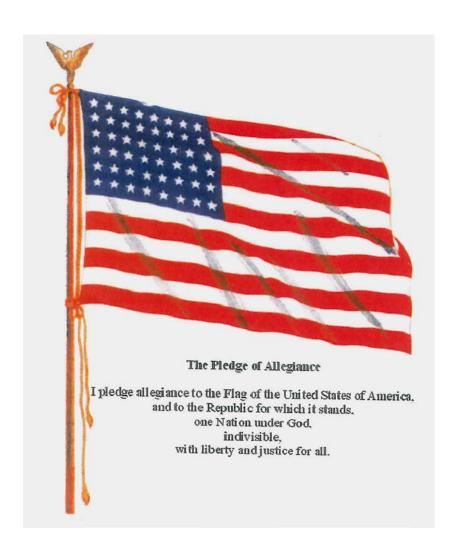

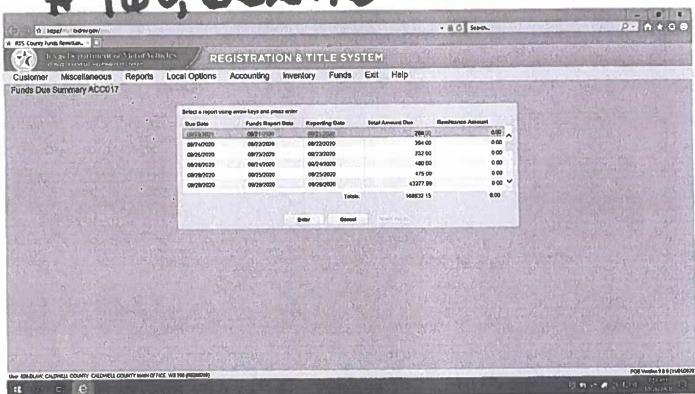

The Auditor's office conducted an audit on the Caldwell County Sheriff's Office Chapter 59 Asset Forfeiture account. This written review coincides with filing of the 2020 Chapter 59 Asset Forfeiture Report by Law Enforcement Agency to the Attorney General of Texas

Bank statements were reconciled for October 01, 2019 to September 30, 2020 on the Caldwell County Sheriff Forfeiture Account without exception.

The Caldwell County Sheriff Forfeiture Account's beginning balance was \$36,170.01 as of October 1, 2019. After the final judgements on one case, the District Attorney's Office paid 70% of the seized amount to the Sheriff's Office totaling \$34,102.60. With the addition of interest earned \$477.16, proceeds received from sale of property 18-O-50-Corpus-1998 Mercedes \$104.00, to be disbursed 70% to Sheriff's Office and 30% to Caldwell County District Attorney's Office, and total expenditures \$55.00 the final balance came to \$70,798.77.

The expenditures from the Caldwell County Sheriff Office were in compliance with Article 59 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. Except for Article 59.06(d), whereas the Law Enforcement agency should present Caldwell County Commissioner's Court a budget with detailed and clearly list of define categories of expenditures prior to forfeiture money being spend. Before each fiscal year, the Caldwell County Sheriff Office should submit such budget to the Commissioner's Court.

We wish to thank the Caldwell County Sheriff's Office for their input and help with this audit.

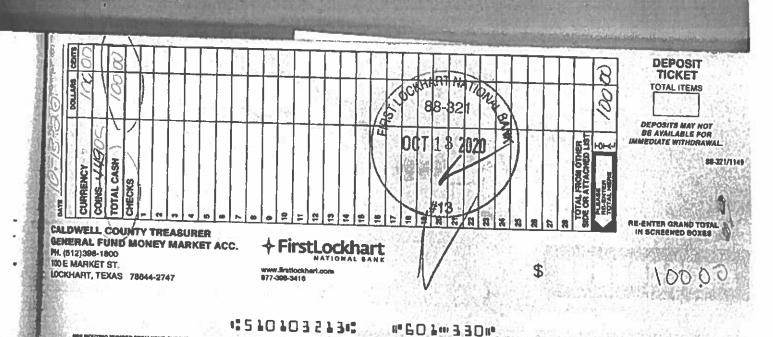

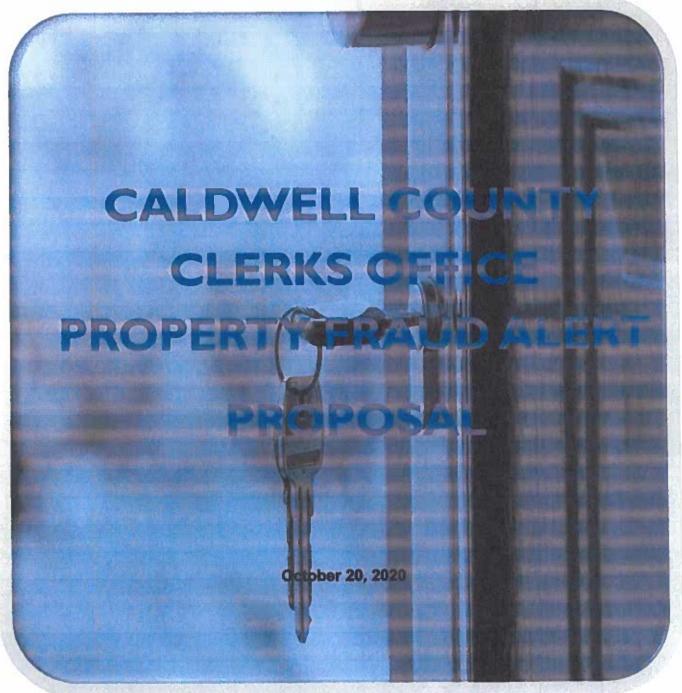

## I. WHAT IS PROPERTY FRAUD ALERT?

DPS is proud to be the only firm in Texas offering Property Fraud Alert (PFA). PFA is a hands-free program for counties that provides alerts to your citizens when documents are recorded at your office. Citizens can sign up via a county-branded website or via phone to have their information monitored. All public interaction and support are provided by DPS and the program is free to all of your constituents.

Property Fraud Alert is an internet-based system that automatically alerts your constituents via email or phone, each time there is recording activity on a property owned by them. Upon notification, your constituents can then verify that this activity was initiated by them and not by someone attempting to commit property fraud.

## Threats and Vulnerabilities

**Serious Public Threat for Property Theft:** By default, the public recording system is not designed to protect property owners, so *Property Fraud Alert* can help fill the void, creating a valuable resource protecting your officials, employees, and citizens.

**Unaware of Falsely Filed Liens:** From disgruntled contractors to unforgiving ex-spouses and sovereign citizens, the instance of false liens is on the rise. Subscribers will have access to sign up for this service via telephone or through the PFA (www.propertyfraudalert.com) web site.

## **Property Fraud Alert Service Terms and Conditions**

The County agrees to participate in the PFA Service by providing the index data required and permitting the use of this information in order to monitor and identify (via the PFA Service) individuals' identity only for the purposes of possible fraudulent activity. The County understands that PFA is a service provided by DPS in order to offer individual identity alerts to all participating users. The County will post index data via a data format mutually agreed upon by DPS and the County to a SFTP site, at interval timings under full discretion of the County. The data once received by the SFTP site will then be processed by the PFA system service which is running on a secured system server behind firewall technology. DPS reserves the right to make changes to the PFA service as deemed necessary.

DPS agrees NOT to retain subscriber's information beyond time period needed to perform PFA services.

DPS agrees that it may NOT use or share County's data in any way other than the method outlined above for the PFA service, without the express written consent of the County. DPS agrees to provide needed hardware, technology, and software in order to perform needed search and notification to subscribers.

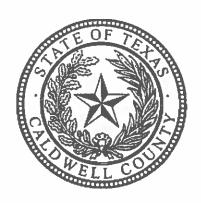

# CALDWELL COUNTY, TEXAS DECLARATION OF LOCAL DISASTER PROHIBITION OF OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, Section §418.108 of the Local Government Code provides that the County Judge can declare a slate of Local Disaster within the county) and order, may prohibit outdoor burning in the unincorporated area of the county when he finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning and,

WHEREAS. the County Judge does find that circumstances present in all of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that could be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

**BE IT THEREFORE ORDERED,** that the following emergency regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Caldwell County, Texas that are not subject to public ownership or stewardship for the duration of the above mentioned declaration:

#### I. Action Prohibited:

- (a) A person violates this order if he/she burns an) combustible materials outside of an enclosure, which serves to contain all flame and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others.
- (b) A person violates this order if he she engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, unless done in an enclosure designed to protect the spread of fire, or orders such activities by others.

#### 2.. Enforcement:

- (a) Upon notification of suspected outdoor burning the tire department assigned shall respond to the scene and take immediate measures to contain or extinguish the fire.
- (b) If requested by a fire official, a duly commissioned peace officer, when available, shall be notified and sent to the scene to investigate the nature of the fire.
- (c) If, in the opinion of the officer investigating and the fire official, the goal of this order can be obtained by informing the responsible party about the prohibitions established by this order the officer may at his discretion notify the party about the provisions of this order and request compliance with it, or issue a citation for: Violation of Bum Ban Order.

**Therefore it** is in accordance with Local Government Code 352.08 I, a violation of this order is a class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

- 3. This Order does not prohibit prescribed fire(s) conducted in compliance with guidelines set forth by federal or state natural resource agencies and conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048 Natural Resources Code, and meets the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code, burned under a burn plan approved by such agencies, or outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for:
  - (a) Firefighter training
  - (b) Public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations
  - (c) Planting or harvesting of agricultural crops

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that an exemption be hereby granted for a bona fide commercial land clearing business, allowing said business to burn as long as all other provisions of the Order and applicable laws and ordinances are adhered to as set forth herein, and contact is made and the burning approved by the Caldwell County Emergency Management Coordinator at 1403 Blackjack St. Lockhart, TX at phone Number 512-398-1822, and receiving permission, prior to any outdoor burning.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that an exemption be hereby granted to those businesses where welding is an essential function of the business, allowing welding operations to proceed as long as the area of welding operations has been cleared of vegetation for a distance of no less than ten (10) feet in all directions, that there be a second capable person acting as a fire spotter with a sufficient water source available to extinguish fires which may be ignited from stray sparks, and only when all other provisions of the Order and applicable laws and ordinances are adhered to as set forth herein.

**BE IT ALSO ORDERED,** that the purpose of this order is the mitigation of the hazard posed by wildfire during the term of the dry, weather by curtailing outdoor burning; which purpose is to be taken into account in any enforcement action based upon this order.

This order will remain in effect for a period of 14 days, and shall expire at the end of said period.

### **RESOLUTION 02-2021**

## RESOLUTION OF CALDWELL COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT CONTINUING AND EXTENDING LOCAL STATE OF DISASTER

**WHEREAS**, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, issued a disaster proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying that the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) poses an imminent threat of disaster for all counties in the State of Texas; and

**WHEREAS**, on March 16, 2020, Caldwell County Judge Hoppy Haden issued a proclamation declaring a local state of disaster for Caldwell County; and

**WHEREAS**, in each subsequent month, Governor Abbott has issue proclamations renewing the disaster declaration for all Texas counties; and

**WHEREAS**, by duly passed Resolutions, the Caldwell County Commissioners Court has extended and renewed the local state of disaster until November 10, 2020; and

**WHEREAS,** on July 2, 2020 Governor Abbott issued Executive Order GA-29, relating to the use of face coverings during the COVID-19 disaster; and

**WHEREAS,** on October 7, 2020 Governor Abbott issued Executive Order GA-32, relating to the continued response to the COVID-19 disaster as Texas reopens; and

**WHEREAS**, the conditions necessitating a declaration of a local state of disaster continue to exist in Caldwell County, Texas in relation to the substantial risk to the health and safety of the Caldwell County residents; and

## NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CALDWELL COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT THAT:

- 1. The facts and recitations set forth in the preamble of this Resolution are hereby found to be true and correct.
- 2. The Order declaring a state of disaster within Caldwell County based on the threat of COVID-19 is hereby extended until modified, rescinded or otherwise superseded.
- 3. All people in Caldwell County are strongly encouraged to use good-faith efforts to follow the mandates in GA-29 or its successor and the minimum standard health protocols recommended by DSHS, including:
  - a. Minimizing in-person contact with others not in their household and maintaining 6 feet of separation from such individuals;
  - b. Wearing a face covering over the nose and mouth when inside a commercial entity or other building or open space open to the public and where 6 feet of separation is not feasible:
  - c. Avoiding groups larger than 10 individuals;

- d. Washing or sanitizing hands frequently.
- 4. All outdoor gatherings in excess of 10 people, other than those set forth and specifically permitted in GA-32 or its successor, are prohibited in the unincorporated areas of Caldwell County unless approved by the County Judge.
- 5. This resolution continues the activation of appropriate orders, response, recovery, and rehabilitation aspects of all applicable local or interjurisdictional emergency management plans and continues the authorization of furnishing aid and assistance under the declaration for the duration of the state of disaster.
- 6. This Resolution is effective immediately from and after its adoption.

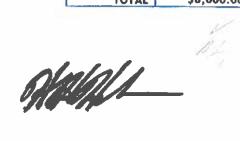

## SYSTEM DESCRIPTION

## 1.1 TOWER DESIGN OVERVIEW

Motorola is pleased to provide a proposal to Caldwell County for a new 300 foot self support tower which be installed next to the shelter that has already been purchased. The proposed tower will be installed at 29°45'32.7"N 97°46'34.6"W and has been designed to mount required LMR antenna and microwave dishes as well as additional LMR antennas and dishes for the future. ## 2.1.1 New Tower Site Development at Fentress, Texas

## 2.1.1.1 Site Scope Summary

- Engineering services for site drawings and regulatory approvals for New Tower Included
- Zoning Services for New Tower Included
- New fenced compound up to 60-foot x 60-foot
- Clearing type Light.
- Road length requiring improvement up to 75 feet
- New tower to be used for antennas 300-foot self-support tower
- New tower foundation size per tower foundation design Drilled Pier
- Reference Site Exhibit and Tower Design

#### Motorola Responsibilities:

#### Site Zonina

 Coordinate zoning and permitting of the new tower site such that it is in full compliance with applicable jurisdictional requirements.

#### Site Engineering for New Tower Site

- Prepare site construction drawings showing the layout of various new and existing site components.
- Conduct site walks to collect pertinent information from the sites (e.g., location of Telco, power, existing facilities, etc.).
- Perform a boundary and topographic survey for the property on which the communication site is located or will be located.
- Prepare a lease exhibit and sketch of the site to communicate to the property owner the proposed lease space and planned development at the particular site location.
- Prepare zoning drawings that can be used to describe the proposed site installation in sufficient detail.
- Prepare record drawings of the site showing the as-built information.
- Perform construction staking around the site to establish reference points for proposed construction.
- Perform NEPA Threshold Screening, including limited literature and records search and brief reporting, as necessary to identify sensitive natural and cultural features referenced in 47 CFR Chapter 1, subsection 1.1307 that may potentially be impacted by the proposed construction activity. This does not include the additional field investigations to document site conditions if it is determined that the proposed communication facility "may have a significant environmental impact" and thus require additional documentation, submittals, or work. Regional Environmental Review (RER) report

submittals if required by FEMA have not been included. Perform Cultural Resource study as needed to identify sensitive historical and archaeological monuments that might be impacted by proposed construction. Does not include tribal consultation fees (if required).

- Conduct construction inspection of foundation steel prior to pour, materials testing of concrete and field density tests of backfill to ensure quality construction.
- Check tower erection for plumbness, linearity and alignment after installation.
- Perform inspection of the site and the work performed by the Contractor to document that the site is built in accordance with the "Site Plans" and document any deviations or violations.
- Prepare, submit, and track application for local permit fees (zoning, electrical, building etc.), prepare FAA filings and procure information necessary for filing.

#### Site Preparation

- Obtain the permits such as electrical, building, and construction permits, and coordinate
  any inspections with local authorities that may be needed to complete site development
  work.
- Provide one-time mobilization costs for the construction crews. Any remobilization due to interruptions/delays that are out of Motorola's control will result in additional costs.
- Perform light clearing of brush, grubbing and disposal of vegetation and shrub growth in the site compound area and a 20-foot path around it (13,225 square feet).
- Clear light brush, grub roots, and dispose vegetation and shrub growth in a 15-foot wide access road to the site (not to exceed 75 feet in length).
- Grade the site compound and 10-foot path around it to provide a level, solid, undisturbed surface for installation of site components (not to exceed 5,600 square feet).
- Supply and install gravel surfacing to a depth of 6 inches, including herbicide treatment and geotextile fabric installation within the fenced in site compound area, and a 3-foot path around it (not to exceed 3,844 square feet).
- Provide a 12-foot wide access road (not to exceed 75 feet in length) including surface grading and graveling
- Provide silt fence around the compound to control soil erosion (not to exceed 300 linear feet).
- Supply and install 8-foot high chain-link fencing with a ten-foot wide gate around the shelter compound (not to exceed 240 linear feet).
- Perform site touch up (fertilize, seed and straw) disturbed areas not covered with gravel
  after completion of construction work. Landscaping, decorative fencing or any other
  aesthetic improvement that may be required by local jurisdictions has not been included
  and will be handled through a negotiated contract change notice.

#### Site Components Installation

- Supply and install a perimeter grounding system around the compound and shelter. The
  ground system is to tie to the fence and all new metal structures within the compound to
  meet current Motorola's R56 standards.
- Conduct 1 three-point ground resistance test of the site. Should any improvements to grounding system be necessary after ground testing, the cost of such improvements shall be the responsibility of County.
- Supply and install 1 freestanding 24-inch-wide cable/ice bridge from the tower to the shelter (up to 30 linear feet).



#### **Tower Work**

- Construct drilled pier type tower foundations including excavation, rebar, and concrete (per tower foundation design attached)
- Supply and install 300'-foot self-support tower with tower lighting. Reference attached tower manufacture drawings.
- Provide PE stamped Tower and Foundation design.
- Supply and install grounding for the tower-base for self-support towers

#### **Caldwell County Responsibilities:**

- Remove existing abandon shelters/foundations on site to allow for tower compound.
- If required, prepare, and submit Electromagnetic Energy (EME) plans for the site (as a licensee) to demonstrate compliance with FCC RF Exposure guidelines.
- As applicable, coordinate, prepare, submit, and pay for all required permits and inspections for the work that is the Caldwell County's responsibility.
- Pay for all utility connection, pole or line extensions, and any easement or usage fees.
- Pay for Tribal consultation fees related to NEPA (if required).
- Review and approve site design drawings within 7 calendar days of submission by Motorola or its subcontractor(s). Should a re-submission be required, the Caldwell County shall review and approve the re-submitted plans within 7 calendar days from the date of submittal.
- Pay for the usage costs of power, leased lines and generator fuelling both during the construction/installation effort and on an on-going basis.
- Pay for application fees, taxes, and recurring payments for tease/ownership of the property.
- Provide personnel to observe construction progress and testing of site equipment according to the schedule provided by Motorola.
- Provide property deed or lease agreement, and boundary survey, along with existing asbuilt drawings of the site and site components to Motorola for conducting site engineering.
- Provide a right of entry letter from the site owner for Motorola to conduct field investigations.
- Secure power connection to the site, associated permitting and installation of a meter and disconnect within 50 feet of the proposed shelter location.
- Provide additional temporary space for staging of the construction equipment during the construction of new site facilities (tower, shelter, generator, fuel tank etc.).

## Assumptions:

- The SOW described above will be performed at the same time as the SOW for the shelter and A&L installation is performed.
- No certified payroil, mandatory union workers or mandatory minority workers are required for this work
- All work is assumed to be done during normal business hours as dictated by time zone (Monday thru Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.).
- All recurring and non-recurring utility costs [including, but not limited to, generator fuel (except first fill), electrical, Telco] will be borne by the Caldwell County or site owner.
- All utility installations shall be coordinated and paid for by the site owner and located at jointly agreed to location within or around the new communications shelter or equipment room.

- Site will have adequate electrical service for the new shelter and tower. Utility transformer, transformer upgrades, line, or pole extensions have not been included.
- Pricing has been based on National codes such IBC or BOCA. Local codes or jurisdictional requirements have not been considered in this proposal.
- Hazardous materials are not present at the work location. Testing and removal of hazardous materials found during site investigations, construction or equipment installation will be the responsibility of the Caldwell County.
- A maximum of 30 days will be required for obtaining approved building permits from time
  of submission, and a maximum of 60 days will be required for zoning approvals from
  time of submittal.
- No improvements are required for concrete trucks, drill rigs, shelter delivery, and crane access.
- If extremely harsh or difficult weather conditions delay the site work for more than a
  week, Motorola will seek excusable delays rather than risk job site safety.
- In the absence of geotechnical test data at the sites, normal soil conditions have been assumed. Normal soil is defined as per TIA/EIA 222, guidelines.
- For zoning approvals, a maximum of 60 days will be required from time of submittal with attendance at maximum of two (2) required planning meetings.
- The new tower location will pass the FAA hazard study, zoning, FCC, and environmental permitting.
- The restoration of the site surroundings by fertilizing, seeding and strawing the disturbed areas will be adequate.
- Tower and foundation sizing is based on the tower loading requirements as a result of the RF Antenna System design and the Microwave Antenna System design (i.e. - dish sizes and locations obtained from paper path studies). If after physical path studies, the dish sizes and locations change, then Motorola will then review the impact to tower structure and foundations and revise applicable costs.
- Typical FCC NEPA will be sufficient. Full EA is not included.
- If due to NEPA studies, any jurisdictional authority should determine that a proposed communications facility "may have a significant environmental impact", the environmental impact studies or field testing and evaluation related to such determination have not been included.
- FAA obstruction lighting has been included. (Painting of any new towers has not been included.)
- Title Research is not included unless specifically stated.
- The proposed location is properly platted and/or exempte for future site development.
- A waiver to zoning requirements like setbacks, tower height limitations, etc. can be obtained.
- The soil resistivity at the site is sufficient to achieve resistance of ten (10) ohms or less with a standard ground rod installation. Communications site grounding will be designed and installed per Motorola's Standards and Guidelines for Communications Sites (R56).
- Underground utilities are not present in the construction area, and as such no relocation will be required. Includes septic systems and irrigation systems.
- Spoils from the tower foundations can be dispersed on the property and will not be required to be transported to a dump location.
- Foundations for the shelter, generator and fuel tank are based "normal soil" conditions as defined by TIA/EIA 222. Footings deeper than 30 inches, raised piers, rock coring, dewatering, or hazardous material removal have not been included.
- There is sufficient space on primus to stage tower for erection.



# 2.2 COMPLETION CRITERIA

- Site development completed per issued for construction (IFC) construction drawings, project requirements, contractual obligations (including any Caldwell County/Motorola approved changes) and approved by County.
  - This shall be confirmed by contractor and reviewed with Motorola construction manager and project manager before inspections occur.
- All jurisdictional and contractual required testing and inspections to be performed by the
  contractor. (Contractual testing and inspections defined and agreed to with project team
  and Caldwell County prior to project kick off; vendor solely responsible for conducting,
  coordinating, and paying for all jurisdictional testing and inspections).
- Motorola site development checklist shall be completed and signed off by contractor prior to Caldwell County inspection. (Review with project team and Caldwell County and amend checklist as required at project kick off or before work begins).
- Site turn-over package completed and turned over to Motorola (As defined and agreed to with project team and Caldwell County).
- All punch list and deficiencies shall be completed prior to Caldwell County and Motorola inspections.

# INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT by and between CALDWELL COUNTY and TEXAS A&M AGRILIFE EXTENSION SERVICE

This Interlocal Agreement (hereafter termed "Agreement") is made pursuant to Chapter 791, Texas Government Code, *Interlocal Cooperation Contract*, and is entered into by and between the **Caldwell County** (hereafter referred to as "COUNTY"), a county within the State of Texas and **Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service** (hereafter referred to as "AGRILIFE EXTENSION"), a member of The Texas A&M University System, an agency of the State of Texas. COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION may be referred to herein individually as "Party" or collectively as the "Parties".

# SECTION 1 PURPOSE

- 1.01 In accordance with H.B. No. 1, 86th Regular Legislative Session, 2019, (General Appropriations Act for the 2020-21 Biennium) Article III, page 241, rider 7, funds were appropriated to AGRILIFE EXTENSION for the Feral Hog Abatement Program (the "Program") to implement feral hog abatement technologies. As part of the Program, AGRILIFE EXTENSION shall use a portion of the appropriated funds to fund grants for county feral hog eradication projects in Texas.
- 1.02 AGRILIFE EXTENSION requested grant applications in support of the Program from Texas counties setting forth the County's proposed feral hog abatement eradication project (the "Project"). COUNTY has proposed to complete the Project as set out in the COUNTY's Application including a Description of Activities (collectively "Application") attached hereto as Attachment A and fully incorporated herein by reference.
- 1.03 AGRILIFE EXTENSION desires to have COUNTY complete the Project to accomplish the goals of responding and complying with the Program. Accordingly, AGRILIFE EXTENSION and COUNTY enter into this Agreement as follows:

# SECTION 2 TERM

- **2.01** Fixed Term: This Agreement commences on October 1, 2020 and will terminate on August 31, 2021, unless cancelled according to section 2.02 of this Agreement.
- 2.02 Cancellation: This Agreement may be cancelled prior to the expiration of the Fixed Term or any Extension Term by either Party, upon thirty (30) calendar days written notice to the other Party, sent to the address indicated in Section 5.01 of this Agreement.

# SECTION 3 COUNTY OBLIGATIONS

- **3.01** *Performance*: COUNTY shall implement the feral hog abatement technologies as set out in the Application.
- 3.02 Subcontractors: Any delegation by the COUNTY to a subcontractor regarding any duties and responsibilities imposed by this Agreement must be approved in advance by AGRILIFE EXTENSION and shall not relieve the COUNTY of its responsibilities to AGRILIFE EXTENSION for its performance.
- **3.03** Progress Reports: COUNTY shall submit to AGRILIFE EXTENSION quarterly progress reports reflecting progress of work completed on the Project as well as financial progress.
- 3.04 Records: COUNTY must keep a separate bookkeeping account with a complete record of all expenditures relating to the Project. Project records shall be maintained by COUNTY for seven (7) years after the completion of the Project, or as otherwise agreed upon with AGRILIFE EXTENSION. AGRILIFE EXTENSION and the Texas State Auditor's Office ("State Auditor") reserve the right to examine all books, documents, records, and accounts relating to the Project at any time throughout the duration of the Agreement and for three years immediately following completion of the Project. If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit or other action is initiated prior to the expiration of the retention period, then the records must be retained until authorized by AGRILIFE EXTENSION. AGRILIFE EXTENSION and the State Auditor shall have access to the physical locations related to Project activities.
- 3.05 Audit: If the COUNTY has a financial audit performed during the time the COUNTY is receiving funds from AGRILIFE EXTENSION for the Project, upon request, AGRILIFE EXTENSION shall have access to information about the audit, including the audit transmittal letter, management letter, and any schedules in which the COUNTY's funds are included.
- 3.06 Compliance: At all times during the term of this Agreement, COUNTY must comply with Texas Government Code, Chapter 783, Uniform Grant and Contract Management, and the Uniform Grant Management Standards (UGMS) and 2 CFR Part 200.

# SECTION 4 COMPENSATION

4.01 Fee: This is a cost reimbursable Agreement. AGRILIFE EXTENSION agrees to pay COUNTY up to \$20,000 for performance of the Project. Payment shall be cost reimbursable based on actual costs incurred by COUNTY in accordance with the

- Application but will not exceed \$20,000 total. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) days after receipt of invoice in accordance with Chapter 2251, *Texas Government Code*.
- 4.02 Invoices: COUNTY may submit cost reimbursable invoices to AGRILIFE EXTENSION quarterly, but in no event shall invoice be submitted any later than August 31, 2021. The invoice(s) must include sufficient detail and relevant supporting documentation. Backup detail may include, but is not limited to, documentation of personnel expenses, or copies of invoices. The combined amount of the invoices submitted by COUNTY may not exceed \$20,000. All invoices shall be submitted to the following address:

- **4.03** Payment Schedule: Up to 90% of the total grant award may be reimbursed provided the work for which payment is requested has been completed and proper documentation has been submitted. The remaining 10% will only be disbursed once all reporting requirements have been met, including, but not limited to, the final performance report.
- **4.04** Eligible Expenses: Generally, expenses that are necessary and reasonable for proper and efficient performance and administration of the Project are eligible. Examples of eligible expenditures include:
  - 1. Personnel costs, including salary and benefits related to temporary or event staff; grant funds may <u>not</u> be used to pay for existing employees in the performance of their day-to-day duties.
  - 2. Direct operating expenses that directly relate to Project activities; this may include facility rental or other workshop related expenses (note: meals, food, or beverages of any kind are not considered an eligible expense).
  - 3. Supplies that cost less than \$5,000, such as office supplies, printing services, and materials needed to accomplish the proposed Project.
  - 4. Vendor contracts (i.e. agreements made with a third-party to perform a portion of the Project services).
  - 5. Controlled assets, which are defined as certain items valued \$500.00 \$4,999.99 which must also be inventoried, see: <a href="https://fmx.cpa.texas.gov/fmx/pubs/spaproc/appendices/appa/index.php.">https://fmx.cpa.texas.gov/fmx/pubs/spaproc/appendices/appa/index.php.</a>
  - 6. If grant funds are proposed by COUNTY to be used to fund bounty efforts, COUNTY must have a written policy implemented to prevent the intentional breeding and raising of feral hogs for the purpose of meeting bounty requirements. In addition, bounty-related grant fund reimbursement is limited to 50% of the bounty paid and a maximum of \$5.00 per feral hog.

- 4.05 Ineligible Expenses: Expenses prohibited by state or federal law or determined to be ineligible by Program guidelines will not be reimbursed. Examples of these ineligible expenditures include, but are not limited to the following:
  - 1. Alcoholic beverages:
  - 2. Entertainment;
  - 3. Contributions, charitable or political;
  - 4. Expenses falling outside of the contract period;
  - 5. Items not listed in the project budget or an approved amendment;
  - 6. Expenses that are not adequately documented;
  - 7. Travel, including but not limited to mileage reimbursement, meals and lodging; and
  - 8. Meals, food or beverage costs of any kind, including those associated with an educational workshop.
- **4.06** Non-expended grant funds: If COUNTY fails to incur cost reimbursable expenses in the amount specified in Paragraph 4.01 during the term of this Agreement and properly invoice for same in accordance with the terms hereof, COUNTY shall not be entitled to such unspent funds. Any unspent funds will remain with AGRILIFE EXTENSION.

# SECTION 5 MISCELLANEOUS

5.01 Notices: Fee payment or notices required under this Agreement may be sent by United States Postal Service regular surface mail, certified mail, registered mail, overnight delivery, or hand delivery. Written notice delivery is deemed made when the notice is deposited into a USPS mail receptacle, or deposited with an overnight carrier, or hand delivered. 5.02 Force Majeure: Any and all duties, obligations, and covenants of this Agreement will be suspended during time of natural disaster, war, acts of terrorism, or other "Acts of God", which prevent a Party from fulfilling any and all duties, obligations, and/or covenants of this Agreement. If a Party is prevented from fulfilling a duty, obligation, and/or covenant

- of this Agreement, due to Force Majeure, the Party prevented from fulfilling will notify the other Party in writing, sent pursuant to Section 5.01 Agreement, within fourteen (14) calendar business days of the Force Majeure event.
- 5.03 Parties Relationship: Nothing in the Agreement should be construed as creating a partnership, joint venture, agency relationship, or any other relationship other than, between COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION.

COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION each have the right to pursue any remedy or relief which may be provided by law, in equity, or by the stipulations of this Lease.

# **Request for County Feral Hog Grant**

# Statement of Purpose

Pursuant to the Texas Legislature, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Wildlife Services (WS) program hereby requests applications for County Feral Hog Abatement Grants (Grant). The Grant program ("Program") is designed to encourage counties across the State of Texas to make a concentrated and coordinated effort to reduce the feral hog population and the damage caused by these animals throughout the year. Successful applicants will receive grants to initiate or continue feral hog abatement activities in their county. This document ("RFGA") sets forth Program requirements and procedures.

Current abatement methods in Texas vary depending on the geographic terrain and vegetation. WS recognizes that the responsibility for management rests with landowners and local constituents who know the surrounding land and waterways, as well as the potential challenges to combating feral hogs. Through this program, the highest ranking counties will receive assistance to continue local activities which may range from educating the landowners on abatement methods, coordinating trapping and hunting programs, conducting aerial gunning and addressing public safety hazards related to feral hogs.

# Eligibility

To be eligible for an award under the Program, the applicant must be a Texas county. The county must have or develop a method to accurately track the number of feral hogs taken in the county as well as documentation for other provisions included in the application (e.g. receipts for purchases, trap loan numbers, etc.) for the eligible period September 1, 2020-August 31, 2021.

# Grantee Responsibilities and Accountability

Selected Applicants (grantees) will be responsible for conducting a project supported by the Program and for achieving the results described in the application. Each grantee shall monitor the day-to-day performance of the grant project to assure adherence to statutes, regulations, and grant terms and conditions. The grantee must carry out the activities described in the approved scope of work.

The grantee will be accountable for documenting the use of grant funds and must ensure funds are used solely for authorized purposes. The grantee must ensure:

Funds are used only for activities covered by the approved project.

- Funds are not used in violation of the restrictions and prohibitions of applicable statutes and regulations.
- All budget and performance reports are completed in a timely manner.

Each grantee must ensure they have an adequate accounting system in place and good internal controls to ensure expenditures and reimbursements are reported and maintained for seven (7) years after the conclusion of the project.

### Funding Parameters

Awards are subject to the availability of funds. If funds are not appropriated or collected for this Program, applicants will be informed accordingly.

WS will make awards after all applications are processed. Grant funds will be available on a cost reimbursement basis for county use on feral hog abatement expenditures during the grant term. A total of \$100,000 is available. WS anticipates awarding up to 15 grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000 each. Applications will be reviewed through a competitive evaluation process.

Bounty programs may be included in a county's proposal, however WS will limit State funding of bounties to 50% of the amount actually paid out.

To receive grant funds, counties that are awarded Program grants must enter into a written agreement with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. Grant funds will be distributed on a reimbursement basis after awarded counties submit proof of allowable expenditures.

WS reserves the right to accept or reject any or all applications submitted. WS is under no legal or other obligation to execute a grant award on the basis of a response submitted to this RFGA.

Public announcements and written notifications will be made to all applicants and their affiliated agencies, organizations, or institutions. Favorable decisions will indicate the amount of award, duration of the grant, and any special conditions associated with the project.

# Term of Funding or Duration of Projects

A Notice of Grant Award is anticipated to be made in October 2020. However, it is the intention of the legislature that Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service continue to make available a level of funding similar to previous grants administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). Counties may have continued feral hog projects following the conclusion of the TDA program. Therefore, approved projects may claim expenditures which have occurred since September 1, 2020. Projects under this funding request must be completed by August 31, 2021. No expenditures incurred after August 31, 2021 will be reimbursed.

# **Application Requirements**

To be considered, applications must be complete and include all of the following information.

Grant Applications-Interested applicants must include all of the following information:

# A narrative including:

• County Information. This is the name and address for the county.

- Primary Program Contact. This is the individual who can answer questions about the county's activities and performance.
- Authorized Official. This is the person legally able to bind the county in contracts or agreements, generally the county judge.
- Previous Participation. For counties which participated in the Feral hog grant program, a copy of the final report is required.
- Description of Activities. Include information on:
  - i. Description of the proposed program including abatement activities supported or used;
  - ii. Type and number of county-sponsored education program(s) about feral hog abatement technologies proposed; and
  - iii. A proposed budget (total cost for educational and operational activities, county share of bounty if proposed);
- Certifications. The authorized official must sign the application.

#### Evaluation and Selection Information

WS will conduct an administrative review to determine whether the applicant was responsive to the requirements of this RFGA. WS will take into consideration the status of any continuing project's progress.

Applications will be evaluated on the following criterion:

- The degree to which the proposal meets or supports established watershed or agricultural protection programs (a maximum of 30 points will be awarded to those county proposals which are consistent with watershed protection plans or agricultural protection programs).
- The estimated contribution of the proposal to removing feral hogs from the landscape (a maximum of 30 points will be awarded for aspects of the project which contribute to fewer hogs, including trap loan programs, aerial hunting contracts, equipment purchased for control and bounties. NOTE: WS will only reimburse counties 50% of actual bounties paid. Counties planning on bounty programs need to state the total bounty pool and the county commitment to the remaining 50%. Programs which remove feral hogs but contribute to perpetuation of hogs as a resource may not receive full points.)
- The number of landowner outreach events planned or conducted from September 1, 2020 through August 31, 2021 which include at least 1 hour of feral hog management topics, including biology, management strategies and damage assessment. We recognize that outreach in the current pandemic environment will be challenging and encourage applicants to develop adaptive and innovative outreach plans. Media articles, 4-H presentations and collaborations with schools may be included in outreach planning (a maximum of 5 points per event planned and 10 points per event conducted up to 20 points per application will be awarded).
- The degree to which the county project conducts a formalized damage and control assessment (a maximum of 10 points will be awarded if the county project records numbers of feral swine removed and up to 10 additional points will be recorded for a formalized county level damage assessment).

WS will include outside reviewers in evaluating proposals. County Primary Point of Contact may be queried during the evaluation process to clarify proposals.

Grant funds will be used to develop stakeholder engagement programs, a new micro-grant program for landowners based on feedback from participants in the 2020 Caldwell County Feral Hog Management Webinar and to purchase supplies and equipment toward the goal of reducing the damage and extent of feral hog (Sus scrofa) activity in Caldwell County, Texas. This effort will be strengthened and enhanced by Caldwell County's participation in The Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force, a co-managed, regional feral hog abatement effort with cooperating counties including, Guadalupe and Hays. The grant will enable Caldwell County to take advantage of a regional communication network and share resources with partner counties while also implementing specific mitigation efforts designed for the cultural and land use priorities that make Caldwell County unique.

Caldwell County and its partners are not alone in suffering millions of dollars in damages to property and natural resources from feral hog activity. What sets Caldwell County and our partners apart, however, are the tools and experience each county possesses in grant management, stakeholder engagement and watershed protection that will serve to ensure grant funds achieve program goals. Four watershed protection plans (WPP) are currently being implemented in the three-county region: Cypress Creek WPP and Upper San Marcos River WPP (Hays); Plum Creek WPP (Hays-Caldwell); Geronimo-Alligator Creek WPP

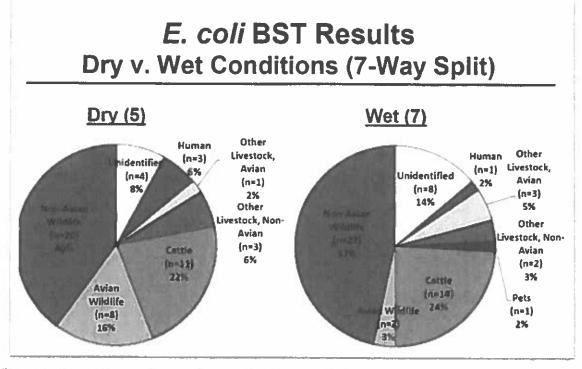


Figure 1. Results of 12-month Plum Creek Watershed, Bacterial Source Tracking Study (Wet versus Dry Conditions) completed by the Plum Creek Watershed Partnership, Hays-Blanco River Authority and the Texas A&M Soil and Aquatic Microbiologic Laboratory.

(Caldwell). Historic and ongoing impacts to water quality from feral hogs in these watersheds have been well documented. A 12-month Bacterial Source Tracking (BST) study completed for Plum Creek in 2018 demonstrated that non-avian wildlife was the most dominant source of *E. coli* throughout the watershed (Figure 1). Feral hogs are highly suspected to be the driver of wildlife *E. coli* in Plum Creek as well as Geronimo and Alligator Creeks in Guadalupe County due to their active population, biology and behavioral patterns that keep them close to the cool, vegetated riparian areas along streams. Each partner county in the proposed regional effort has successfully participated in feral hog management activities, most notable being Caldwell County's Feral Hog Task Force established in 2013, whose ongoing outreach, education and direct abatement efforts have led to the documented removal of over 16,000 feral hogs in Caldwell County and the Plum Creek Watershed.

The continued development of The Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force, a regional feral hog abatement program for Caldwell, Guadalupe and Hays County through this grant program will ensure the following deliverables: (1) a continuation of multifaceted feral hog management programs for partner counties; (2) a centralized website, <a href="www.feralhogtaskforce.com">www.feralhogtaskforce.com</a>, for sharing information about feral hog programs, tracking progress and announcing upcoming opportunities throughout the region with links to existing resources as well as dedicated pages for each partner county; (3) development and allocation

of shared resources for participating counties including: a <u>county-level damage assessment</u>, miscellaneous program forms (ex. landowner surveys, bounty participation forms, etc.); (4) <u>equipment sharing cooperatives (ex. remote operated traps)</u>; (5) <u>cost-sharing incentive programs (ex. trapping supplies)</u>; (6) coordinated educational programming including <u>webinars</u> AND <u>one county-based workshop for each partner county</u>; and (7) a dynamic social media campaign to enhance program success and expand program reach. Partner counties may also participate in <u>bounty programs</u> and aerial hunting contracts.

Public-private partnerships will serve as a catalyst for greater program impact by leveraging grant funds to expand projects and incentivize stakeholder ownership in the feral hog abatement effort.

Caldwell County and our cooperating partners, Guadalupe Co. and Hays Co., will work with county staff, AgriLife, Texas State University – Meadows Center for Water and the Environment, the Plum Creek Watershed Partnership, local business, NGOs and others to coordinate efforts and deliver feral hog abatement programs with a goal of the documented removal of 6,000 feral hogs throughout the region during the project period.

# **PROJECT SUMMARY**

The FY2014 Caldwell-Hays County Feral Hog Action Plan (Action Plan) provides directives for a dynamic approach to achieve significant reductions in damage caused by invasive, feral swine in Caldwell County and Hays County, Texas, through (1) operational and technical assistance to landowners, (2) financial incentives, and (3) professional services for direct control of feral hogs to abate impacts on agricultural resources, personal property, native wildlife, riparian habitat and water quality.

The Action Plan has been coordinated and administered by the Caldwell County Feral Hog Task Force (CCFHTF) to demonstrate a short duration (12-month), high intensity, two-county, landowner "cooperative" approach to feral hog management. Due to rapid growth rates demonstrated by feral swine and behavioral tendencies that tend to make individual control options more costly and less effective over time, a diverse and highly intensive program was intended to significantly reduce the feral hog population growth curve in the project area within one year, making long-term management of feral swine a real and feasible option for Caldwell County and Hays County, TX.

While the population of feral hogs in the project area remains unknown, numerous efforts are underway to quantify current and historic harvest rates and to determine the extent of agricultural property damage to the project area as a result of feral hog activities. It should be noted that over 1,100 hogs were confirmed to be harvested throughout the project area from October through December of 2012 as a result of Hog Out Activities; however, feral hog damage and sightings continued to be reported at a consistent and alarming rate throughout the project area in 2013. Motorist collisions with feral hogs in the project area were continuing to rise, putting travelers at risk. Water quality impacts from feral hog activity continue to be felt throughout the Plum Creek watershed.

Due to the variability of land type, population diversity and control measures available it was determined that a variety of programs should be implemented for the proposed Action Plan to have the desired effect on the overall feral hog population and to demonstrate environmental and property damage reductions. A critical component of the Action Plan is an educated and highly energized stakeholder base in the two-county project area as a result of years of outreach and education. This was clearly demonstrated by the broad support this application received in terms of significant financial contributions from 10 project partners, volunteer hours pledged by an additional 6 project partners and 24 total letters of support and/or financial assistance from businesses, agricultural groups, environmental groups, wildlife management associations, cities, counties and individual landowners.

# **PROJECT APPROACH / GOALS & OUTCOMES**

# **Professional Trapping Services**

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 500 feral hogs (\$30/hog)

- Total harvest: OGM CHAMP contract + OGM (private LOAs) = 326 feral hogs
- Harvest via OGM CHAMP contract (grand funds only) = 217 feral hogs (\$85.41/hog)
- OGM Reporting (private LOAs) = 109 feral hogs

Ortiz Game Management and Wildlife Development (OGM) conducted intensive feral hog trapping services for participating landowners from December 1, 2013 through March 31, 2013. Two public meetings of the CCFHTF were utilized to inform interested and concerned citizens about the services offered by OGM and to enroll participants. Individuals seeking help privately were also referred to OGM during the contract period. It was anticipated that OGM's efforts would be most beneficial to small acreage and suburban landowners in Hays and Caldwell County where hunting and large-scale landowner trapping are not realistic options; however, most abatement activities performed by OGM throughout the grant term were on rural areas in the Plum Creek and San Marcos River watersheds in Caldwell and Hays County. In total, OGM provided services for 8 primary landowners during the grant term, but efforts were also coordinated with neighboring landowners making the total impact significantly larger. Hunting and trapping operations were conducted on approximately 3,500 acres during the grant term.

#### Lessons Learned

Landowner exposure to OGM's services and word-of-mouth advertising kept OGM in operation via private LOAs in both counties through August of 2014. While the actual feral hog harvest from professional trapping services did not meet the pre-project anticipated harvest, this component of the Action Plan was very popular among participating landowners and received much media exposure serving to enhance outreach efforts of the CCFHTF. The services provided by feral hog control professionals, like OGM, are broad with benefits including rapid response and the ability to apply controls in a variety of settings from urban to rural. In many cases, cost per hog may be higher than traditional landowner hunting/trapping methods; however, professionals are not hired to remove "cheap" hogs, typically responding to the needs of landowners experiencing tremendous damage from feral hogs without the means to effectively address the problem. OGM continues to partner with the CCFHT in a variety of ways including monthly reporting.

#### **Aerial Control Services**

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 375 feral hogs (\$30/hog)

- Total Harvest: HToT CHAMP contract + HToT (private LOAs) + TWS = 736 feral hogs
- Harvest via HToT CHAMP contract (grant funds only) = 138 (\$59.42/hog)
- HToT Reporting (private LOAs) = 378
- Texas Wildlife Services (2 flights) = 220

Existing landowner agreements (LOAs) with Texas Wildlife Services (TWS) cover approximately 40,000 acres of the Plum Creek Watershed in Caldwell County. Plans to recommit landowners with existing agreements and expand into additional lands led to two TWS aerial control operations in the spring of

2014, which removed 220 feral hogs from the Plum Creek watershed. To enhance the effectiveness of aerial control from TWS, the Action Plan called for aerial operations to be conducted by a local company, Helicopter Tours of Texas (HToT), throughout FY2014. HToT provides rapid response with trained marksmen at a rate of \$750/hour which was covered 100% by CHAMP grant funds for participating landowners. HToT conducted 6 operations under the grant contract, removing 138 feral hogs for an average production rate of 12.5 hogs per hour. Flights conducted by HToT per private LOAs and through their sister nonprofit, Operation Dustoff, removed an additional 378 feral hogs from December 2013 through August 2014. Due to the success of aerial operations, increased landowner adoption of this control method and outreach efforts of the CCFHTF to support Operation Dustoff, aerial control operations were regularly conducted in the project area from December 2013 through August 2014.

#### **Lessons Learned**

The Action Plan was initially budgeted to provide funding for up to 15 flight hours from HToT which prior to CHAMP operations, held approximately 6,000 acres of LOAs in Caldwell County. HToT now operates on more than 10,000 acres in Caldwell County and supports Operation Dustoff, a nonprofit that provides opportunities for retired military veterans to put their superior marksmen skills to use in aerial feral hog control operations. Due to the success and funding for Operation Dustoff, the CHAMP contract with HToT was reduced to 11 hours with funds being transferred to support additional professional trapping services in Hays County.

The aerial control harvest production rate for contracted flights using CHAMP grant funds was lower than expected. At times HToT has reported harvest rates exceeding 50 hogs per hour; however, this can be affected by numerous variables, including time of year and other feral hog control activities in the project area. The harvest rate reported by TWS during their flights was also down from flights conducted on the same properties in 2010. It should be noted that TWS did report seeing some of the largest sounders of feral hogs that the pilot had ever witnessed, possibly exceeding 80 individuals.

As is the case with OGM, professionals are not hired to remove "cheap" hogs. HToT and its support of Operation Dustoff allow for rapid response in high-demand situations. HToT and Operation Dustoff continue to partner with the CCFHT in a variety of ways including monthly reporting.

#### Feral Hog Round-Ups, Administration and Marketing

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 4,000 feral hogs (\$5.54/hog)

- Total Harvest: Bounty + Jackpot + landowner reporting = 4,060 feral hogs (\$4.66/hog)
- Bounties paid with CHAMP grant funds = 3,248
- Jackpot competition submissions = 241
- Voluntary landowner reporting = 571

Landowner incentives were anticipated to provide the greatest feral hog yield per dollar spent through implementation of the Action Plan and this was realized in a number of ways. A \$5/hog bounty was implemented throughout the project area for eligible landowners, hunters and trappers who completed a Caldwell-Hays Feral Hog Bounty Participation Form. \$11,650 was guaranteed to this program per the original application with anticipated landowner participation funds, vendor discounts and donations expecting to contribute an additional \$8,350. Marketing and administrative costs for the Action Plan

were included in this program, as well. After a budget revision, final funding for this program totaled \$18,920.

The bounty and jackpot programs were managed by the CCFHTF with all payments supervised by the Caldwell County Auditor. To be eligible to redeem the bounty, participants were required to provide biological evidence in the form of a feral hog tail. Six bounty claim stations throughout the project area staffed trained volunteers or employees to verify and safely dispose of the biological evidence and to collect information from participants on their feral hog harvest including contact information, location, harvest method, etc. Similar information was obtained to support an end-of-year August Jackpot Competition. Paid bounty and jackpot competition programs yielded 3,489 feral hogs over the 12-month grant period. Throughout the year, outreach efforts encouraged landowners to report feral hog data in the form of a survey. Harvest numbers from these surveys along with harvest data from *Log Your Hogs* campaign conducted in April 2014 total 571 feral hogs and are reflected in the above program totals under "voluntary landowner reporting".

#### **Lessons Learned**

The CCFHTF approved 150 individuals to participate in the Caldwell-Hays feral hog bounty program. This number is more than triple the number of participants in the 2012 bounty program. The CCFHTF believes that extensive outreach, word-of-mouth, a \$3/hog increase in payments, and abundant media coverage all served to increase motivation and reflected participation. That being said, it is anticipated per survey findings, public meeting discussions and in-person conversations that there remains a significant amount of land in the project area not being managed for feral hogs as well as a significant number of individual that are not reporting their harvest numbers due to lack of awareness or lack of motivation. This is particularly apparent in Hays County, where much effort was put into outreach and marketing in the form of workshops, newspaper ads, articles, radio interviews, direct mail, email and even a "Hog Hunters Appreciation Brunch and Raffle" held in Kyle, TX. More study will be required to understand the significant differences in participation rates in Caldwell and Hays County.

#### **Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program**

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 960 feral hogs (\$23/hog)

Total Harvest not included here as it is dispersed among previously identified bounty and
voluntary reporting totals for the above "Feral Hog Round-Ups" program. Feral hogs trapped
using Cooperative Trapping Program equipment became the property of the landowner and
were therefore eligible for the \$5/hog bounty program. An estimate of total feral hogs
harvested specifically through this program based on landowner reporting is included below.

In an effort to increase the current feral hog harvest rate among landowners in the project area, a Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program was expanded. To increase this critical harvest rate, it was determined that greater participation along with either more traps or more effective methods would need to be employed by local hunters, trappers and landowners. This program was designed to enhance all of the above.

Caldwell County purchased its first "Smart Trap" system for this program with funds awarded through the TDA Hog Out County Grant in 2013. The Action Plan called for at least two additional systems to complete the program. The trapping mechanism is designed to be operated from a computer or smartphone with real-time images from the trapping location alerting the user when hogs are in the

trap. Participants had the ability to trigger the gate at their convenience and when a large number of hogs entered the trap. This reduces the number of "trained" or "trap-shy" feral hogs, with the ultimate goal to catch an entire sounder. Landowners wishing to use one of the available systems were required to fill out a Caldwell-Hays Feral Hog Survey and indicate that they have documented feral hog activity and a desire and ability to use the system. The CCFHTF managed the flow of trapping systems along with volunteers from a local business that pledged their support to help move traps throughout the project area when needed. Trapping systems were made available to participating landowners on a month-to-month basis. Smart traps were utilized by 12 landowners and/or property managers on 12 separate properties over the course of the CHAMP grant project period with an estimated total harvest determined to be 252 feral hogs with 187 trapped in Caldwell County and 65 in Hays County.

#### Lessons learned

#### **Smart Traps**

Many of the hogs captured in Smart Traps were submitted via the bounty program so numbers from the Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program are not included in the overall project total to prevent the possibility of over reporting. Further, determining cost per hog through this program is a difficult task. The initial expectation of 960 feral hogs at \$23/hog did not consider depreciation and residual capital value on equipment purchases. Assuming 75% residual value in grant-purchased equipment, cost per feral hog harvested in Smart Traps over the project period could be estimated at \$18.18/hog.

While the large majority of participating landowners enjoyed the Smart Trap systems and associated technology, the original projected harvest of 960 feral hogs through the *Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program* far exceeded actual harvest numbers. To address this, several new trapping strategies were incorporated throughout the project period based on landowner/CCFHTF/professional collaboration.

- 1. In some cases, as soon as landowners set up a trap, hogs "disappeared" from their property for an extended period with nothing being viewed on the system's camera for more than a month. Other times, trap-shy hogs would avoid entering the trap or move in and out so quick that participants were not able to engage the door. To increase the effectiveness of the traps, the CCFHTF modified a first-come-first-served approach to issuing traps to a first-come-first-served <a href="IF">IF</a> you can verify current feral hog activity by CCFHTF-issued game cameras or other evidence collected by the participant.
- It was decided that when single, large boars entered the trap, participants should engage the
  door and remove the boar as these individuals may tend to keep smaller boars, sows and
  younger pigs from entering a food plot.

When landowners were "lucky", however, large numbers of feral hogs entered the trap on the first night. Over 50 hogs were removed from one 350 acre property in 30 days using a 30' corral smart trap. The largest one-time catch was a 29-hog sounder in northern Caldwell County. At \$200 per year in anticipated negative economic impact per hog, that was a \$5,800 night. The Smart Traps have proven to be low-maintenance, durable and relatively easy to move. Two traps continue to be operated in Caldwell County and one trap will operate in Hays County.

#### 40' Drop Net

In addition to the state-of-the-art trapping systems, the Action Plan called for the purchase of a 40' magnetic drop net, which was made available to participating hunters, trappers and landowners through a similar cooperative process managed by the CCFHTF. This program was tested in the field by a landowner with assistance from OGM but there was very little interest in this tool from local landowners

due to a lack of familiarity of the equipment and labor intensity of the setup process. This program was discontinued and the CCFHTF has decided to sell the drop net and apply proceeds toward future feral hog management efforts.

#### Participant donations

To encourage participation in CHAMP programs and encourage the utilization of new and different feral hog management strategies, the CCFHTF did not require deposits or fees from local hunters, trappers and landowners with interest in available programs. Rather, participants benefitting from aerial control, professional trapping services, or other *Landowner Cooperative* programs were asked to donate what they could to offset CCFHTF costs and provide funds for future programs. The majority of participants initially stated that they would be happy to donate to the effort; however, only a handful actually contributed. A total of \$1,000 in landowner contributions from 5 separate landowners were received by the Task Force over the project period.

### **PROJECT RESULTS**

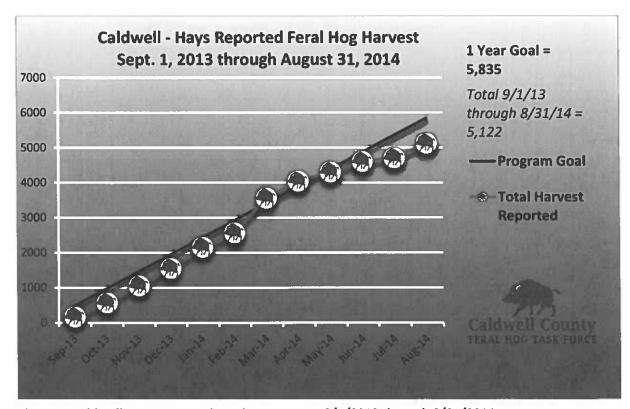


Figure 1. Caldwell-Hays Reported Feral Hog Harvest 9/1/2013 through 8/31/2014

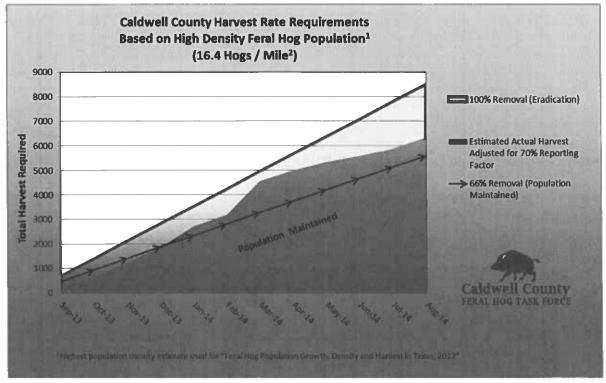


Figure 2. Caldwell County Estimated 1-year Feral Hog Harvest for Population Maintenance/Reduction

While overall project harvest numbers fell just below preliminary harvest goals (see Figure 1), the 1-year Caldwell County harvest rate may be unprecedented in terms of large-scale feral hog management (see Figure 2). Based on the highest average feral hog population density study utilized by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service for their 2012 publication, Feral Hog Population: Growth, Density and Harvest in Texas, (16.4 hogs/mile<sup>2</sup>) and considering a 70% reporting rate established by project surveys, public meeting discussions and personal interviews, it is believed that the 1-year harvest rate for the entire Caldwell County feral hog population may have reached 70% over the project period.

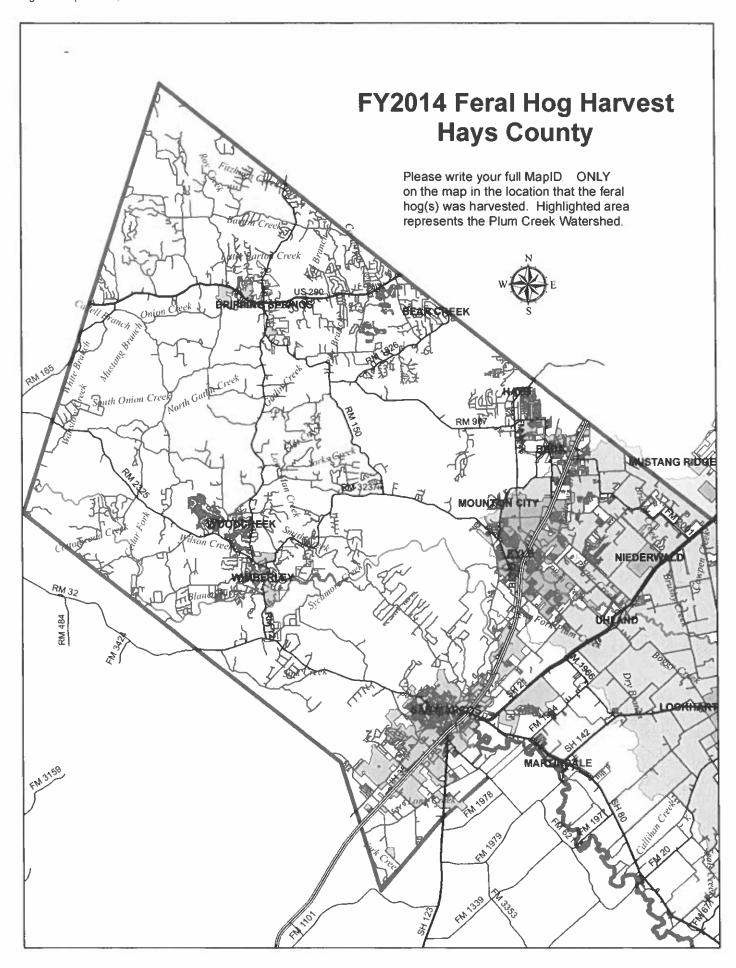

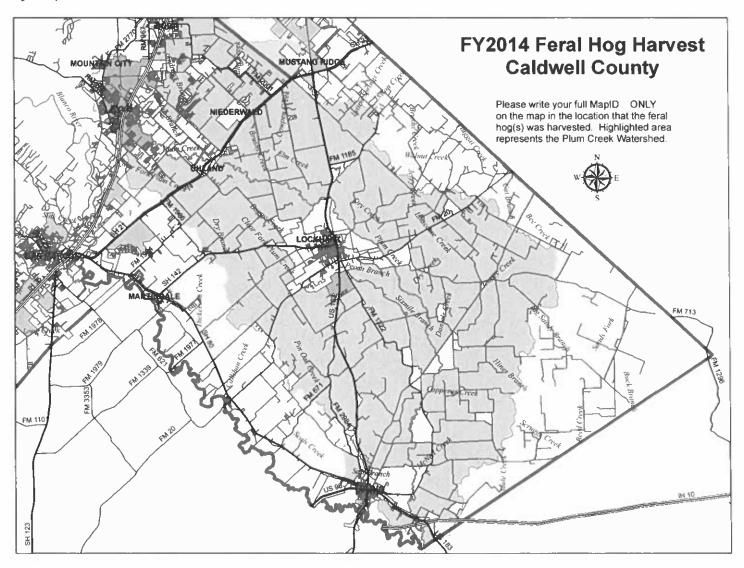

Caldwell County CHOMP-15-04 Grant funds the continued implementation of the Caldwell County Feral Hog Action Plan as amended and managed by the Caldwell County Feral Hog Task Force (CCFHTF), a volunteer-led Task Force designated by the Caldwell County Commissioner's Court through Resolution 16-2013, passed and adopted on May 28, 2013. Project components funded by CHOMP-15-04 include landowner cooperative cost-share and/or lease programs for the purchase of new feral hog traps and equipment, cellular game cameras and professional aerial control time. Funds also support a countywide feral hog bounty program.

- Cellular trail camera cost-share program implemented during reporting period providing wireless capable cameras for 16 participants
- 2 feral hog bounty claims during reporting period with a total of 39 participants
- 12 aerial operations performed in Caldwell County on 12 separate properties during the reporting period removing 330 feral swine. Average cost / hog = \$18.18
- The 32-month documented feral hog harvest for Caldwell County stands at 9,626 as of Apr. 30, 2016 with an estimated actual harvest of 13,794 (based on 30% non-reporting factor)
- Total reported Caldwell Co. feral hog harvest for CHOMP = 3,623

#### <u>Trapping supplies – participant cost-share program (\$3,000)</u>

#### **COMPLETE**

The CCFHTF purchased \$3,000 in supplies for 20 new corral traps installed throughout the County.

#### Cellular trail cameras (Prior - \$3,500 / Per this request - \$2,500)

#### **COMPLETE**

The CCFHTF purchased 16 wireless adapters for use with a variety of Moultrie game cameras. These supplies are directed to the more serious feral hog trappers in the county and landowners that reside in adjacent counties. Cellular trail cameras allow standard corral and cage traps to remain engaged and monitored daily without the need to physically drive to the location. These cameras will save users' fuel cost and allow traps to be baited and run continuously without having to consider in-person daily monitoring.

Through a partnership with Smith Supply, the wireless adapters are purchased at wholesale cost which allowed for the expansion of this program from 10 to 16 devices while also reducing the budgeted amount. Additionally, the adapters are mobile and can be installed on a variety of Moultrie trail camera models enabling participants to select one or more combinations to best suit their needs.

Program run through partnership with Smith Supply locations in Lockhart and Luling.
 Vendor delays led to an extension request for this grant program. Eligible participants receive a free wireless adapter (retail value \$200) with the purchase of a wireless-capable Moultrie trail camera from Smith Supply. Participants are responsible for cellular/data plans.

#### Countywide Bounty Program (Prior - \$12,500 / Per this request - \$13,500)

#### COMPLETE

- Two bounty claims managed by CCFHTF volunteers and paid by the County Auditor
- Offered 50# bags of corn as bonus to \$5/hog bounty
- Total bounty participants = 39
- Total pounds of corn distributed to participants = 4,100
- Total bounty claims submitted = 761 feral hogs

NOTE: An adjusted increase of \$1,000 to the "Other" budget category was required to cover bounty cost. This led to a \$1,000 reduction in the "Supplies" budget category.

#### Professional aerial gunning services - landowner cost-share program (\$6,000)

#### **COMPLETE**

The CCFHTF provided \$500 per participant to 12 landowners seeking professional aerial eradication services from an approved aerial gunning service provider. The funds offset costs for local landowners and provided incentives for new participants who have not before utilized this proven method for feral hog abatement.

- 330 feral hogs harvested at an average cost / hog = \$18.18
- 9 hours of flight time for an average of 36.7 hogs / hour

CCHFTF programs have yielded the removal of over 13,000 feral hogs from Caldwell County since September 2013. A rapid adoption of controls and utilization of funding led to huge numbers of hogs being removed in 2014 and 2015. Resources and personnel have been stretched in 2016 and 2017 leading to a leveling off of activity. The uncertainty of future funds and scheduling issues led to the indefinite postponement of a CCFHTF Membership meeting in 2017. We were unable to utilize \$2,781 in grant funds for hunting trapping supplies as program opportunities declined near the end of 2017. New energy from a new Leadership Committee along with increased feral hog activity in the County should result in a large number of feral hogs removed from Caldwell County in 2018.

#### Final Report: 2018 Central Texas Feral Hog Action and Sustainability Plan

The Meadows Center for Water and the Environment at Texas State University has partnered with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, local stakeholder groups and the counties of Hays, Caldwell and Guadalupe to establish the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force.

#### **Funding**

Fiscal Year 2018 funding for this effort was secured through participating County Commissioner's Courts and separate grant contracts awarded to the three participating counties:

- Hays County ILA = \$7,850
- Caldwell County ILA = \$12,000
- Guadalupe County ILA = \$15,000
- Local matching funds = \$2,597.50
- TOTAL FUNDS = \$37,447.50

#### **Bounty Program**

Due to the limited timeframe for fund expenditure, primary abatement efforts took place over just a two-month period, July and August 2018. Total documented feral hog abatement through county-implemented bounty programs over this period included the removal of **1,039 feral swine** in the three-county region.

#### Trapping Kits

Capital investment for ongoing and future feral hog abatement was also a top priority to establish program sustainability. Investment in direct landowner assistance through the development of an incentive-based program to distribute trapping kits to engaged landowners will enhance feral hog management on numerous properties throughout the three-county region. As a result of this program,



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twenty-seven new feral hog corral traps will be activated in the region with an anticipated annual abatement capacity of **1,350 feral swine**. The following trapping supplies were purchased and distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force:

#### Landowner Trapping Kits Distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force - FY2018

- Hays County = 2 kits (t-posts, panels, 40" door) valued at \$609 each
- Caldwell County = 9 kits (t-posts, panels and 40" door) valued at \$528 each
- Guadalupe County = 16 kits (16 gift cards for selected trapping supplies) valued at \$500 each

#### Additional Program Investments

Additional capital investment/ongoing program funding included FY2018 Wireless Traps service fees incurred by Caldwell and Hays County. Three Wireless Traps currently in use through a local landowner cooperative support previously initiated efforts by the Caldwell County Feral Hog Task Force and Hays County.

To bring new efficiencies and accuracies to abatement documentation efforts, the Meadows Center directs program funds to a 10.5 inch iPad Pro with WiFi and Cellular to be piloted for future bounty efforts in Caldwell County.

#### Surveys

To help quantify feral hog damage in the three-county Central Texas region, a voluntary landowner survey was completed by 29 participants (Appendix A – Landowner Survey). An aerial survey was also completed to assess feral hog impacts on local streams. The aerial survey was conducted via helicopter on August 20, 2018, by Meadows Center and AgriLife staff and included Geronimo Creek (full reach) and a segment of the Guadalupe River in Guadalupe County as well as segments of Plum Creek and the San Marcos River in southern Caldwell County. Due to heavy canopy and limited visibility, the aerial survey was scratched for additional stream segments in Caldwell County and Hays County. Five feral hogs were spotted on the Guadalupe River, two miles downstream from the confluence with Geronimo Creek. Individual feral hogs were also spotted on Geronimo Creek and the San Marcos River upstream of the confluence with Plum Creek. While approximately ten traps and feeders were identified in the survey segments, the total number of hogs spotted from the air was <10 individuals over two hours of flight time, which should be considered a drastic under representation of the actual feral hog population active along these stream segments. Further aerial analysis and landowner surveys during FY2019 (minimal canopy for aerial observations in Jan. and Feb.) should be completed to better quantify feral hog impacts to local streams.

#### Outreach and Education

The Meadows Center worked with state and local AgriLife staff, watershed protection groups and other stakeholders to advertise and conduct two landowner workshops (see **Appendix B – Press Releases**, **Workshop Agendas and Sign-in Sheets**). A total of 47 attendees (non-presenters) received three hours of education on feral hog history, biology and management for a total of **141 direct contact hours**.

The Meadows Center for Water and the Environment at Texas State University has partnered with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, local stakeholder groups and the counties of Hays, Caldwell and Guadalupe (no grant funds for FY2019) to continue development of the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force.

#### **Funding**

Fiscal Year 2019 funding for this effort was secured through participating County Commissioner's Courts and separate grant contracts awarded to the three participating counties:

- Hays County ILA w/ AgriLife = \$13,100
- Caldwell County ILA w/ AgriLife = \$20,000
  - o Caldwell Co. matching funds = \$5,000.00
- Guadalupe County funds (bounty only) = \$3,530

#### FY2019 Program Totals

- TOTAL FUNDS = \$41,630.00
- TOTAL FERAL SWINE ABATED = 4,607 (\$9.04 per hog)
- ESTIMATED 2019 PROPERTY/ECOLOGICAL DAMAGE MITIGATED = \$2,303,500 (ROI = \$55.33)

#### **Bounty Program**

The bounty program in Caldwell County began in March 2019 with monthly collection events held at Smith Supply in Lockhart, TX, with support from the Plum Creek Watershed Partnership and trained Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force volunteers. Grant funding of \$5,000 was budgeted for the program but limited to 50% reimbursement, so Caldwell County Commissioners approved an additional \$5,000 in matching funds to cover 2,000 bounties at \$5.00 per verified feral hog extirpated from the County. Initial bounty funds were exhausted during the July collection event, but the County approved additional funds to keep the program funded. Prior to August reporting, 2,071 feral swine were reported for the Caldwell



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County Bounty Program. Guadalupe County ran a bounty program strictly from local funding approved by County Commissioners. The program was conducted out of the Guadalupe County extension office and yielded 706 feral swine. No bounty program was conducted in Hays County. Total documented feral hog abatement through county-implemented bounty programs over this period included the removal of **2,777 feral swine** in the three-county region.

#### Trapping Kits

Capital investment for ongoing and future feral hog abatement was also a top priority to establish program sustainability. Investment in direct landowner assistance through the development of an incentive-based program to distribute trapping kits to engaged landowners will enhance feral hog management on numerous properties throughout the three-county region. As a result of this program, thirteen new feral hog corral traps will be activated in the region with an anticipated annual abatement capacity of 650 feral swine. The following trapping supplies were purchased and distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force:

#### Landowner Trapping Kits Distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force - FY2019

- Hays County = 6 kits (t-posts, panels, 36" door) valued at \$598 each
- Caldwell County = 7 kits (t-posts, panels and 36" door) valued at \$400 each

#### Aerial Gunning

Aerial gunning was conducted by pilots and trained marksmen with Veracity Aviation, based out of Seguin, TX. As grant funds were not available until January 2019, contracts could not be acquired with Veracity until mid-February, which in 2019, meant thicker canopy and less effective timing for aerial gunning. Nevertheless, efforts were made to expand landowner participation in the program throughout Hays and Caldwell County. From February through June of 2019, Veracity Aviation conducted nine aerial gunning operations covering 9,030 acres of Caldwell and Hays County. Total hogs viewed = 111. Total hogs abated = 100. At a cost of \$3,844, the rate of return for aerial gunning in 2019 was \$38.44 per hog removed.

#### Additional Program Investments

Additional capital investment/ongoing program funding included FY2019 Wireless Traps service fees incurred by Caldwell and Hays County. Three Wireless Traps are currently in use through a local landowner cooperative support previously initiated efforts by the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force. Estimated total feral swine abated = 1,080

To bring new efficiencies and accuracies to abatement documentation efforts, the Meadows Center directed program funds to a 10.5 inch iPad Pro with WiFi and Cellular in 2018 to be piloted for future bounty efforts in Caldwell County. During several trials, it was determined that bounty participants much preferred paper recording; however, continued efforts will be made to incorporate this technology into the research and documentation process.

#### Surveys

To help quantify feral hog damage in the three-county Central Texas region, a voluntary landowner survey was completed by 27 participants (Appendix A – Landowner Survey). Participants were able to complete the survey in person during bounty claim opportunities or at their local Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices. The survey could also be completed online, which was the preferred choice in 2019! # INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT by and between CALDWELL COUNTY and TEXAS A&M AGRILIFE EXTENSION SERVICE

This Interlocal Agreement (hereafter termed "Agreement") is made pursuant to Chapter 791, Texas Government Code, *Interlocal Cooperation Contract*, and is entered into by and between the Caldwell County (hereafter referred to as "COUNTY"), a county within the State of Texas and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (hereafter referred to as "AGRILIFE EXTENSION"), a member of The Texas A&M University System, an agency of the State of Texas. COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION may be referred to herein individually as "Party" or collectively as the "Parties".

#### SECTION 1 PURPOSE

- 1.01 In accordance with H.B. No. 1, 86th Regular Legislative Session, 2019, (General Appropriations Act for the 2020-21 Biennium) Article III, page 241, rider 7, funds were appropriated to AGRILIFE EXTENSION for the Feral Hog Abatement Program (the "Program") to implement feral hog abatement technologies. As part of the Program, AGRILIFE EXTENSION shall use a portion of the appropriated funds to fund grants for county feral hog eradication projects in Texas.
- 1.02 AGRILIFE EXTENSION requested grant applications in support of the Program from Texas counties setting forth the County's proposed feral hog abatement eradication project (the "Project"). COUNTY has proposed to complete the Project as set out in the COUNTY's Application including a Description of Activities (collectively "Application") attached hereto as Attachment A and fully incorporated herein by reference.
- 1.03 AGRILIFE EXTENSION desires to have COUNTY complete the Project to accomplish the goals of responding and complying with the Program. Accordingly, AGRILIFE EXTENSION and COUNTY enter into this Agreement as follows:

#### SECTION 2 TERM

- 2.01 Fixed Term: This Agreement commences on October 1, 2020 and will terminate on August 31, 2021, unless cancelled according to section 2.02 of this Agreement.
- 2.02 Cancellation: This Agreement may be cancelled prior to the expiration of the Fixed Term or any Extension Term by either Party, upon thirty (30) calendar days written notice to the other Party, sent to the address indicated in Section 5.01 of this Agreement.

# SECTION 3 COUNTY OBLIGATIONS

- 3.01 Performance: COUNTY shall implement the feral hog abatement technologies as set out in the Application.
- 3.02 Subcontractors: Any delegation by the COUNTY to a subcontractor regarding any duties and responsibilities imposed by this Agreement must be approved in advance by AGRILIFE EXTENSION and shall not relieve the COUNTY of its responsibilities to AGRILIFE EXTENSION for its performance.
- 3.03 Progress Reports: COUNTY shall submit to AGRILIFE EXTENSION quarterly progress reports reflecting progress of work completed on the Project as well as financial progress.
- 3.04 Records: COUNTY must keep a separate bookkeeping account with a complete record of all expenditures relating to the Project. Project records shall be maintained by COUNTY for seven (7) years after the completion of the Project, or as otherwise agreed upon with AGRILIFE EXTENSION. AGRILIFE EXTENSION and the Texas State Auditor's Office ("State Auditor") reserve the right to examine all books, documents, records, and accounts relating to the Project at any time throughout the duration of the Agreement and for three years immediately following completion of the Project. If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit or other action is initiated prior to the expiration of the retention period, then the records must be retained until authorized by AGRILIFE EXTENSION. AGRILIFE EXTENSION and the State Auditor shall have access to the physical locations related to Project activities.
- 3.05 Audit: If the COUNTY has a financial audit performed during the time the COUNTY is receiving funds from AGRILIFE EXTENSION for the Project, upon request, AGRILIFE EXTENSION shall have access to information about the audit, including the audit transmittal letter, management letter, and any schedules in which the COUNTY's funds are included.
- 3.06 Compliance: At all times during the term of this Agreement, COUNTY must comply with Texas Government Code, Chapter 783, Uniform Grant and Contract Management, and the Uniform Grant Management Standards (UGMS) and 2 CFR Part 200.

## SECTION 4 COMPENSATION

4.01 Fee: This is a cost reimbursable Agreement. AGRILIFE EXTENSION agrees to pay COUNTY up to \$20,000 for performance of the Project. Payment shall be cost reimbursable based on actual costs incurred by COUNTY in accordance with the

Application but will not exceed \$20,000 total. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) days after receipt of invoice in accordance with Chapter 2251, Texas Government Code.

4.02 Invoices: COUNTY may submit cost reimbursable invoices to AGRILIFE EXTENSION quarterly, but in no event shall invoice be submitted any later than August 31, 2021. The invoice(s) must include sufficient detail and relevant supporting documentation. Backup detail may include, but is not limited to, documentation of personnel expenses, or copies of invoices. The combined amount of the invoices submitted by COUNTY may not exceed \$20,000. All invoices shall be submitted to the following address:

- 4.03 Payment Schedule: Up to 90% of the total grant award may be reimbursed provided the work for which payment is requested has been completed and proper documentation has been submitted. The remaining 10% will only be disbursed once all reporting requirements have been met, including, but not limited to, the final performance report.
- **4.04** Eligible Expenses: Generally, expenses that are necessary and reasonable for proper and efficient performance and administration of the Project are eligible. Examples of eligible expenditures include:
  - 1. Personnel costs, including salary and benefits related to temporary or event staff; grant funds may <u>not</u> be used to pay for existing employees in the performance of their day-to-day duties.
  - 2. Direct operating expenses that directly relate to Project activities; this may include facility rental or other workshop related expenses (note: meals, food, or beverages of any kind are not considered an eligible expense).
  - 3. Supplies that cost less than \$5,000, such as office supplies, printing services, and materials needed to accomplish the proposed Project.
  - 4. Vendor contracts (i.e. agreements made with a third-party to perform a portion of the Project services).
  - 5. Controlled assets, which are defined as certain items valued \$500.00 \$4,999.99 which must also be inventoried, see: <a href="https://fmx.cpa.texas.gov/fmx/pubs/spaproc/appendices/appa/index.php">https://fmx.cpa.texas.gov/fmx/pubs/spaproc/appendices/appa/index.php</a>.
  - 6. If grant funds are proposed by COUNTY to be used to fund bounty efforts, COUNTY must have a written policy implemented to prevent the intentional breeding and raising of feral hogs for the purpose of meeting bounty requirements. In addition, bounty-related grant fund reimbursement is limited to 50% of the bounty paid and a maximum of \$5.00 per feral hog.

- 4.05 Ineligible Expenses: Expenses prohibited by state or federal law or determined to be ineligible by Program guidelines will not be reimbursed. Examples of these ineligible expenditures include, but are not limited to the following:
  - 1. Alcoholic beverages;
  - 2. Entertainment;
  - 3. Contributions, charitable or political;
  - 4. Expenses falling outside of the contract period;
  - 5. Items not listed in the project budget or an approved amendment;
  - 6. Expenses that are not adequately documented;
  - 7. Travel, including but not limited to mileage reimbursement, meals and lodging; and
  - 8. Meals, food or beverage costs of any kind, including those associated with an educational workshop.
- 4.06 Non-expended grant funds: If COUNTY fails to incur cost reimbursable expenses in the amount specified in Paragraph 4.01 during the term of this Agreement and properly invoice for same in accordance with the terms hereof, COUNTY shall not be entitled to such unspent funds. Any unspent funds will remain with AGRILIFE EXTENSION.

# SECTION 5 MISCELLANEOUS

5.02 Force Majeure: Any and all duties, obligations, and covenants of this Agreement will be suspended during time of natural disaster, war, acts of terrorism, or other "Acts of God", which prevent a Party from fulfilling any and all duties, obligations, and/or covenants of this Agreement. If a Party is prevented from fulfilling a duty, obligation, and/or covenant

- of this Agreement, due to Force Majeure, the Party prevented from fulfilling will notify the other Party in writing, sent pursuant to Section 5.01 Agreement, within fourteen (14) calendar business days of the Force Majeure event.
- 5.03 Parties Relationship: Nothing in the Agreement should be construed as creating a partnership, joint venture, agency relationship, or any other relationship other than, between COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION.
- 5.04 Applicable Law: This Agreement is construed under and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas.
- 5.05 Cumulative Rights: All rights, options, and remedies contained in this Agreement and held by COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION are cumulative and the exercising of one will not exclude exercising another. COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION each have the right to pursue any remedy or relief which may be provided by law, in equity, or by the stipulations of this Lease.
- 5.06 Non-waiver: A waiver by either COUNTY or AGRILIFE EXTENSION, or both, of any obligation, duty, or covenant of this Agreement will not constitute a waiver of any other breach of any obligation, duty, or covenant of this Agreement.
- 5.07 *Counterparts*: This Agreement can be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which is declared an original.
- 5.08 Severability: If any clause of provision of this Agreement is illegal, invalid or unenforceable under present or future law, COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION intend that the remaining clauses or provisions of this Agreement will not be affected and will remain in full force and effect.
- 5.09 Entire Agreement: This Agreement contains the final and entire agreement between COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION, and will not be amended, explained, or superseded by any oral or written communications; unless done so in a subsequent, written, and mutually agreed upon amendment.
- 5.10 Successors and Assigns: All the obligations, duties, covenants, and rights contained in this Agreement and performable by COUNTY will be applicable and binding upon respective successors and assigns, including any successor by merger or consolidation; however, nothing in this provision shall be construed to be consent of Assignment of this Agreement.
- 5.11 Nondiscrimination: COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION, and their agents or employees, are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, sex, age, religion, national origin, or handicap, in the performance of the terms, conditions, covenants and obligations of this Agreement.

5.12 Dispute Resolution: Any dispute between COUNTY and AGRILIFE EXTENSION regarding this Agreement will be governed by Texas Government Code, Chapter 2009, Alternative Dispute Resolution for Use by Governmental Bodies, and any applicable Model Rules promulgated by the Office of the Attorney General, the State of Texas. Any notice of dispute tendered by COUNTY should be to Ralph Stevens, Director of Procurement, AGRILIFE EXTENSION.

#### Request for County Feral Hog Grant

#### Statement of Purpose

Pursuant to the Texas Legislature, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Wildlife Services (WS) program hereby requests applications for County Feral Hog Abatement Grants (Grant). The Grant program ("Program") is designed to encourage counties across the State of Texas to make a concentrated and coordinated effort to reduce the feral hog population and the damage caused by these animals throughout the year. Successful applicants will receive grants to initiate or continue feral hog abatement activities in their county. This document ("RFGA") sets forth Program requirements and procedures.

Current abatement methods in Texas vary depending on the geographic terrain and vegetation. WS recognizes that the responsibility for management rests with landowners and local constituents who know the surrounding land and waterways, as well as the potential challenges to combating feral hogs. Through this program, the highest ranking counties will receive assistance to continue local activities which may range from educating the landowners on abatement methods, coordinating trapping and hunting programs, conducting aerial gunning and addressing public safety hazards related to feral hogs.

#### Eligibility

To be eligible for an award under the Program, the applicant must be a Texas county. The county must have or develop a method to accurately track the number of feral hogs taken in the county as well as documentation for other provisions included in the application (e.g. receipts for purchases, trap loan numbers, etc.) for the eligible period September 1, 2020-August 31, 2021.

#### Grantee Responsibilities and Accountability

Selected Applicants (grantees) will be responsible for conducting a project supported by the Program and for achieving the results described in the application. Each grantee shall monitor the day-to-day performance of the grant project to assure adherence to statutes, regulations, and grant terms and conditions. The grantee must carry out the activities described in the approved scope of work.

The grantee will be accountable for documenting the use of grant funds and must ensure funds are used solely for authorized purposes. The grantee must ensure:

Funds are used only for activities covered by the approved project.

- Funds are not used in violation of the restrictions and prohibitions of applicable statutes and regulations.
- All budget and performance reports are completed in a timely manner.

Each grantee must ensure they have an adequate accounting system in place and good internal controls to ensure expenditures and reimbursements are reported and maintained for seven (7) years after the conclusion of the project.

# Funding Parameters

Awards are subject to the availability of funds. If funds are not appropriated or collected for this Program, applicants will be informed accordingly.

WS will make awards after all applications are processed. Grant funds will be available on a cost reimbursement basis for county use on feral hog abatement expenditures during the grant term. A total of \$100,000 is available. WS anticipates awarding up to 15 grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000 each. Applications will be reviewed through a competitive evaluation process.

Bounty programs may be included in a county's proposal, however WS will limit State funding of bounties to 50% of the amount actually paid out.

To receive grant funds, counties that are awarded Program grants must enter into a written agreement with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. Grant funds will be distributed on a reimbursement basis after awarded counties submit proof of allowable expenditures.

WS reserves the right to accept or reject any or all applications submitted. WS is under no legal or other obligation to execute a grant award on the basis of a response submitted to this RFGA.

Public announcements and written notifications will be made to all applicants and their affiliated agencies, organizations, or institutions. Favorable decisions will indicate the amount of award, duration of the grant, and any special conditions associated with the project.

# Term of Funding or Duration of Projects

A Notice of Grant Award is *unticipated* to be made in October 2020. However, it is the intention of the legislature that Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service continue to make available a level of funding similar to previous grants administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). Counties may have continued feral hog projects following the conclusion of the TDA program. Therefore, approved projects may claim expenditures which have occurred since September 1, 2020. Projects under this funding request must be completed by August 31, 2021. No expenditures incurred after August 31, 2021 will be reimbursed.

# Application Requirements

To be considered, applications must be complete and include all of the following information.

Grant Applications-Interested applicants must include all of the following information:

# A narrative including:

• County Information. This is the name and address for the county.

- Primary Program Contact. This is the individual who can answer questions about the county's activities and performance.
- Authorized Official. This is the person legally able to bind the county in contracts or agreements, generally the county judge.
- Previous Participation. For counties which participated in the Feral hog grant program, a copy of the final report is required.
- Description of Activities. Include information on:
  - Description of the proposed program including abatement activities supported or used;
  - ii. Type and number of county-sponsored education program(s) about feral hog abatement technologies proposed; and
  - iii. A proposed budget (total cost for educational and operational activities, county share of bounty if proposed);
- Certifications. The authorized official must sign the application.

# Evaluation and Selection Information

WS will conduct an administrative review to determine whether the applicant was responsive to the requirements of this RFGA. WS will take into consideration the status of any continuing project's progress.

Applications will be evaluated on the following criterion:

- The degree to which the proposal meets or supports established watershed or agricultural protection programs (a maximum of 30 points will be awarded to those county proposals which are consistent with watershed protection plans or agricultural protection programs).
- The estimated contribution of the proposal to removing feral hogs from the landscape (a maximum of 30 points will be awarded for aspects of the project which contribute to fewer hogs, including trap loan programs, aerial hunting contracts, equipment purchased for control and bounties. NOTE: WS will only reimburse counties 50% of actual bounties paid. Counties planning on bounty programs need to state the total bounty pool and the county commitment to the remaining 50%. Programs which remove feral hogs but contribute to perpetuation of hogs as a resource may not receive full points.)
- The number of landowner outreach events planned or conducted from September 1, 2020 through August 31, 2021 which include at least 1 hour of feral hog management topics, including biology, management strategies and damage assessment. We recognize that outreach in the current pandemic environment will be challenging and encourage applicants to develop adaptive and innovative outreach plans. Media articles, 4-H presentations and collaborations with schools may be included in outreach planning (a maximum of 5 points per event planned and 10 points per event conducted up to 20 points per application will be awarded).
- The degree to which the county project conducts a formalized damage and control assessment (a maximum of 10 points will be awarded if the county project records numbers of feral swine removed and up to 10 additional points will be recorded for a formalized county level damage assessment).

WS will include outside reviewers in evaluating proposals. County Primary Point of Contact may be queried during the evaluation process to clarify proposals.

# Successful Application Requirements

Reporting. Selected applicants will be required to submit periodic performance reports. Reporting timelines will be provided in the grant agreement. As part of WS's ongoing monitoring of grant funds, grantees must show both a strong progress of work completed on all projects as well as

financial progress. Failure to comply with reporting requirements may result in the withholding of a request for reimbursement and/or termination of the award.

# Budget Development Information.

- A. Payment. <u>Selected grantees will be paid on a cost reimbursement basis</u>. Grantees will be required to submit payment requests quarterly, but no more frequently than monthly in order to show significant financial and programmatic progress. Payment requests must include sufficient detail and supporting documentation. Backup detail may include, but is not limited to, documentation of personnel expenses, or copies of invoices.
- B. Payment Schedule. Up to 90% of the total grant award may be reimbursed provided the work for which payment is requested has been completed and proper documentation has been submitted. If grant funds are proposed to be used to fund bounty efforts, Grantee must have a written policy implemented to prevent the intentional breeding and raising of feral hogs for the purpose of meeting bounty requirements. Bounty-related grant fund reimbursement is limited to 50% of the bounty paid and a maximum of \$5.00 per feral hog.
- D. Ineligible Expenses. Expenses may be prohibited by state or federal law or determined to be ineligible by program guidelines. Examples of these expenditures include, but are not limited to the following:
  - 1. Alcoholic beverages;
  - 2. Entertainment:
  - 3. Contributions, charitable or political;
  - 4. Expenses failing outside of the contract period;
  - 5. Items not listed in the project budget or an approved amendment;
  - 6. Expenses that are not adequately documented;
  - 7. Travel, including but not limited to mileage reimbursement, meals and lodging; and
  - 8. Meals, food or beverage costs of any kind, including those associated with an educational workshop.

It is important to ensure that all costs meet the criteria, of allowable, allocable, and reasonable.

# General Information

Selected applicants will receive a Notice of Grant Award (NGA) letter and an official Grant Agreement from WS. The NGA is not legally binding until a grant agreement is fully executed.

Grantees must comply with WS's reporting requirements and financial procedures outlined
in the grant agreement. Any delegation by the Grantee to a subcontractor regarding any
duties and responsibilities imposed by the grant award must be approved in advance by
WS and shall not relieve the Grantee of its responsibilities to WS for their performance.

- 2. All grant awards are subject to the availability of funds appropriated and authorized by the Texas Legislature.
- Grantees must remain in full compliance with state and federal laws and regulations. Noncompliance may result in termination of the grant or ineligibility for reimbursement of expenses.
- 4. Grantees must keep a separate bookkeeping account with a complete record of all expenditures relating to the project. Records shall be maintained for seven (7) years after the completion of the project, or as otherwise agreed upon with WS. WS and the Texas State Auditor's Office (SAO) reserve the right to examine all books, documents, records, and accounts relating to the project at any time throughout the duration of the agreement and for three years immediately following completion of the project. If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit or other action is initiated prior to the expiration of the retention period, then the records must be retained until authorized by WS. WS and the SAO shall have access to the physical locations related to project activities.
- 5. If the Grantee has a financial audit performed during the time the Grantee is receiving funds from WS, upon request, WS shall have access to information about the audit, including the audit transmittal letter, management letter, and any schedules in which the Grantee's funds are included.

Caldwell County is requesting a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Wildlife Services (WS) program County Feral Hog Abatement Grant (grant) in the amount of \$20,000.

Grant funds will be used to develop stakeholder engagement programs, a new micro-grant program for landowners based on feedback from participants in the 2020 Caldwell County Feral Hog Management Webinar and to purchase supplies and equipment toward the goal of reducing the damage and extent of feral hog (Sus scrofa) activity in Caldwell County, Texas. This effort will be strengthened and enhanced by Caldwell County's participation in The Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force, a co-managed, regional feral hog abatement effort with cooperating counties including, Guadalupe and Hays. The grant will enable Caldwell County to take advantage of a regional communication network and share resources with partner counties while also implementing specific mitigation efforts designed for the cultural and land use priorities that make Caldwell County unique.

Caldwell County and its partners are not alone in suffering millions of dollars in damages to property and natural resources from feral hog activity. What sets Caldwell County and our partners apart, however, are the tools and experience each county possesses in grant management, stakeholder engagement and watershed protection that will serve to ensure grant funds achieve program goals. Four watershed protection plans (WPP) are currently being implemented in the three-county region: Cypress Creek WPP and Upper San Marcos River WPP (Hays); Plum Creek WPP (Hays-Caldwell); Geronimo-Alligator Creek WPP

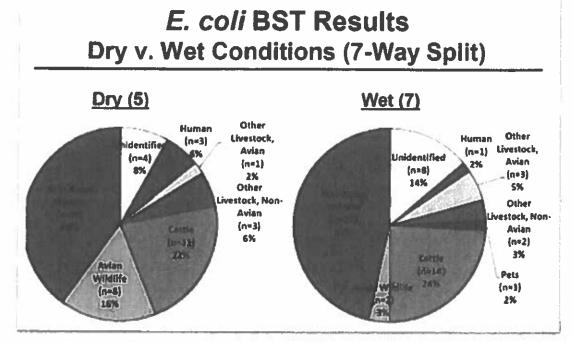


Figure 1. Results of 12-month Plum Creek Watershed, Bacterial Source Tracking Study (Wet versus Dry Canditions) completed by the Plum Creek Watershed Partnership, Hays-Blanco River Authority and the Texas A&M Soil and Aquatic Microbiologic Laboratory.

(Caldwell). Historic and ongoing impacts to water quality from feral hogs in these watersheds have been well documented. A 12-month Bacterial Source Tracking (BST) study completed for Plum Creek in 2018 demonstrated that non-avian wildlife was the most dominant source of *E. coli* throughout the watershed (Figure 1). Feral hogs are highly suspected to be the driver of wildlife *E. coli* in Plum Creek as well as Geronimo and Alligator Creeks in Guadalupe County due to their active population, biology and behavioral patterns that keep them close to the cool, vegetated riparian areas along streams. Each partner county in the proposed regional effort has successfully participated in feral hog management activities, most notable being Caldwell County's Feral Hog Task Force established in 2013, whose ongoing outreach, education and direct abatement efforts have led to the documented removal of over 16,000 feral hogs in Caldwell County and the Plum Creek Watershed.

The continued development of The Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force, a regional feral hog abatement program for Caldwell, Guadalupe and Hays County through this grant program will ensure the following deliverables: (1) a continuation of multifaceted feral hog management programs for partner counties; (2) a centralized website, <a href="www.feralhogtaskforce.com">www.feralhogtaskforce.com</a>, for sharing information about feral hog programs, tracking progress and announcing upcoming opportunities throughout the region with links to existing resources as well as dedicated pages for each partner county; (3) development and allocation

of shared resources for participating counties including: a <u>county-level damage assessment</u>, miscellaneous program forms (ex. landowner surveys, bounty participation forms, etc.); (4) <u>equipment sharing cooperatives (ex. remote operated traps)</u>; (5) <u>cost-sharing incentive programs (ex. trapping supplies)</u>; (6) coordinated educational programming including <u>webinars</u> AND <u>one county-based workshop for each partner county</u>; and (7) a dynamic social media campaign to enhance program success and expand program reach. Partner counties may also participate in <u>bounty programs</u> and <u>aerial hunting contracts</u>.

Public-private partnerships will serve as a catalyst for greater program impact by leveraging grant funds to expand projects and incentivize stakeholder ownership in the feral hog abatement effort.

Caldwell County and our cooperating partners, Guadalupe Co. and Hays Co., will work with county staff, AgriLife, Texas State University – Meadows Center for Water and the Environment, the Plum Creek Watershed Partnership, local business, NGOs and others to coordinate efforts and deliver feral hog abatement programs with a goal of the documented removal of 6.000 feral hogs throughout the region during the project period.

# PROJECT SUMMARY

The FY2014 Caldwell-Hays County Feral Hog Action Plan (Action Plan) provides directives for a dynamic approach to achieve significant reductions in damage caused by invasive, feral swine in Caldwell County and Hays County, Texas, through (1) operational and technical assistance to landowners, (2) financial incentives, and (3) professional services for direct control of feral hogs to abate impacts on agricultural resources, personal property, native wildlife, riparian habitat and water quality.

The Action Plan has been coordinated and administered by the Caldwell County Feral Hog Task Force (CCFHTF) to demonstrate a short duration (12-month), high intensity, two-county, landowner "cooperative" approach to feral hog management. Due to rapid growth rates demonstrated by feral swine and behavioral tendencies that tend to make individual control options more costly and less effective over time, a diverse and highly intensive program was intended to significantly reduce the feral hog population growth curve in the project area within one year, making long-term management of feral swine a real and feasible option for Caldwell County and Hays County, TX.

While the population of feral hogs in the project area remains unknown, numerous efforts are underway to quantify current and historic harvest rates and to determine the extent of agricultural property damage to the project area as a result of feral hog activities. It should be noted that over 1,100 hogs were confirmed to be harvested throughout the project area from October through December of 2012 as a result of Hog Out Activities; however, feral hog damage and sightings continued to be reported at a consistent and alarming rate throughout the project area in 2013. Motorist collisions with feral hogs in the project area were continuing to rise, putting travelers at risk. Water quality impacts from feral hog activity continue to be felt throughout the Plum Creek watershed.

Due to the variability of land type, population diversity and control measures available it was determined that a variety of programs should be implemented for the proposed Action Plan to have the desired effect on the overall feral hog population and to demonstrate environmental and property damage reductions. A critical component of the Action Plan is an educated and highly energized stakeholder base in the two-county project area as a result of years of outreach and education. This was clearly demonstrated by the broad support this application received in terms of significant financial contributions from 10 project partners, volunteer hours pledged by an additional 6 project partners and 24 total letters of support and/or financial assistance from businesses, agricultural groups, environmental groups, wildlife management associations, cities, counties and individual landowners.

# **PROJECT APPROACH / GOALS & OUTCOMES**

# **Professional Trapping Services**

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 500 feral hogs (\$30/hog)

- Total harvest: OGM CHAMP contract + OGM (private LOAs) = 326 feral hogs
- Harvest via OGM CHAMP contract (grand funds only) = 217 feral hogs (\$85.41/hog)
- OGM Reporting (private LOAs) = 109 feral hogs

Ortiz Game Management and Wildlife Development (OGM) conducted intensive feral hog trapping services for participating landowners from December 1, 2013 through March 31, 2013. Two public meetings of the CCFHTF were utilized to inform interested and concerned citizens about the services offered by OGM and to enroll participants. Individuals seeking help privately were also referred to OGM during the contract period. It was anticipated that OGM's efforts would be most beneficial to small acreage and suburban landowners in Hays and Caldwell County where hunting and large-scale landowner trapping are not realistic options; however, most abatement activities performed by OGM throughout the grant term were on rural areas in the Plum Creek and San Marcos River watersheds in Caldwell and Hays County. In total, OGM provided services for 8 primary landowners during the grant term, but efforts were also coordinated with neighboring landowners making the total impact significantly larger. Hunting and trapping operations were conducted on approximately 3,500 acres during the grant term.

## **Lessons Learned**

Landowner exposure to OGM's services and word-of-mouth advertising kept OGM in operation via private LOAs in both counties through August of 2014. While the actual feral hog harvest from professional trapping services did not meet the pre-project anticipated harvest, this component of the Action Plan was very popular among participating landowners and received much media exposure serving to enhance outreach efforts of the CCFHTF. The services provided by feral hog control professionals, like OGM, are broad with benefits including rapid response and the ability to apply controls in a variety of settings from urban to rural. In many cases, cost per hog may be higher than traditional landowner hunting/trapping methods; however, professionals are not hired to remove "cheap" hogs, typically responding to the needs of landowners experiencing tremendous damage from feral hogs without the means to effectively address the problem. OGM continues to partner with the CCFHT in a variety of ways including monthly reporting.

# **Aerial Control Services**

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 375 feral hogs (\$30/hog)

- Total Harvest: HToT CHAMP contract + HToT (private LOAs) + TWS = 736 feral hogs
- Harvest via HToT CHAMP contract (grant funds only) = 138 (\$59.42/hog)
- HToT Reporting (private LOAs) = 378
- Texas Wildlife Services (2 flights) = 220

Existing landowner agreements (LOAs) with Texas Wildlife Services (TWS) cover approximately 40,000 acres of the Plum Creek Watershed in Caldwell County. Plans to recommit landowners with existing agreements and expand into additional lands led to two TWS aerial control operations in the spring of

2014, which removed 220 feral hogs from the Plum Creek watershed. To enhance the effectiveness of aerial control from TWS, the Action Plan called for aerial operations to be conducted by a local company, Helicopter Tours of Texas (HToT), throughout FY2014. HToT provides rapid response with trained marksmen at a rate of \$750/hour which was covered 100% by CHAMP grant funds for participating landowners. HToT conducted 6 operations under the grant contract, removing 138 feral hogs for an average production rate of 12.5 hogs per hour. Flights conducted by HToT per private LOAs and through their sister nonprofit, Operation Dustoff, removed an additional 378 feral hogs from December 2013 through August 2014. Due to the success of aerial operations, increased landowner adoption of this control method and outreach efforts of the CCFHTF to support Operation Dustoff, aerial control operations were regularly conducted in the project area from December 2013 through August 2014.

#### Lessons Learned

The Action Plan was initially budgeted to provide funding for up to 15 flight hours from HToT which prior to CHAMP operations, held approximately 6,000 acres of LOAs in Caldwell County. HToT now operates on more than 10,000 acres in Caldwell County and supports Operation Dustoff, a nonprofit that provides opportunities for retired military veterans to put their superior marksmen skills to use in aerial feral hog control operations. Due to the success and funding for Operation Dustoff, the CHAMP contract with HToT was reduced to 11 hours with funds being transferred to support additional professional trapping services in Hays County.

The aerial control harvest production rate for contracted flights using CHAMP grant funds was lower than expected. At times HToT has reported harvest rates exceeding 50 hogs per hour; however, this can be affected by numerous variables, including time of year and other feral hog control activities in the project area. The harvest rate reported by TWS during their flights was also down from flights conducted on the same properties in 2010. It should be noted that TWS did report seeing some of the largest sounders of feral hogs that the pilot had ever witnessed, possibly exceeding 80 individuals.

As is the case with OGM, professionals are not hired to remove "cheap" hogs. HToT and its support of Operation Dustoff allow for rapid response in high-demand situations. HToT and Operation Dustoff continue to partner with the CCFHT in a variety of ways including monthly reporting.

# Feral Hog Round-Ups, Administration and Marketing

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 4,000 feral hogs (\$5.54/hog)

- Total Harvest: Bounty + Jackpot + landowner reporting = 4,060 feral hogs (\$4.66/hog)
- Bounties paid with CHAMP grant funds = 3,248
- Jackpot competition submissions = 241
- Voluntary landowner reporting = 571

Landowner incentives were anticipated to provide the greatest feral hog yield per dollar spent through implementation of the Action Plan and this was realized in a number of ways. A \$5/hog bounty was implemented throughout the project area for eligible landowners, hunters and trappers who completed a Caldwell-Hays Feral Hog Bounty Participation Form. \$11,650 was guaranteed to this program per the original application with anticipated landowner participation funds, vendor discounts and donations expecting to contribute an additional \$8,350. Marketing and administrative costs for the Action Plan

were included in this program, as well. After a budget revision, final funding for this program totaled \$18,920.

The bounty and jackpot programs were managed by the CCFHTF with all payments supervised by the Caldwell County Auditor. To be eligible to redeem the bounty, participants were required to provide biological evidence in the form of a feral hog tail. Six bounty claim stations throughout the project area staffed trained volunteers or employees to verify and safely dispose of the biological evidence and to collect information from participants on their feral hog harvest including contact information, location, harvest method, etc. Similar information was obtained to support an end-of-year August Jackpot Competition. Paid bounty and jackpot competition programs yielded 3,489 feral hogs over the 12-month grant period. Throughout the year, outreach efforts encouraged landowners to report feral hog data in the form of a survey. Harvest numbers from these surveys along with harvest data from *Log Your Hogs* campaign conducted in April 2014 total 571 feral hogs and are reflected in the above program totals under "voluntary landowner reporting".

## **Lessons Learned**

The CCFHTF approved 150 individuals to participate in the Caldwell-Hays feral hog bounty program. This number is more than triple the number of participants in the 2012 bounty program. The CCFHTF believes that extensive outreach, word-of-mouth, a \$3/hog increase in payments, and abundant media coverage all served to increase motivation and reflected participation. That being said, it is anticipated per survey findings, public meeting discussions and in-person conversations that there remains a significant amount of land in the project area not being managed for feral hogs as well as a significant number of individual that are not reporting their harvest numbers due to lack of awareness or lack of motivation. This is particularly apparent in Hays County, where much effort was put into outreach and marketing in the form of workshops, newspaper ads, articles, radio interviews, direct mail, email and even a "Hog Hunters Appreciation Brunch and Raffle" held in Kyle, TX. More study will be required to understand the significant differences in participation rates in Caldwell and Hays County.

# **Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program**

Preliminary CHAMP contract harvest goal = 960 feral hogs (\$23/hog)

Total Harvest not included here as it is dispersed among previously identified bounty and
voluntary reporting totals for the above "Feral Hog Round-Ups" program. Feral hogs trapped
using Cooperative Trapping Program equipment became the property of the landowner and
were therefore eligible for the \$5/hog bounty program. An estimate of total feral hogs
harvested specifically through this program based on landowner reporting is included below.

In an effort to increase the current feral hog harvest rate among landowners in the project area, a Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program was expanded. To increase this critical harvest rate, it was determined that greater participation along with either more traps or more effective methods would need to be employed by local hunters, trappers and landowners. This program was designed to enhance all of the above.

Caldwell County purchased its first "Smart Trap" system for this program with funds awarded through the TDA Hog Out County Grant in 2013. The Action Plan called for at least two additional systems to complete the program. The trapping mechanism is designed to be operated from a computer or smartphone with real-time images from the trapping location alerting the user when hogs are in the

trap. Participants had the ability to trigger the gate at their convenience and when a large number of hogs entered the trap. This reduces the number of "trained" or "trap-shy" feral hogs, with the ultimate goal to catch an entire sounder. Landowners wishing to use one of the available systems were required to fill out a Caldwell-Hays Feral Hog Survey and indicate that they have documented feral hog activity and a desire and ability to use the system. The CCFHTF managed the flow of trapping systems along with volunteers from a local business that pledged their support to help move traps throughout the project area when needed. Trapping systems were made available to participating landowners on a month-to-month basis. Smart traps were utilized by 12 landowners and/or property managers on 12 separate properties over the course of the CHAMP grant project period with an estimated total harvest determined to be 252 feral hogs with 187 trapped in Caldwell County and 65 in Hays County.

### Lessons learned

#### Smart Traps

Many of the hogs captured in Smart Traps were submitted via the bounty program so numbers from the Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program are not included in the overall project total to prevent the possibility of over reporting. Further, determining cost per hog through this program is a difficult task. The initial expectation of 960 feral hogs at \$23/hog did not consider depreciation and residual capital value on equipment purchases. Assuming 75% residual value in grant-purchased equipment, cost per feral hog harvested in Smart Traps over the project period could be estimated at \$18.18/hog.

While the large majority of participating landowners enjoyed the Smart Trap systems and associated technology, the original projected harvest of 960 feral hogs through the *Landowner Cooperative Trapping Program* far exceeded actual harvest numbers. To address this, several new trapping strategies were incorporated throughout the project period based on landowner/CCFHTF/professional collaboration.

- 1. In some cases, as soon as landowners set up a trap, hogs "disappeared" from their property for an extended period with nothing being viewed on the system's camera for more than a month. Other times, trap-shy hogs would avoid entering the trap or move in and out so quick that participants were not able to engage the door. To increase the effectiveness of the traps, the CCFHTF modified a first-come-first-served approach to issuing traps to a first-come-first-served <a href="If-you can verify current feral hog activity by CCFHTF-issued game cameras or other evidence collected by the participant.">If-you can verify current feral hog activity by CCFHTF-issued game cameras or other evidence collected by the participant.</a>
- It was decided that when single, large boars entered the trap, participants should engage the door and remove the boar as these individuals may tend to keep smaller boars, sows and younger pigs from entering a food plot.

When landowners were "lucky", however, large numbers of feral hogs entered the trap on the first night. Over 50 hogs were removed from one 350 acre property in 30 days using a 30' corral smart trap. The largest one-time catch was a 29-hog sounder in northern Caldwell County. At \$200 per year in anticipated negative economic impact per hog, that was a \$5,800 night. The Smart Traps have proven to be low-maintenance, durable and relatively easy to move. Two traps continue to be operated in Caldwell County and one trap will operate in Hays County.

## 40' Drop Net

In addition to the state-of-the-art trapping systems, the Action Plan called for the purchase of a 40' magnetic drop net, which was made available to participating hunters, trappers and landowners through a similar cooperative process managed by the CCFHTF. This program was tested in the field by a landowner with assistance from OGM but there was very little interest in this tool from local landowners

due to a lack of familiarity of the equipment and labor intensity of the setup process. This program was discontinued and the CCFHTF has decided to sell the drop net and apply proceeds toward future feral hog management efforts.

## Participant donations

To encourage participation in CHAMP programs and encourage the utilization of new and different feral hog management strategies, the CCFHTF did not require deposits or fees from local hunters, trappers and landowners with interest in available programs. Rather, participants benefitting from aerial control, professional trapping services, or other *Landowner Cooperative* programs were asked to donate what they could to offset CCFHTF costs and provide funds for future programs. The majority of participants initially stated that they would be happy to donate to the effort; however, only a handful actually contributed. A total of \$1,000 in landowner contributions from 5 separate landowners were received by the Task Force over the project period.

# **PROJECT RESULTS**

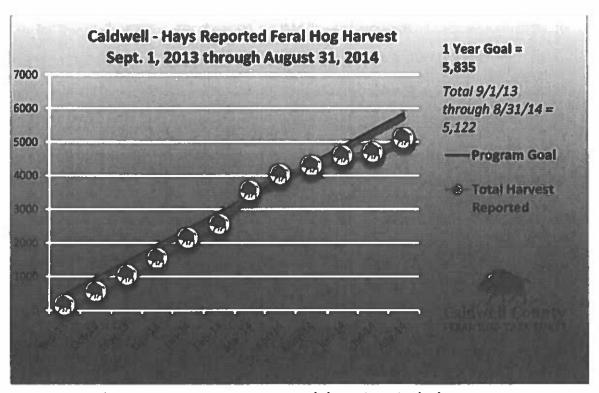


Figure 1. Caldwell-Hays Reported Feral Hog Harvest 9/1/2013 through 8/31/2014

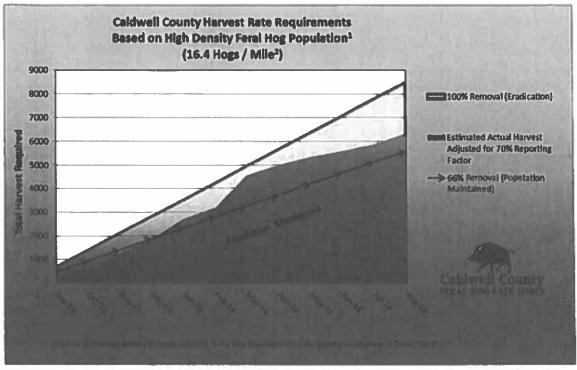


Figure 2. Caldwell County Estimated 1-year Feral Hog Harvest for Population Maintenance/Reduction

While overall project harvest numbers fell just below preliminary harvest goals (see Figure 1), the 1-year Caldwell County harvest rate may be unprecedented in terms of large-scale feral hog management (see Figure 2). Based on the highest average feral hog population density study utilized by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service for their 2012 publication, Feral Hog Population: Growth, Density and Harvest in Texas, (16.4 hogs/mile²) and considering a 70% reporting rate established by project surveys, public meeting discussions and personal interviews, it is believed that the 1-year harvest rate for the entire Caldwell County feral hog population may have reached 70% over the project period.

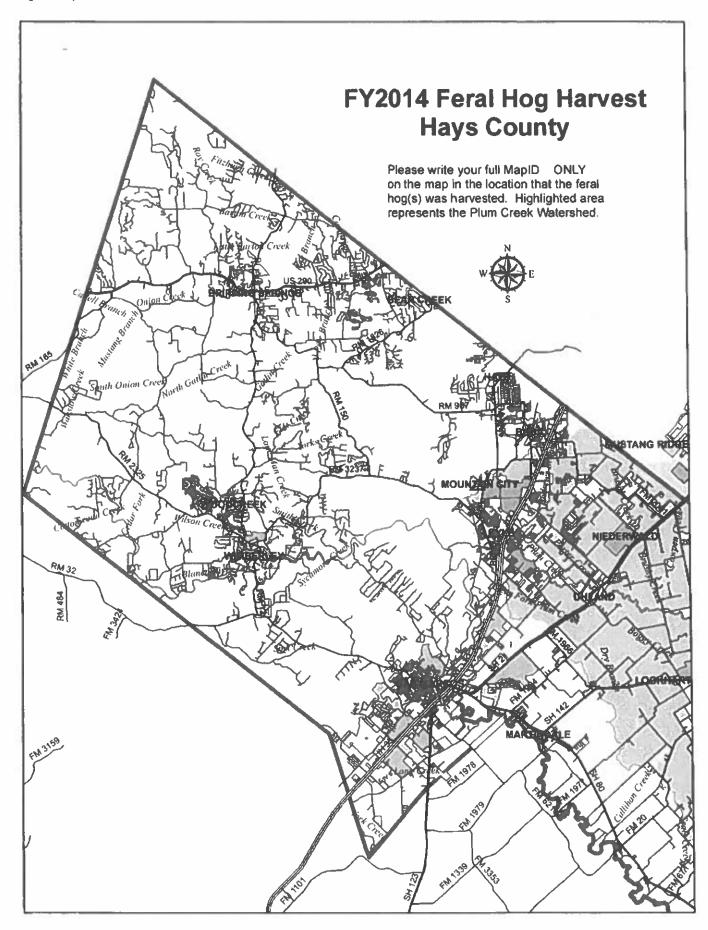

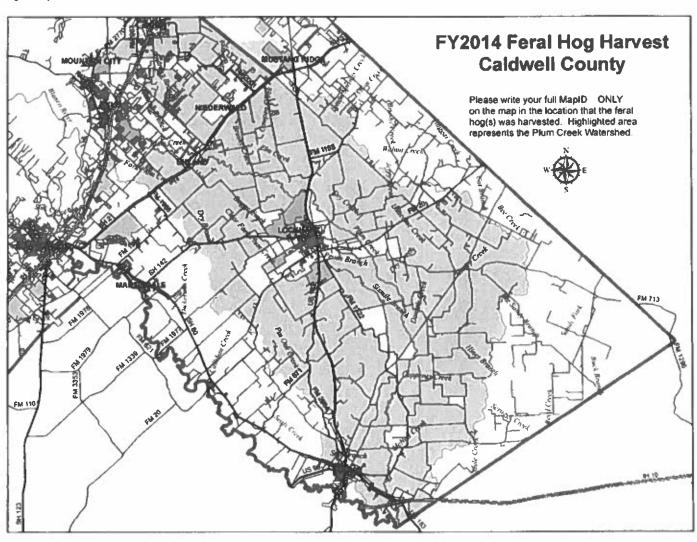

Caldwell County CHOMP-15-04 Grant funds the continued implementation of the Caldwell County Feral Hog Action Plan as amended and managed by the Caldwell County Feral Hog Task Force (CCFHTF), a volunteer-led Task Force designated by the Caldwell County Commissioner's Court through Resolution 16-2013, passed and adopted on May 28, 2013. Project components funded by CHOMP-15-04 include landowner cooperative cost-share and/or lease programs for the purchase of new feral hog traps and equipment, cellular game cameras and professional aerial control time. Funds also support a countywide feral hog bounty program.

- 2 feral hog bounty claims during reporting period with a total of 39 participants
- 12 aerial operations performed in Caldwell County on 12 separate properties during the reporting period removing 330 feral swine. Average cost / hog = \$18.18

# Trapping supplies - participant cost-share program (\$3,000)

### COMPLETE

The CCFHTF purchased \$3,000 in supplies for 20 new corral traps installed throughout the County.

# Cellular trail cameras (Prior - \$3,500 / Per this request - \$2,500)

#### COMPLETE

The CCFHTF purchased 16 wireless adapters for use with a variety of Moultrie game cameras. These supplies are directed to the more serious feral hog trappers in the county and landowners that reside in adjacent counties. Cellular trail cameras allow standard corral and cage traps to remain engaged and monitored daily without the need to physically drive to the location. These cameras will save users' fuel cost and allow traps to be baited and run continuously without having to consider in-person daily monitoring.

Through a partnership with Smith Supply, the wireless adapters are purchased at wholesale cost which allowed for the expansion of this program from 10 to 16 devices while also reducing the budgeted amount. Additionally, the adapters are mobile and can be installed on a variety of Moultrie trail camera models enabling participants to select one or more combinations to best suit their needs.

Program run through partnership with Smith Supply locations in Lockhart and Luling.
 Vendor delays led to an extension request for this grant program. Eligible participants receive a free wireless adapter (retail value \$200) with the purchase of a wireless-capable Moultrie trail camera from Smith Supply. Participants are responsible for cellular/data plans.

# Countywide Bounty Program (Prior - \$12,500 / Per this request - \$13,500)

#### COMPLETE

- Two bounty claims managed by CCFHTF volunteers and paid by the County Auditor
- Offered 50# bags of corn as bonus to \$5/hog bounty
- Total bounty participants = 39
- Total pounds of corn distributed to participants = 4,100
- Total bounty claims submitted = 761 feral hogs

NOTE: An adjusted increase of \$1,000 to the "Other" budget category was required to cover bounty cost. This led to a \$1,000 reduction in the "Supplies" budget category.

# Professional aerial gunning services - landowner cost-share program (\$6,000)

# COMPLETE

The CCFHTF provided \$500 per participant to 12 landowners seeking professional aerial eradication services from an approved aerial gunning service provider. The funds offset costs for local landowners and provided incentives for new participants who have not before utilized this proven method for feral hog abatement.

- 330 feral hogs harvested at an average cost / hog = \$18.18
- 9 hours of flight time for an average of 36.7 hogs / hour

#### Final Report: 2018 Central Texas Feral Hog Action and Sustainability Plan

The Meadows Center for Water and the Environment at Texas State University has partnered with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, local stakeholder groups and the counties of Hays, Caldwell and Guadalupe to establish the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force.

#### **Funding**

Fiscal Year 2018 funding for this effort was secured through participating County Commissioner's Courts and separate grant contracts awarded to the three participating counties:

- Hays County ILA = \$7,850
- Caldwell County ILA = \$12,000
- Guadalupe County ILA = \$15,000
- Local matching funds = \$2,597.50
- TOTAL FUNDS = \$37,447.50

# **Bounty Program**

Due to the limited timeframe for fund expenditure, primary abatement efforts took place over just a two-month period, July and August 2018. Total documented feral hog abatement through county-implemented bounty programs over this period included the removal of **1,039 feral swine** in the three-county region.

# Trapping Kits

Capital investment for ongoing and future feral hog abatement was also a top priority to establish program sustainability. Investment in direct landowner assistance through the development of an incentive-based program to distribute trapping kits to engaged landowners will enhance feral hog management on numerous properties throughout the three-county region. As a result of this program,



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twenty-seven new feral hog corrol traps will be activated in the region with an anticipated annual abatement capacity of **1,350** feral swine. The following trapping supplies were purchased and distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force:

#### Landowner Trapping Kits Distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force - FY2018

- Hays County = 2 kits (t-posts, panels, 40" door) valued at \$609 each
- Caldwell County = 9 kits (t-posts, panels and 40" door) valued at \$528 each
- Guadalupe County = 16 kits (16 gift cards for selected trapping supplies) valued at \$500 each

# Additional Program Investments

Additional capital investment/ongoing program funding included FY2018 Wireless Traps service fees incurred by Caldwell and Hays County. Three Wireless Traps currently in use through a local landowner cooperative support previously initiated efforts by the Caldwell County Feral Hog Task Force and Hays County.

To bring new efficiencies and accuracies to abatement documentation efforts, the Meadows Center directs program funds to a 10.5 inch iPad Pro with WiFi and Cellular to be piloted for future bounty efforts in Caldwell County.

#### Surveys

To help quantify feral hog damage in the three-county Central Texas region, a voluntary landowner survey was completed by 29 participants (Appendix A – Landowner Survey). An aerial survey was also completed to assess feral hog impacts on local streams. The aerial survey was conducted via helicopter on August 20, 2018, by Meadows Center and AgriLife staff and included Geronimo Creek (full reach) and a segment of the Guadalupe River in Guadalupe County as well as segments of Plum Creek and the San Marcos River in southern Caldwell County. Due to heavy canopy and limited visibility, the aerial survey was scratched for additional stream segments in Caldwell County and Hays County. Five feral hogs were spotted on the Guadalupe River, two miles downstream from the confluence with Geronimo Creek. Individual feral hogs were also spotted on Geronimo Creek and the San Marcos River upstream of the confluence with Plum Creek. While approximately ten traps and feeders were identified in the survey segments, the total number of hogs spotted from the air was <10 individuals over two hours of flight time, which should be considered a drastic under representation of the actual feral hog population active along these stream segments. Further aerial analysis and landowner surveys during FY2019 (minimal canopy for aerial observations in Jan. and Feb.) should be completed to better quantify feral hog impacts to local streams.

## Outreach and Education

The Meadows Center worked with state and local AgriLife staff, watershed protection groups and other stakeholders to advertise and conduct two landowner workshops (see Appendix B – Press Releases, Workshop Agendas and Sign-in Sheets). A total of 47 attendees (non-presenters) received three hours of education on feral hog history, biology and management for a total of 141 direct contact hours.

Finally, to bring all Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force program information together under one roof, the Meadows Center has established a website, new email inbox and Facebook event pages for the program. Participant contact information collected throughout program implementation will also be used as part of a dynamic database for enhanced future communication. #### Sustainability

Each Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force partner county will continue abatement efforts in FY2019 with a goal of 6,000 feral swine to be removed throughout the region over this period. Investments in equipment, technology and communication networks will enable continued monitoring and increased landowner participation.

# Final Report: 2019 Central Texas Feral Hog Action and Sustainability Plan

The Meadows Center for Water and the Environment at Texas State University has partnered with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, local stakeholder groups and the counties of Hays, Caldwell and Guadalupe (no grant funds for FY2019) to continue development of the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force.

# **Funding**

Fiscal Year 2019 funding for this effort was secured through participating County Commissioner's Courts and separate grant contracts awarded to the three participating counties:

- Hays County ILA w/ AgriLife = \$13,100
- Caldwell County ILA w/ AgriLife = \$20,000
  - Caldwell Co. matching funds = \$5,000.00
- Guadalupe County funds (bounty only) = \$3,530

# FY2019 Program Totals

- TOTAL FUNDS = \$41,630.00
- TOTAL FERAL SWINE ABATED = 4,607 (\$9.04 per hog)
- ESTIMATED 2019 PROPERTY/ECOLOGICAL DAMAGE MITIGATED = \$2,303,500 (ROI = \$55.33)

# **Bounty Program**

The bounty program in Caldwell County began in March 2019 with monthly collection events held at Smith Supply in Lockhart, TX, with support from the Plum Creek Watershed Partnership and trained Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force volunteers. Grant funding of \$5,000 was budgeted for the program but limited to 50% reimbursement, so Caldwell County Commissioners approved an additional \$5,000 in matching funds to cover 2,000 bounties at \$5.00 per verified feral hog extirpated from the County. Initial bounty funds were exhausted during the July collection event, but the County approved additional funds to keep the program funded. Prior to August reporting, 2,071 feral swine were reported for the Caldwell



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County Bounty Program. Guadalupe County ran a bounty program strictly from local funding approved by County Commissioners. The program was conducted out of the Guadalupe County extension office and yielded 706 feral swine. No bounty program was conducted in Hays County. Total documented feral hog abatement through county-implemented bounty programs over this period included the removal of **2,777 feral swine** in the three-county region.

# Trapping Kits

Capital investment for ongoing and future feral hog abatement was also a top priority to establish program sustainability. Investment in direct landowner assistance through the development of an incentive-based program to distribute trapping kits to engaged landowners will enhance feral hog management on numerous properties throughout the three-county region. As a result of this program, thirteen new feral hog corral traps will be activated in the region with an anticipated annual abatement capacity of 650 feral swine. The following trapping supplies were purchased and distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force:

# <u>Landowner Trapping Kits Distributed through the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force - FY2019</u>

- Hays County = 6 kits (t-posts, panels, 36" door) valued at \$598 each
- Caldwell County = 7 kits (t-posts, panels and 36" door) valued at \$400 each

# Aerial Gunning

Aerial gunning was conducted by pilots and trained marksmen with Veracity Aviation, based out of Seguin, TX. As grant funds were not available until January 2019, contracts could not be acquired with Veracity until mid-February, which in 2019, meant thicker canopy and less effective timing for aerial gunning. Nevertheless, efforts were made to expand landowner participation in the program throughout Hays and Caldwell County. From February through June of 2019, Veracity Aviation conducted nine aerial gunning operations covering 9,030 acres of Caldwell and Hays County. Total hogs viewed = 111. Total hogs abated = 100. At a cost of \$3,844, the rate of return for aerial gunning in 2019 was \$38.44 per hog removed.

# Additional Program Investments

Additional capital investment/ongoing program funding included FY2019 Wireless Traps service fees incurred by Caldwell and Hays County. Three Wireless Traps are currently in use through a local landowner cooperative support previously initiated efforts by the Central Texas Feral Hog Task Force. Estimated total feral swine abated = 1,080

To bring new efficiencies and accuracies to abatement documentation efforts, the Meadows Center directed program funds to a 10.5 inch iPad Pro with WiFi and Cellular in 2018 to be piloted for future bounty efforts in Caldwell County. During several trials, it was determined that bounty participants much preferred paper recording; however, continued efforts will be made to incorporate this technology into the research and documentation process.

# Surveys

To help quantify feral hog damage in the three-county Central Texas region, a voluntary landowner survey was completed by 27 participants (Appendix A – Landowner Survey). Participants were able to complete the survey in person during bounty claim opportunities or at their local Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices. The survey could also be completed online, which was the preferred choice in 2019! # Outreach and Education

The Meadows Center worked with state and local AgriLife staff, watershed protection groups and other stakeholders to advertise and conduct education during "Hog Week" 2019. #### Dear County and City Leaders:

Thank you for your continued work to combat the coronavirus and address the ancillary effects of that fight in your communities. These are tremendously difficult times for all Texans. Please know that the elected representatives in your state government are working continuously to protect the health and safety of this state, mitigate the economic ramifications of COVID-19, and build a path towards recovery.

As you are keenly aware, Congress passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act to provide much needed resources to help governments, businesses, and individuals respond to the current pandemic. President Trump signed the CARES Act into law and his administration continues to provide guidance on the numerous avenues of federal funding the legislation provides. Within the CARES Act, the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) was created to provide financial resources to state and local governments. As it relates to the CRF, Texas has received approximately \$11.24 billion from the United States Department of Treasury (Treasury) for direct coronavirus related expenses based on the funding formula provided in the CARES Act.

Consistent with the CARES Act, 45 percent of the total \$11.24 billion state allocation—approximately \$5.06 billion—will be made available to local governments. Of that \$5.06 billion, Treasury has directly sent just over \$3.2 billion to the six cities and 12 counties in Texas with a population greater than 500,000. That leaves approximately \$1.85 billion that the state can make available to the cities and counties in the rest of the state.

#### Counties below 500,000 population and the Cities within them

The 242 counties, and each of the cities within those counties, that did not receive direct allocations from Treasury are eligible to apply to the state for a per capita allocation from the \$1.85 billion. Cities with a population less than 500,000 located in counties with a population exceeding 500,000 are addressed later in this letter. County allocations will be calculated based on the population in the unincorporated areas of the county. We encourage cities and counties to work together to address expenses that cross jurisdictional lines.

The first allocation from the \$1.85 billion in local funds will be made available to these cities and counties on a \$55 per capita allotment. Twenty percent of each jurisdiction's allocation will be available immediately upon certification to the State that grant terms will be followed. Importantly, Treasury has provided strict guidelines for local governments to receive funds. Treasury affirmed that the State can transfer funds to local governments "provided that the transfer qualifies as a necessary expenditure incurred due to the public health emergency and meets the other criteria of section 601(d) of the Social Security Act. Such funds would be subject to recoupment by the Treasury Department if they have not been used in a manner consistent with section 601(d) of the Social Security Act." Treasury has also instructed that "funds may not be used to fill shortfalls in government revenue to cover expenditures that would not otherwise qualify as an eligible expenditure." Also, all costs must be incurred before December 30, 2020, to qualify for funding.

Once jurisdictions provide documentation on the initial funding, they will then be able to access the remainder of their allocation on a reimbursement basis. The unallocated funds will be reserved for local expenses as future outbreaks and the long-term impacts of COVID-19 are better known.

## Cities below 500,000 population within Countles exceeding 500,000 population

The direct Treasury disbursements to the 12 counties were calculated based on their population, less the total population inside cities larger than 500,000 that reside within those counties. In the same way that cities and counties across the rest of the state will be provided funding on a per capita basis, and are encouraged to work together to address expenses that cross jurisdictional lines, the 12 counties that received direct funding from Treasury based on the total number of residents in their counties (excluding those in the six largest cities) are expected to use their funds to address expenses incurred by incorporated areas with a population less than 500,000 that are located in those counties as well as the needs of residents in unincorporated areas of those counties. Each of the incorporated areas located in a county that received a direct allocation from Treasury should seek funding for COVID-19 expenses directly from that county.

#### How to Apply

The Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) will administer the reimbursement process for the CRF. TDEM is partnering with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension to provide individual assistance to each of you throughout the process, and that work is already underway. #### Coronavirus Relief Fund Guidance for State, Territorial, Local, and Tribal Governments April 22, 2020

The purpose of this document is to provide guidance to recipients of the funding available under section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"). The CARES Act established the Coronavirus Relief Fund (the "Fund") and appropriated \$150 billion to the Fund. Under the CARES Act, the Fund is to be used to make payments for specified uses to States and certain local governments; the District of Columbia and U.S. Territories (consisting of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands); and Tribal governments.

The CARES Act provides that payments from the Fund may only be used to cover costs that-

- 1. are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19);
- were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 (the date of enactment of the CARES Act) for the State or government; and
- were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020, and ends on December 30, 2020.<sup>1</sup>

The guidance that follows sets forth the Department of the Treasury's interpretation of these limitations on the permissible use of Fund payments.

#### Necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency

The requirement that expenditures be incurred "due to" the public health emergency means that expenditures must be used for actions taken to respond to the public health emergency. These may include expenditures incurred to allow the State, territorial, local, or Tribal government to respond directly to the emergency, such as by addressing medical or public health needs, as well as expenditures incurred to respond to second-order effects of the emergency, such as by providing economic support to those suffering from employment or business interruptions due to COVID-19-related business closures.

Funds may not be used to fill shortfalls in government revenue to cover expenditures that would not otherwise qualify under the statute. Although a broad range of uses is allowed, revenue replacement is not a permissible use of Fund payments.

The statute also specifies that expenditures using Fund payments must be "necessary." The Department of the Treasury understands this term broadly to mean that the expenditure is reasonably necessary for its intended use in the reasonable judgment of the government officials responsible for spending Fund payments.

Costs not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020

The CARES Act also requires that payments be used only to cover costs that were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020. A cost meets this requirement if either (a) the cost cannot lawfully be funded using a line item, allotment, or allocation within that budget or (b) the cost

is for a substantially different use from any expected use of funds in such a line item, allotment, or allocation.

The "most recently approved" budget refers to the enacted budget for the relevant fiscal period for the particular government, without taking into account subsequent supplemental appropriations enacted or other budgetary adjustments made by that government in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency. A cost is not considered to have been accounted for in a budget merely because it could be met using a budgetary stabilization fund, rainy day fund, or similar reserve account.

Costs incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020, and ends on December 30, 2020

A cost is "incurred" when the responsible unit of government has expended funds to cover the cost.

#### Nonexclusive examples of eligible expenditures

Eligible expenditures include, but are not limited to, payment for:

- 1. Medical expenses such as:
  - COVID-19-related expenses of public hospitals, clinics, and similar facilities.
  - Expenses of establishing temporary public medical facilities and other measures to increase COVID-19 treatment capacity, including related construction costs.
  - Costs of providing COVID-19 testing, including serological testing.
  - Emergency medical response expenses, including emergency medical transportation, related to COVID-19.
  - Expenses for establishing and operating public telemedicine capabilities for COVID-19related treatment.
- 2. Public health expenses such as:
  - Expenses for communication and enforcement by State, territorial, local, and Tribal governments of public health orders related to COVID-19.
  - Expenses for acquisition and distribution of medical and protective supplies, including
    sanitizing products and personal protective equipment, for medical personnel, police officers,
    social workers, child protection services, and child welfare officers, direct service providers
    for older adults and individuals with disabilities in community settings, and other public
    health or safety workers in connection with the COVID-19 public health emergency.
  - Expenses for disinfection of public areas and other facilities, e.g., nursing homes, in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.
  - Expenses for technical assistance to local authorities or other entities on mitigation of COVID-19-related threats to public health and safety.
  - Expenses for public safety measures undertaken in response to COVID-19.
  - Expenses for quarantining individuals.
- Payroll expenses for public safety, public health, health care, human services, and similar employees whose services are substantially dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

- Expenses of actions to facilitate compliance with COVID-19-related public health measures, such as:
  - Expenses for food delivery to residents, including, for example, senior citizens and other vulnerable populations, to enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
  - Expenses to facilitate distance learning, including technological improvements, in connection with school closings to enable compliance with COVID-19 precautions.
  - Expenses to improve telework capabilities for public employees to enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
  - Expenses of providing paid sick and paid family and medical leave to public employees to enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
  - COVID-19-related expenses of maintaining state prisons and county jails, including as relates
    to sanitation and improvement of social distancing measures, to enable compliance with
    COVID-19 public health precautions.
  - Expenses for care for homeless populations provided to mitigate COVID-19 effects and enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
- Expenses associated with the provision of economic support in connection with the COVID-19 public health emergency, such as:
  - Expenditures related to the provision of grants to small businesses to reimburse the costs of business interruption caused by required closures.
  - Expenditures related to a State, territorial, local, or Tribal government payroll support program.
  - Unemployment insurance costs related to the COVID-19 public health emergency if such
    costs will not be reimbursed by the federal government pursuant to the CARES Act or
    otherwise.
- 6. Any other COVID-19-related expenses reasonably necessary to the function of government that satisfy the Fund's eligibility criteria.

#### Nonexclusive examples of ineligible expenditures<sup>3</sup>

The following is a list of examples of costs that would not be eligible expenditures of payments from the Fund.

- 1. Expenses for the State share of Medicaid.3
- 2. Damages covered by insurance.
- Payroll or benefits expenses for employees whose work duties are not substantially dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

The prohibition on payment for abortions does not apply to an abortion if the pregnancy is the result of an act of rape or incest; or in the case where a woman suffers from a physical disorder, physical injury, or physical illness, including a life-endangering physical condition caused by or arising from the pregnancy itself, that would, as certified by a physician, place the woman in danger of death unless an abortion is performed. Furthermore, no government which receives payments from the Fund may discriminate against a health care entity on the basis that the entity does not provide, pay for, provide coverage of, or refer for abortions.

- 4. Expenses that have been or will be reimbursed under any federal program, such as the reimbursement by the federal government pursuant to the CARES Act of contributions by States to State unemployment funds.
- 5. Reimbursement to donors for donated items or services.
- 6. Workforce bonuses other than hazard pay or overtime.
- 7. Severance pay.
- 8. Legal settlements.

Good Afternoon County Judges,

Many of you have recently received a letter from Governor Abbott's office about the disbursal of funding from the CARES Act to local governments. Our office wanted to send along some recap information as we know it now. Below is also the original press release from Gov. Abbott's office.

- To see a copy of the original letter sent to counties, please click here.
- Funds are being distributed through Texas Department of Emergency Management. Their website with informational items and forms is <u>here</u>.
- <u>Jurisdiction Eligibility</u>: The CARES ACT mandated that the US Treasury provide direct payments to cities/counties with populations over 500,000. That included 12 of Texas's largest counties and the cities of Houston, Austin, San Antonio, Dallas, Ft. Worth and El Paso. Full list <u>here</u>. An additional \$1.85 Billion was set aside to be allocated to other cities/countles that fall below the 500,000 population cutoff.
- <u>Funding Levels</u>: The \$1.85B will be distributed based on population at \$55 per capita. Eligible cities/counties will get an immediate distribution of 20% of their allocation with the rest being allocated through reimbursement when need is shown. Exact number breakdowns for individual areas are here.
- How To Apply: Applications are found here and can be filled out by County Judges and City Mayors. Once
  downloaded and completed, they can be emailed to <u>CRF@TDEM.texas.gov</u>. This must be done before any

jurisdiction will receive their initial 20% allotment. We highly recommend submitting these forms as soon as possible.

#### Three Important Notes

- In a number of cases for our district, both cities and countles will need to apply individually to access the full range of funds.
- As part of the fund dispersal process, jurisdictions will need to show that expenses were incurred before December 30, 2020.
- Eligible Expenditures: The CARES Act included specific regulations for what expenses are eligible for funding. More information on that and specific examples can be found here.

#### Federal Background Information

Answers to commonly asked questions for the state and local government portion of the CARES ACT are here.

#### Governor Abbott, Lt. Governor Patrick, Speaker Bonnen, Senate Finance, House Appropriations Committee Chairs Announce Federal Funding For Local Jurisdictions

AUSTIN - Governor Greg Abbott, Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick, House Speaker Dennis Bonnen, Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, Vice Chair Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, and House Appropriations Committee Chair Giovanni Capriglione and Vice Chair Oscar Longoria today <u>sent a letter</u> to city and county leaders announcing \$5.06 billion in funding available to local governments in Texas through the Coronavirus Ald, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Of this \$5.06 billion, the U.S. Department of Treasury has directly sent over \$3.2 billion to the 6 cities and 12 counties in Texas with a population greater than 500,000. The remaining \$1.85 billion will be available to other cities and counties throughout the state. Funding will go towards reimbursement of direct expenses incurred by cities and counties due to COVID-19.

The 242 countles, and the cities within those countles, that did not receive direct allocations from the Treasury are eligible to apply to the state for a \$55 per capita allocation from the \$1.85 billion. Upon execution of a grant agreement, governments will be able to immediately draw down 20% to their allocation. After those jurisdictions provide documentation on the initial funding, they will then be able to access the remainder of their allocation on a reimbursement basis. The unallocated funds will be reserved for local expenses as future outbreaks and the long-term impacts of COVID-19 are better known. In

the letter, the leaders encourage cities and counties to work together to address expenses that cross jurisdictional lines.

"All Texans expect government to work in a unified fashion to address this unprecedented situation, and we will continue to do so," reads the letter. "Thank you again for your work on behalf of your residents. These are tremendously difficult times for all Texans. Please know that the elected representatives in your state government are working continuously to protect the health and safety of this state, mitigate the economic ramifications of COVID-19, and build a path towards recovery."

The Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) will administer the reimbursement process and will partner with Texas A&M Agrillife Extension to provide individual assistance to each city and county throughout the process. #### CONSULTANT SERVICES AGREEMENT

This CONSULTANT SERVICES AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") between Caldwell County, whose address is Caldwell County Courthouse, 110 South Main Street, Lockhart, Texas, 78644 (the "COUNTY") and EWEAC Properties, LLC, a Texas Limited Liability Company, of 701 Mountain Crest Dr., Wimberley, Texas 78676 (the "CONSULTANT").

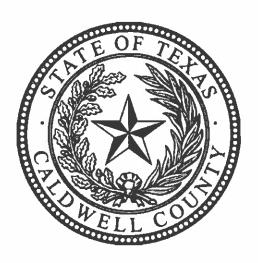

The County reserves the right to seek all remedies available under law in the event of a failure to perform or other breach of this Contract by the Contractor, and the failure of the County to employ a particular remedy shall not be regarded by the Parties as a waiver of that or any other available remedy.

#### **Section 14. Termination for Convenience.**

The County may terminate this Contract without cause upon thirty (30) days prior written notice.

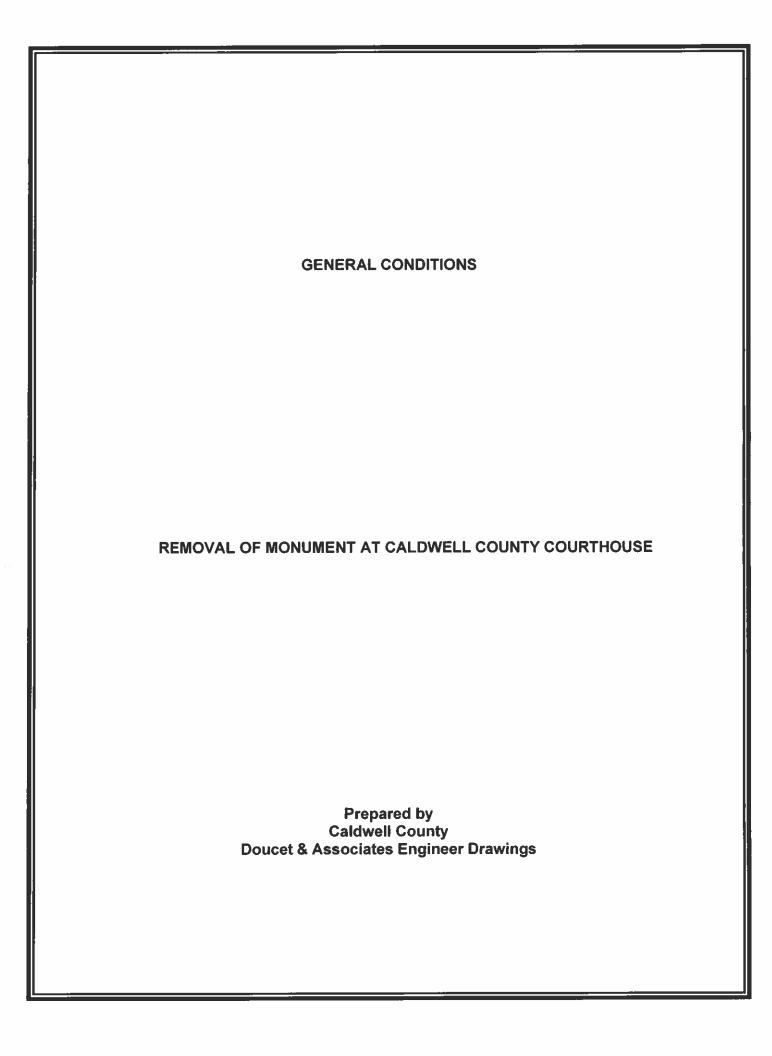
#### Attachment "A"

**PUBLIC RECORDS:** Contractor shall comply with Texas Statutes. Specifically, Contractor shall:

- A. Keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the service.
- B. Upon request from the County's custodian of public records, provide the County with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Texas Statutes, or as otherwise provided by law.
- C. Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the Contract term and following the completion of the Contract if Contractor does not transfer the records to the County.
- D. Upon completion of the Contract, transfer, at no cost, to the County, all public records in possession of Contractor or keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the service. If Contractor transfers all public records to the County upon completion of the Contract, Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the Contract, Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the County, upon request of the County's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the County.

# SECTION 1 DEFINITIONS

#### 1.0 **DEFINITIONS**

Whenever in any of the Contract Documents the following terms are used, the intent and meaning shall be defined as follows:

# 1.1 CONTRACT

The agreement executed by the Owner and the Contractor, of which these General Conditions form a part.

#### 1.2 OWNER

Caldwell County, the party of the first part of the Contract.

#### 1.3 CONTRACTOR

A person, firm or corporation with whom a Contract has been made directly or through accredited representatives that may have entered into a Contract with the Caldwell County, and who is liable for the acceptable performance of all legal debts pertaining to the work, the party of the second part of the Contract.

#### 1.4 ENGINEER

The authorized representative of the Owner employed to provide engineering supervision, and/or inspection of the work performed by the Contractor and where the term "Owner" is used in connection with the interpretation of the drawings and specifications, or in connection with the enforcement of the provisions of same, the County Engineer, as the Owner's representative, shall have authority to act.

# 1.5 **SUBCONTRACTOR**

A person, firm, or corporation to whom the Contractor sublets any part of the Contract.

#### 1.6 INSPECTOR

The authorized representative of the County Engineer, assigned to make all necessary inspections

#### 1.7 CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

The Contract Documents are composed of the Invitation for Bids, Instruction to Bidders, Form of Proposal, Form of Contract, Form(s) of Bond(s), General Conditions, Project Specifications, and Drawing(s) if applicable.

#### GENERAL CONDITIONS

# SECTION 2 INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

Before starting and until termination of work for, or on behalf of the Owner, the Contractor shall procure and maintain insurance of the types and to the limits specified.

With regard to the Contractor's obligations for products and completed operations under Contractor's Commercial General Liability coverage, the Contractor shall be responsible for providing and maintaining insurance and contractual agreements for at least (3) three years after the Owner's acceptance of the Product or Completed Operation.

The term Owner as used in this section of the Contract is defined to mean Caldwell County itself, any subsidiaries or affiliates, elected and appointed officials, employees, volunteers, representatives and agents.

Insurance shall be issued by an insurer whose business reputation; financial stability and claims payment reputation is satisfactory to the Owner, for the Owner's protection only. Unless otherwise agreed, the amounts, form and type of insurance shall conform to the following minimum requirements:

#### WORKER'S COMPENSATION

The Contractor shall purchase and maintain Worker's Compensation Insurance Coverage for all Workers' Compensation obligations as legally required. Additionally, the policy, or separately obtained policy, must include Employers Liability Coverage of at least \$100,000 each person -accident, \$100,000 each person - disease, \$500,000 aggregate - disease.

# COMMERCIAL GENERAL, AUTOMOBILE AND UMBRELLA LIABILITY COVERAGES

The Contractor shall purchase coverage on forms no more restrictive than the latest editions of the Commercial General Liability and Business Auto policies filed by the Insurance Services Office. The Owner shall be an Additional Insured and such coverage shall be at least as broad as that provided to the Named Insured under the policy for the terms and conditions of this Contract. The Owner shall not be considered liable for premium payment, entitled to any premium return or dividend and shall not be considered a member of any mutual or reciprocal company. Minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, and per accident, combined single limit for liability must be provided, with umbrella insurance coverage making up any difference between the policy limits of underlying policies coverage and the total amount of coverage required. If the required limits of liability afforded should become impaired by reason of any claim, then the Contractor agrees to have such limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, reinstated under the policy.

Commercial General Liability coverage must be provided, including bodily injury and property damage liability for premises, operations, products and completed operations, contractual liability, damage from underground exposures (u), and independent contractors. The coverage shall be written on occurrence-type basis and Caldwell County listed as an additional insured. Minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence must be provided.

Business Auto Policy coverage must be provided, including bodily injury and property damage arising out of operation, maintenance or use of owned, non-owned and hired automobiles. Minimum limits of \$1,000,000 CSL must be provided.

<u>Umbrella Liability Insurance</u> coverage shall not be more restrictive than the underlying insurance policy coverages. The coverage shall be written on an occurrence-type basis.

#### CERTIFICATES OF INSURANCE

Required insurance shall be documented in the Certificates of Insurance that provide that the Owner shall be notified at least thirty (30) days in advance of cancellation, nonrenewal or adverse change or restriction in coverage. The Owner shall be named on each Certificate as an Additional Insured and this contract shall be listed. If required by the Owner, the Contractor shall furnish copies of the Contractor's insurance policies, forms, endorsements, jackets and other items forming a part of, or relating to such policies. Certificates shall be on the "Certificate of Insurance" form. Any wording in a Certificate which would make notification of cancellation, adverse change or restriction in coverage to the Owner an option shall be deleted or crossed out by the insurance carrier or the insurance carrier's agent or employee. The Contractor shall replace any canceled, adversely changed, restricted or non-renewed policies with new policies acceptable to the Owner and shall file with the Owner Certificates of Insurance under the new policies prior to the effective date of such cancellation, adverse change or restriction. If any policy is not timely replaced, in a manner acceptable to the Owner, the Contractor shall, upon instructions of the Owner, cease all operations under the Contract until directed by the Owner, in writing, to resume operations.

#### INSURANCE OF THE CONTRACTOR PRIMARY

The Contractor required coverage shall be considered primary, and all other insurance shall be considered as excess, over and above the Contractor's coverage. The Contractor's policies of coverage will be considered primary as relates to all provisions of the contract.

#### LOSS CONTROL AND SAFETY

The Contractor shall retain control over its employees, agents, servants and subcontractors, as well as control over its invitees, and its activities on and about the subject premises and the manner in which such activities shall be undertaken and to that

end, the Contractor shall not be deemed to be an agent of the Owner. Precaution shall be exercised at all times by the Contractor for the protection of all persons, including employees, and property. The Contractor shall make special effort to detect hazards and shall take prompt action where loss control/safety measures should reasonably be expected.

#### **HOLD HARMLESS**

The Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Owner, its officers and employees, from any and all liabilities, damages, losses, and costs, including, but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees, to the extent caused by the negligence, recklessness or intentional wrongful misconduct of the Contractor and persons employed or utilized by the Contractor in the performance of this contract. The Contractor's obligation shall not be limited by, or in any way to, any insurance coverage or by any provision in or exclusion or omission from any policy of insurance.

### PAY ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY

The Contractor agrees to pay on behalf of the Owner, as well as provide a legal defense for the Owner, both of which will be done only if and when requested by the Owner, for all claims as described in the Hold Harmless paragraph. Such payment on the behalf of the Owner shall be in addition to any and all other legal remedies available to the Owner and shall not be considered the Owner's exclusive remedy.

# GENERAL CONDITIONS SECTION 3 EXECUTION OF CONTRACT

# 3.0 CONTRACT SECURITY

The Contractor shall furnish a surety bond in an amount at least equal to 100 percent of the contract price as security for the faithful performance of this contract and for the payment of all persons performing labor on the project under this contract and furnishing materials in connection with this contract, and shall indemnify and save harmless the Caldwell County against and from all costs, expenses, damages, injury or conduct, want of care or skill, negligence or default, including patent infringement on the part of said principal, agents or employees, in the execution or performance of said contract. The surety of such bond shall be a duly authorized company satisfactory to Caldwell County.

### 3.1 FAILURE TO EXECUTE CONTRACT

Failure to execute the contract and file an acceptable surety bond as provided in Section 3.0 within ten (10) calendar days after written notice of award of the contract has been given, shall be just cause for the annulment of the award and the forfeiture of the bid bond to Caldwell County not as a penalty, but in liquidation of damages sustained.

#### 3.2 ASSIGNMENT

The contractor shall not assign the whole or any part of this contract or any monies due or to become due hereunder without written consent of Caldwell County. In case the Contractor assigns all or any part of any monies due or to become due under this contract, the instrument of assignment shall contain a clause substantially to the effect that it is agreed that the right of the assignee in and to any monies due or to become due to the Contractor shall be subject to prior liens of all persons, firms and corporations for services rendered or materials supplied for the performance of the work called for in this contract.

#### 3.3 PRECONSTRUCTION CONFERENCE

Within ten (10) days after execution of the Agreement, the Contractor will submit to the County Engineer for approval a construction progress schedule indicating the starting and completion dates of the various stages of the work and a schedule of shop drawing submissions.

# 3.4 TERMINATION OF CONVENIENCE

A contract may be terminated in whole or in part by Caldwell County at any time and for any reason in accordance with this clause whenever Caldwell County shall determine that such termination is in the best interest of Caldwell County. Any such termination shall be effected by the delivery to the contractor at least five (5) working days before the effective date of a Notice of Termination specifying the extent to which performance shall be terminated and the date upon which termination becomes effective. An equitable adjustment in the contract price shall be made for the completed service, but no amount shall be allowed for anticipated profit on unperformed services.

# SECTION 4 CONTRACTOR

#### 4.0 LICENSES, PERMITS, CONSTRUCTION, AND EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES

All contractors shall secure all licenses and permits and comply with all laws, regulations and building and construction codes as required by the State, City and County in which the project is to be constructed, also with all regulations for the protection of workers and in respect to wages and hours which may be promulgated by the State and Federal Government.

#### 4.1 QUALIFICATIONS FOR EMPLOYMENT

Preference shall be given to qualified local residents in the employment of laborers and mechanics for work on the project under this contract. No person shall be employed in violation of the State or the National labor laws. No person under the age of sixteen (16) years shall be employed on the project under the contract. No person whose age or physical condition is such as to make his employment dangerous to his health or safety or to the health or safety of others shall be employed on the project under this contract; provided, that this shall not operate against the employment of physically handicapped persons, otherwise employable, where such persons may be safely assigned to work which they can ably perform. Contractor agrees that it will not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability. No person currently serving sentence in a penal or correctional institution and no inmate of an institution for mental defectives shall be employed on the project under this contract.

# 4.2 CHARACTER OF WORKMEN AND EQUIPMENT

The Contractor shall employ such superintendents, foremen and workmen as are careful and competent. Whenever the Engineer shall determine that any person employed by the Contractor is, in his opinion, incompetent, unfaithful, disorderly or insubordinate, such person shall, upon notice, be discharged from the work and shall not again be employed on it except with the written consent of the Engineer.

Should the Contractor fail to remove such person or persons or fail to furnish suitable or sufficient machinery, equipment or force for the proper prosecution of the work, the Engineer may withhold all estimates which are, or may become due, or may suspend the work until such orders are complied with.

The equipment used on any portion of the work shall be such that no injury to adjacent property, or to streets or highways, will result from its use; equipment shall be modern, in good condition and adequate in size to perform the work in satisfactory time intervals.

#### 4.3 USE OF PREMISES

The Contractor shall confine his apparatus, storage of materials, and construction operations to such limits as may be directed by the Owner and shall not unreasonably encumber the premises with his materials.

The Contractor shall not load or permit any part of any structure to be loaded to such an extent as to endanger its safety.

The Contractor shall enforce any instructions of the Owner regarding signs, advertising, fires, danger signals, barricades, and smoking and shall require all persons employed on the work to comply with all building, post or institutional regulations while on the premises.

#### 4.4 MATERIALS, SERVICES, AND FACILITIES

It is understood that, except as otherwise specifically stated in the Contract Documents, the Contractor shall provide and pay for all materials, labor, tools, equipment, water, light, power, transportation, superintendence and temporary construction of every nature whatsoever necessary to execute, complete, and deliver the work within the specified time.

Any work necessary to be performed after regular working hours, on Sundays or legal holidays, shall be performed without additional expense to the Owner.

#### 4.5 WARRANTY OF TITLE

No material, supplies, or equipment for the work shall be purchased subject to any chattel mortgage or under a conditional sale or other agreement by which an interest therein or in any part thereof is retained by the seller or supplier. The Contractor warrants good title to all material, supplies, and equipment installed or incorporated in the work and agrees upon completion of all work to deliver the premises, together with all improvements and appurtenances constructed or placed thereon by him, to the Owner free from any claims, liens, or charges, and further agrees that neither he nor any person, firm or corporation furnishing any materials or labor for any work covered by this contract shall have any right to a lien upon the premises or any improvements or appurtenances thereon, provided that this shall not preclude any contractor from installing metering devices and other equipment of utility companies or of municipalities, the title to which is commonly retained by the utility company or the City. In the event of the installation of such metering device or equipment, the Contractor shall advise the Owner as to the owner thereof. Nothing contained in this section, however, shall defeat or impair the right of such persons furnishing materials or labor under any bond given by the Contractor for their protection or any rights under any law permitting such persons to look to funds due to the Contractor in the hands of the Owner. The provisions of this section shall be inserted in all subcontracts and material contracts and notice of its provisions

shall be given to all persons furnishing materials for the work when no formal contract is entered into for such materials.

### 4.6 PAYMENTS BY CONTRACTOR

The Contractor shall pay:

- 1. For all transportation and utility services not later than the 20th day of the calendar month following that in which such services are rendered.
- 2. For all materials, tools, and other expendable equipment to the extent of ninety (90) percent of the cost thereof, not later than the 20th day of the calendar month following that in which such materials, tools, and equipment are delivered at the site of the project, and the balance of the cost thereof not later than the 30th day following the completion of that part of the work in or on which such materials, tools and equipment are incorporated or used.
- 3. To each of his subcontractors, not later than the 5th day following each payment to the Contractor, the respective amount allowed the Contractor on account of the work performed by his subcontractors, to the extent of each subcontractor's interest therein.

#### 4.7 SUBCONTRACTING

The Contractor shall not award any work to any subcontractor without prior written approval of the Owner, which approval will not be given until the Contractor submits to the Owner a written statement concerning the proposed award to the subcontractors, which statement shall contain such information as the Owner may require.

# 4.8 REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL OF OBSTRUCTIONS

- All fences, buildings, or other obstructions upon or within the limits of the work area, shall be removed by the Contractor and carefully placed on the abutting property or otherwise disposed of, if and as required. The cost of removing any existing structure shall be included in the price bid for the construction of new structures.
- 2. Any artifacts or items of historical value that are discovered in the work area are the property of Caldwell County and shall be removed as directed by the Engineer. The Contractor shall take care not to damage said items if at all possible.

#### 4.9 INVESTIGATION, UTILITIES, AND DIFFERING SITE CONDITIONS

- 1. Contractor shall have the sole responsibility of satisfying itself concerning the nature and location of the Work taking into specific account the Project site and the general and local conditions related thereto, and particularly, but without limitation, with respect to the following: those affecting transportation, access, disposal, handling and storage of materials; availability and quality of labor; water and electric power; availability and condition of roads; work area; living facilities; climatic conditions and seasons; physical conditions at the work-site and the Project area as a whole, topography and ground surface conditions; nature and quality of the surface materials to be encountered; subsurface conditions, equipment and facilities needed preliminary to and during performance of the Work, and all other costs associated with such performance. The failure of Contractor to acquaint itself with any applicable conditions shall not relieve Contractor from any of its responsibilities to perform under the Contract Documents, nor shall it be considered the basis for any claim for additional time or compensation
- 2. Contractor shall locate all existing roadways, railways, drainage facilities and utility services above, upon, or under the Project site, said roadways, railways, drainage facilities and utilities being referred to in this Section 4 as the "Utilities". Contractor shall contact the owners of all Utilities to determine the necessity for relocating or temporarily interrupting any Utilities during the construction of the Project Contractor shall schedule and coordinate its Work around any such relocation or temporary service interruption. Contractor shall be responsible for properly shoring, supporting and protecting all Utilities at all times during the course of the Work.
- 3. During the Work, the Contractor shall immediately upon the discovery of, and, before such conditions are disturbed, notify the County in writing of: (a) subsurface or latent physical conditions at the site differing materially from those indicated in the Plans and Specifications or other County/City-furnished information, or (b) unknown physical conditions at the site, of an unusual nature, differing materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of the character provided for in this Agreement If, however, a differing or unknown site condition requires immediate action by the Contractor to protect Work in progress from significant damage or to protect the health or safety of persons, the Contractor shall as soon as possible under the circumstances, and before such conditions are disturbed, if reasonably possible, provide the written notice specified herein. The County will promptly investigate the conditions, and if such conditions materially differ and cause an increase or decrease in the Contractor's cost of, or the time required for, performance of any part of the Work, whether or not changed as a result of such conditions, the construction completion dates

- shall be equitably adjusted by Change Order upon timely and proper request for Change Order.
- 4. No claim by the Contractor under this Section will be allowed unless the Contractor has given the notices required. If the County is not given written notice before the conditions are disturbed, for later notice in the case of a condition requiring immediate emergency action to protect the Work in progress or the health or safety of persons, the Contractor will be deemed to have waived its right to assert a claim for additional compensation and time arising out of such conditions.

# SECTION 5 PAYMENT

#### 5.0 SCOPE OF PAYMENTS

It is understood and agreed that the Contractor shall receive and accept the prices and rates, as herein specified, in full payment for furnishing all materials, labor, equipment and tools, and for performing all the work contemplated and embraced in the attached specifications and proposal; and also, for all loss or damage arising out of the nature of the work aforesaid, or from action of the elements or from any foreseen difficulties or obstructions which may arise or be encountered in the prosecution of the work until its final acceptance, as hereinafter provided for; and also, for all risks of every description and all expenses incurred by or in consequence of the suspension or discontinuance of the work as herein provided for, or for any infringement of patent, trademark, or copyright, and for the completion of the work in accordance with the plans specifications and contract.

#### 5.1 CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR WORK

Until acceptance of the work by the County, it shall be under the charge and care of the Contractor and he shall take every necessary precaution against injury or damage to the work by the action of the elements or from any other cause whatsoever, whether arising from the execution or from the non-execution of the work. The Contractor shall rebuild, repair, restore, and make good, at his own expense, all injuries or damages to any portion of the work occasioned by any of the above causes before its completion and acceptance.

#### 5.2 PAYMENT AND COMPENSATION FOR ALTERED QUANTITIES

When alterations in plans or quantities of work as herein provided for are ordered and performed, the Contractor shall accept payment in full at the contract unit price for the actual quantities or work done.

Except as otherwise herein provided, no charge for any extra work or material will be allowed unless the same has been ordered in writing by the County and the price stated in such work order.

#### 5.3 CHANGES IN WORK

A. The County may at any time, by written order and without notice to the sureties, make changes in the drawings and specifications of this contract and within the general scope thereof. In making any change the charge or credit for the change shall be approximately determined by the County in one of the following methods prior to the issuance of the order for the changed work:

- The order shall fix the total lump sum value of the change in the work of the Contractor, and shall set out the price which shall be added to or deducted from the contract price (which price shall include the Contractor's overhead and profit.) On any change which involves a net credit to the County, no allowance for overhead and profit shall be figured.
- 2. By estimating the number of unit quantities of each part of the work which is changed and then multiplying the estimated number of such unit quantities by the price (which price shall include the Contractor's overhead and profit) for a unit quantity thereof.
- 3. By ordering the Contractor to proceed with the work and to keep and present, in such form as the County may direct, a correct account of the cost of the change together with all vouchers therefor.

(Cost applicable to 1, 2, and 3 above may include an allowance for overhead and profit not to exceed 15% of the net cost. The cost may also include all items of labor or materials, the use of power tools and equipment actually used, power and all items of cost such as public liability and workmen's compensation insurance, pro rate charges for foremen, also social security, old age and unemployment insurance; however, no percentage for overhead and profit shall be allowed on items of social security, old age and unemployment insurance. If deductions are ordered, the credits shall be the net cost. Among the items considered as overhead are included insurance other than mentioned above, bond, or bonds, superintendent, timekeeper, clerks, watchmen, use of small tools, incidental job burdens and general office expense.)

- B. The Contractor shall, when required by the County, furnish to the County an itemized breakdown of the quantities and prices used for computing the value of any change that might be ordered.
- C. In figuring changes, instructions for measurement of quantities set forth in the specifications shall be followed.
- D. Should the Contractor encounter, or the County discover, during the progress of the work, sub-surface or latent conditions at the site materially differing from those shown on the drawings or indicated in the specifications, or unknown conditions of an unusual nature differing materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of character provided for in the drawings and specifications, the attention of the County shall be called immediately to such conditions before they are disturbed. The County shall thereupon promptly investigate the conditions, and if he finds that they do so materially differ, the Contract shall, with the written approval of the

county, be modified to provide for any increase or decrease of cost or difference in time resulting from such conditions.

#### 5.4 CLAIMS AND DISPUTES

A Claim is a demand or assertion by one of the parties seeking an adjustment or interpretation of the terms of the Contract Documents, payment of money, extension of time or other relief with respect to the terms of the Contract Documents. The term "Claim" also includes other disputes and matters in question between County and Contractor arising out of or relating to the Contract Documents. The responsibility to substantiate a Claim shall rest with the party making the Claim.

Claims by the Contractor shall be made in writing to the County within forty-eight (48) hours after the first day of the event giving rise to such Claim or else the Contractor shall be deemed to have waived the Claim Written supporting data shall be submitted to the County within fifteen (15) calendar days after the occurrence of the event, unless the County grants additional time in writing, or else the Contractor shall be deemed to have waived the Claim All claims shall be priced in accordance with the provisions of Subsection 7.3.

The Contractor shall proceed diligently with its performance as directed by the County, regardless of any pending Claim, action, suit, or administrative proceeding, unless otherwise agreed to by the County in writing. The County shall continue to make payments in accordance with the Contract Documents during the pendency of any Claim.

#### 5.5 OMITTED ITEMS

The County shall have the right to cancel the portions of the Contract relating to the construction of any time therein by the payment to the Contractor of a fair and equitable amount covering all items of cost incurred prior to the date of cancellation or suspension of work by order of the County.

#### 5.6 DEDUCTIONS FOR UNCORRECTED WORK

If the County deems it inexpedient to require the Contractor to correct the work injured or not performed in accordance with the Contract documents, an equitable deduction from the contract price shall be made by agreement between the County and Contractor.

#### 5.7 CONTRACT TIME AND DELAY PENALTIES

Time is of the essence in the performance of the Work under this Agreement. Contractor shall commence the Work within ten (10) calendar days from the

Commencement Date, established in the Notice to Proceed from the County. No Work shall be performed at the Project site prior to the Commencement Date. Contractor shall provide forty-eight (48) hours' notice prior to beginning the Work.

The Work shall be fully/finally completed and deemed ready by the County for final completion within the allotted calendar days from the Commencement Date. The Contract Time shall be the time period from the Commencement Date to the date of Final Completion ("Contract Time")

As the project approaches final completion, the County shall compile a "punch list" of any remaining exceptions to final/full completion of the project. The Project shall be deemed to be fully/finally completed by the County on the date that the County certifies in writing that the construction of it, or specified part thereof, is completed in accordance with the Contract Documents, so that the Project or specified part can be utilized for the purposes for which it is intended, and all punch list items have been completed to the satisfaction of the County.

#### 5.8 ACCEPTANCE AND FINAL PAYMENT

Whenever the improvement provided for under this Contract shall have been completely performed on the part of the Contractor, and all parts of the work have been approved by the County, according to the Contract, the County shall within ten (10) days unless otherwise provided, make the final inspection and a final estimate showing the value of the work as soon as the necessary measurements and computations can be made. All prior certificates or estimates upon which payments have been made are approximate only, subject to correction in the final payment.

The amount of this estimate, less any sums that may have been deducted or retained upon the provision of this contract, will be paid to the Contractor within thirty (30) days after the final estimate has been approved by the County, provided that the Contractor has properly maintained the project as hereinafter specified, and provided he has furnished to the party of the first part a sworn affidavit to the effect that all bills are paid and no suits are pending in connection with the work done under this contract.

The Contractor agrees that the payment of all just claims for materials, against him, or any subcontractor in connection with this contract, and his bond will not be released by final acceptance and payment by the County unless all such claims are paid or released.

#### 5.9 GENERAL GUARANTEE

Neither the final certificate of payment nor any provision in the contract documents nor partial or entire use or occupancy of the premises by the County shall constitute an acceptance of work not done in accordance with the contract documents or relieve the Contractor of liability in respect to any express warranties or responsibility for

faulty materials or workmanship. The Contractor shall remedy any defects in the work and pay for any damage to other work resulting therefrom which shall appear within a period of one year from the date of final acceptance of the work unless a longer period is specified. The County will give notice of observed defects with reasonable promptness.

#### 5.10 TERMINATION OF CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY

This Contract will be considered complete when all work has been completed and the final inspection made, the work accepted by the County and the final estimate paid. The Contractor will then be released from further obligation except as set forth in Section 7.7 of these General Conditions and the requirement to maintain products and completed operations coverage as contained herein.

#### 5.11 INVOICE SUBMITTAL

Caldwell County will accept only one request for partial payment per month. Applications for partial payments must reference subject project, note the City's purchase order number, coincide with the City's percentage of work completed, and be certified by the County Judge's Office before the partial request for payment will be processed. Unless otherwise modified in the contract documents, retainage shall be ten (10) percent until final payment.

Caldwell County normally issues checks for payment of invoices on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month.

# GENERAL CONDITIONS SECTION 6 OTHER GENERAL CONDITIONS

To ensure acceptance, all bidders submitting bids to Caldwell County shall be governed by the following conditions, attached specifications, and bid form(s) unless otherwise specified. Bids <u>not</u> submitted on the bid form(s) provided shall be rejected, and bids not complying with these conditions will be subject to rejection.

- 1. Approved Equivalents or Equals: Any manufacturer's names, trade names, brand names, model numbers, etc. listed in the specifications are for information only and not intended to limit competition. The Bidder may offer any brand for which he is an authorized representative, which meets or exceeds the specifications as written. If the bid is based on an "approved equivalent or equal" item(s) or service(s), supportive information in the form of the manufacturer's printed literature or brochures, sketches, diagrams, and/or complete specifications must accompany the bid. The bidder must explain in detail the reasons why the proposed equivalent or equal will meet specifications and not be considered an exception thereto. Caldwell County reserves the right to determine acceptance of proposed equivalent or equal item(s) or service(s).
- 2. <u>Award of Bids:</u> Recommendations for award of bids are made to the Caldwell County Commissioner's Court based on the lowest and best responsible bidder meeting all conditions and requirements of the specifications.
- 3. Bid Bond: The particular item(s) or service(s) outlined within the attached specifications require(s) that a certified check, cashier's check, or insurance company's executed original bond made payable to Caldwell County in the amount of 5% of the amount bid accompany your bid. To ensure its prompt return, please include the company's name and return address on the face of your good faith check or draft. Checks or drafts accepted as good faith deposits will be retained within the County's Finance Department until award and execution of contract is complete, or until a purchase order is issued to the successful bidder. Any bidder withdrawing his bid after the bid opening forfeits the right of return of his good faith deposit.
- 4. <u>Bid Withdrawal:</u> No bid may be withdrawn after closing time for receipt of bids for a period of sixty (60) days thereafter. The contract award shall be legally binding at the time of award by Commissioner's Court.
- 5. <u>Delivery:</u> Bid quotations shall include all freight costs to Lockhart, Texas to a point(s) specified herein or specified at the time the purchase order is placed. No title to the item(s) or service(s) ordered nor any risk of loss shall be passed to Caldwell County until after receipt of delivery has been acknowledged by an authorized representative of Caldwell County.

- 6. <u>Discounts:</u> Terms offering a discount for prompt payment will be considered in determining the low bid. The discount period shall begin whenever (1) the conditions of the specifications have been fully met and the product or service judged acceptable to Caldwell County or (2) a correct invoice and other required documents have been received, whichever is later. Discounts offered for a period of less than thirty (30) days will not be considered in determining low bid.
- 7. Exceptions to Specifications: During the drafting of written specifications, a sincere effort is made to describe products and services best suited to the needs of the County; however, in order that consideration be given in evaluating bids, any exceptions to or deviations from the specifications as written must be noted and fully explained. The County Judge is the final authority in determining the acceptability of any exceptions to specifications.
- 8. Governing Law: The laws of the State of Texas shall be the laws applied in the resolution of any action, claim or other proceeding arising out of this contract.
- Identical Tie Bids: In the event that two or more bids are identical in price, preference shall be given to business with Drug-Free Work Place Programs. A Drug-Free Work Place Certificate is enclosed.
- 10. Intent of Specifications: It is the intent of the specifications attached hereto to set forth and describe a certain item(s) or service(s) to be purchased by Caldwell County including all materials, equipment, machinery, tools, apparatus, and means of transportation (including freight costs) necessary to provide the item(s) or service(s).
- 11. <u>Interpretations</u>: All questions concerning the specifications or conditions shall be directed in writing to the Purchasing Office, or as instructed on the Invitation to Bid Page, at least ten (10) days prior to the bid submittal deadline. Inquiries must reference the bid item(s) or service(s) and the date of the bid submittal deadline. Interpretations will be made in the form of an addendum placed on the County's website. The County shall not be responsible for any other explanation or interpretation.
- 12. <u>Legal Requirements:</u> All applicable provisions of Federal, State, County, and local laws including all ordinances, rules, and regulations shall govern the development, submittal and evaluation of all bids received in response to these specifications, and shall govern any and all claims between person(s) submitting a bid response hereto and Caldwell County by and through its officers, employees and authorized representatives. A lack of knowledge by the bidder concerning any of the aforementioned shall not constitute a cognizable defense against the legal effect thereof. The Bidder agrees that it will not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age or disability.
- 13. <u>Licenses, Registration and Certificates:</u> Each bidder shall possess at the time of submitting its bid all licenses, registrations and certificates necessary to engage in the

business of contracting (or special contracting if the work to be performed necessitates a particular type of specialty contractor) in Caldwell County. Bidder must also possess all licenses, registrations and certificates necessary to comply with federal, state and local laws and regulations.

- 14. <u>Mistakes:</u> Bidders are expected to examine the conditions, scope of work, proposal prices, extensions, and all instructions pertaining to the item(s) or service(s) involved. Failure to do so will be at the bidder's risk. Unit prices bid will govern in award.
- 15. <u>Payment of Invoices</u>: Caldwell County issues checks for payment of invoices 2nd and 4th Tuesday of every month. The signed receiving copy of the purchase order <u>and</u> a correct invoice must have been received by Accounts Payable Activity prior to the week prior before 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month. Item(s) or service(s)s received on or after will be processed in the following month.
- 16. <u>Pre-Bid Meetings:</u> If a bid requires a mandatory pre-bid meeting, any representative of a firm wishing to submit a bid must sign in with the name of the bidding firm.
- 17. Prohibited Conduct by Bidders: Upon the publication of any solicitation for sealed bids, requests for proposals, requests for qualifications, or other solicitation of interest or invitation to negotiate by any authorized representative of Caldwell County, any party interested in submitting a bid, proposal, or other response reflecting an interest in participating in the purchasing or contracting process shall be prohibited from engaging in any communication pertaining to formal solicitations with the court members, or any member of a selection/evaluation committee for RFPs/RFQs, whether directly or indirectly or through any representative or agent, whether in person, by mail, by facsimile, by telephone, by electronic communications device, or by any other means of communication, until such time as the County has completed all action with respect to the solicitation.
- 18. Protests: Protests of the plans, specifications, and other requirements of bids and requests for proposals must be received in writing by the Purchasing Office at least ten (10) business days prior to the scheduled bid submittal deadline. A detailed explanation of the reason for the protest must be included. Protests of the intended

- award of bid or contract must be in writing and received in the Purchasing Office within five (5) business days of the notice of intent to award. A detailed explanation of the protest must be included.
- 20. <u>Public Entity Crimes:</u> By submitting a proposal each proposer is confirming that the company has not been placed on the convicted vendors list.
- 21. <u>Public Records:</u> Any material submitted in response to this Invitation to Bid will become a public document. This includes material which the responding bidder might consider to be confidential or a trade secret. Any claim of confidentiality is waived upon submission, effective after opening the bid pursuant.
- 22. <u>Public Records Law:</u> The Parties shall each comply with Texas Public Records laws. The Parties hereby contractually agree that each Party shall allow public access to all documents, papers, letters, or other public records, made or received by either Party in conjunction with this agreement, or related thereto, unless a statutory exemption from disclosure exists. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, it is expressly agreed that Contractor's failure to comply with this provision, within seven (7) days of notice from the County, shall constitute an immediate and material breach of contract for which the County may, in the County's sole discretion, unilaterally terminate this agreement without prejudice to any right or remedy.
- 23. <u>Rejection of Bids:</u> Caldwell County reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids, to award bids on a split-order basis by item or service number, to waive any minor bid irregularities, technicalities, or informalities, and to re-advertise for bids when deemed in the best interest of Caldwell County
- 24. <u>Sealed Bids:</u> The specifications and all executed bid forms must be submitted in a sealed envelope. All bids must be signed by an authorized representative of the bidder. In the event more than one bid submittal deadline is scheduled for the same date and time, do not include bids concerning different sets of specifications within the same envelope. The face of the sealed envelope shall be plainly marked identifying the bidder, the item(s) or service(s) bid and the bid number. It shall be the sole responsibility of the bidder to assure receipt of bid at the Purchasing Office prior to the published time for the bid submittal deadline. No bid will be accepted after closing time for receipt of bids, nor will any offers by telephone, fax, internet or email be accepted.
- 25. Tax: Caldwell County is exempt from all State and local sales tax.
- 26. <u>Termination for Convenience</u>: A contract may be terminated in whole or in part by the County at any time and for any reason in accordance with this clause whenever the County shall determine that such termination is in the best interest of the County. Any such

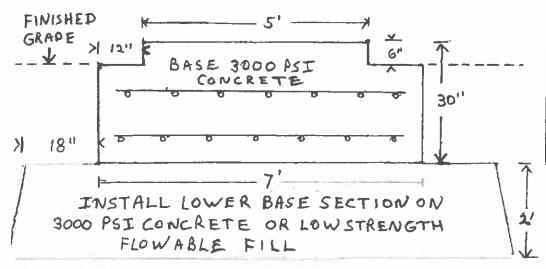
termination shall be effected by the delivery to the contractor at least thirty (30) business days before the effective date of a Notice of Termination specifying the extent to which performance shall be terminated and the date upon which termination becomes effective. An equitable adjustment in the contract price shall be made for the completed service, but no amount shall be allowed for anticipated profit on unperformed services.

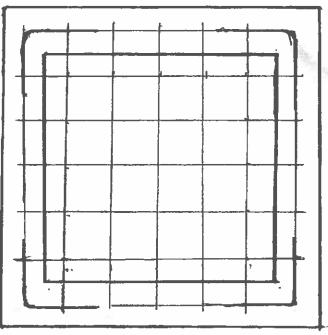

# INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN CALDWELL COUNTY AND THE CITY OF UHLAND FOR SUBDIVISION REGULATION WITHIN THE EXTRATERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF THE CITY OF UHLAND

THIS INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is made and entered into by and between Caldwell County, Texas, a political subdivision of the State of Texas (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY"), by and through its County Judge, and the City of UHLAND, a municipal corporation of the State of Texas (hereinafter referred to as "CITY"), by and through its City Mayor. The City and the County are hereinafter collectively referred to as "the Parties" or "the Parties to this Agreement."

WHEREAS, the CITY has duly identified its corporate limits and the areas of its extraterritorial jurisdiction (hereinafter referred to as "ETJ" or the "CITY's ETJ") within the COUNTY; and

WHEREAS, the CITY has adopted and is enforcing subdivision regulations pursuant to TEX. LOCAL GOV'T CODE Subchapter A of Chapter 212 and other statutes applicable to municipalities; and

**WHEREAS**, the COUNTY has adopted and is enforcing subdivision regulations pursuant to TEX. LOCAL GOV'T CODE sections 232.001-232.005 and other statutes applicable to counties; and

**WHEREAS**, the COUNTY and the CITY both have original authority to enforce their subdivision regulations in the CITY's ETJ; and

**WHEREAS**, the Texas Legislature revised TEX. LOCAL GOV'T CODE Chapter 242 to limit subdivision regulation within the ETJ to one entity (or two entities working jointly); and

WHEREAS, to the extent that the CITY's execution of this Agreement and related agreements with other counties in other areas of the CITY's ETJ, or the CITY's adoption, administration or enforcement of ordinances, rules, regulations or plans in reasonable furtherance of this Agreement or the related agreements results in requirements or restrictions that are not identical throughout the CITY's entire ETJ, the Parties jointly acknowledge that the actions of the Parties are "reasonably taken to fulfill an obligation mandated by state law" within the meaning of TEX. GOV'T CODE Section 2007.003(b)(4), and are therefore not subject to TEX. GOV'T CODE Chapter 2007; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, both the COUNTY and the CITY entered into an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement, pursuant to TEX. GOV'T CODE Section 791.011(a), and as authorized by TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE Section 242.001(c) ("the 1445 Agreement"); and

**WHEREAS**, the COUNTY and the CITY desire to revise and execute a revised 1445 Agreement to be effective November 1, 2020 (the Effective Date).

#### NOW, THEREFORE, the COUNTY and the CITY mutually agree as follows:

#### I. TERM OF AGREEMENT AND CERTIFICATION

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall for a period of one year from the Effective date. This Agreement shall automatically renew annually on the anniversary of the Effective date unless terminated or amended as provided herein.
- 2. This Agreement may be terminated by either Party by giving sixty (60) days' written notice of intent to terminate this Agreement to the other Party. Any notice of intent to terminate must be delivered by deposit in the United States mail, certified, return receipt requested, to the other Party at the addresses set out herein. Upon termination of this Agreement, neither Party shall have any obligations to the other Party under this Agreement, except with respect to payment for services already rendered under this Agreement, but not yet paid.
- 3. This Agreement is intended to entirely supersede and replace the existing 1445 Agreement between the parties, executed on February 27, 2019.
- 4. The COUNTY and the CITY mutually certify that this Agreement complies with the requirements of Texas Local Government Code, Chapter 242.

# II. DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY TO REGULATE SUBDIVISION PLATS AND APPROVE RELATED PERMITS

- 1. Pursuant to Texas Local Government Code 242.001(d)(4) the COUNTY assigns and delegates to the CITY the COUNTY'S authority to regulate subdivision plats and approve related permits in the following areas:
  - a. All areas within CITY's ETJ; and
  - b. Any area within the CITY's ETJ that is subject to an annexation plan; and
  - c. Any area within the CITY's ETJ that is subject to a development agreement with a term no longer than twenty-four (24) months.
- 2. For all areas described in section II.1.a, the CITY shall enforce the COUNTY's subdivision and development regulations which are contained in the Caldwell County Development Ordinance and incorporated by this reference as if fully set forth herein, unless the CITY has existing ordinances establishing substantially similar or more stringent standards for the subject areas of such County subdivision regulations. All CITY subdivisions regulations not in conflict with the Caldwell County Development Ordinance and CITY regulations establishing more stringent standards for the subject areas described in section II.1.a may be enforced.

3. The CITY agrees to seek COUNTY's consent from the COUNTY Director of Sanitation prior to entering into a development agreement that does not involve annexation of the area or before granting a variance, or a waiver from the Caldwell County Development Ordinance or any other applicable rules or standards, including construction material and specifications. The COUNTY agrees to not unreasonably withhold consent and to provide a response to the CITY within ten (10) business days, and further the COUNTY agrees that a lack of response after ten (10) business days shall be deemed a consent to the CITY's request.

#### III. ADMINISTRATION

Any specific statutory regulatory authority of either the COUNTY or the CITY not otherwise delegated in this Agreement shall remain the exclusive authority of the original entity, in accordance with the administrative provisions in this Section.

## III.A Subdivision Plats, Development Plans and Related Site Construction Plans and Permits

- 1. All subdivision plats, development plans and related permits, including site construction plans and permits, shall be submitted directly to the CITY.
- 2. The CITY shall deliver one electronic copy and two hard copies of all plat submittals and subdivision construction plans to the COUNTY Director of Sanitation for review within two (2) business days from the date of receipt. The COUNTY Director of Sanitation or authorized designee shall do a completeness check of the submittals and notify the CITY of completeness of the submittals. COUNTY shall provide technical comments, if any, to the CITY within seven (7) business days of receiving the plat, plan or permit submittals. The CITY and the COUNTY agree that time is of the essence and as such the CITY shall proceed to process all subdivision plat and related permits, including subdivision construction plans, as necessary to comply with state law and prevent default approval of any plat, permit or plan as contemplated herein.
- 3. The CITY shall collect and forward to the COUNTY all applicable COUNTY fees as set forth in the Caldwell County Subdivision and Development Fee Schedule, as presently authorized or amended by the COUNTY, for services to be performed by the COUNTY. Per Caldwell County's Development Ordinance, on behalf of the County, the CITY shall collect all fees associated with the construction of roads including the 1.5% of cost of streets and drainage construction plus reimbursement of any and all consulting fees.
- 4. The CITY shall require a signature block for the current COUNTY Director of Sanitation or authorized designee authorizing the filing of any plat under this agreement. After final approval by the CITY it shall be the applicant's responsibility to obtain the signature of the COUNTY Director of Sanitation or authorized designee. The COUNTY shall not withhold such signature without reasonable cause.

- 5. The CITY shall deliver two copies of all recorded plats for subdivisions within the CITY's ETJ to the COUNTY within seven (7) business days of the recording of the subdivision plat.
- 6. COUNTY will maintain public streets and roads, and all public drainage systems, within any platted subdivision or recorded development plan, once built, provided that the requirements of the COUNTY for road construction and drainage have been complied with, at a minimum.
- 7. COUNTY inspectors shall have inspection and approval authority over the road construction, storm water drainage construction, and water and wastewater facility construction within the COUNTY right-of-way and COUNTY easements. The CITY shall allow COUNTY inspectors access to road construction sites of subdivisions within the ETJ and the CITY shall, within seven (7) business days of receipt, submit copies of all road design materials and road construction test results to the COUNTY during road construction. COUNTY inspectors may, from time to time, coordinate with CITY inspectors and delegate to the CITY inspector's specific inspection duties related to road construction, storm water drainage construction, and/or water and wastewater facility construction within the COUNTY right of way or COUNTY easements. The COUNTY shall inspect and certify to the CITY that such roads and drainage meet or exceed the COUNTY standards prior to the CITY issuing a certificate of completion. The COUNTY may request that the CITY issue a stop-work notice if, in the COUNTY'S opinion, applicable construction standards are not being met.
- 8. The CITY shall require the applicant confer and come to agreement with the Caldwell County 911 Addressing Division concerning street names prior to final plat approval.

#### III.B ROW, Driveway and Floodplain development permits:

The COUNTY retains sole regulatory authority for <u>all</u> right-of-way, driveway, and floodplain permits within the CITY's ETJ that are outside and not related to a subdivision plat or development plan, including those within any annexation plan, pursuant to the Caldwell County Development Ordinance, Caldwell County Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance, and any other applicable statutes. All right-of-way, driveway, and floodplain permits as described herein shall be submitted directly to the COUNTY. Upon issuing a permit under this section, the COUNTY shall provide the CITY a copy of the issued permit within seven (7) business days of issuance.

#### III.D Residential Development permits

The CITY retains exclusive regulatory authority for residential development or construction occurring within its ETJ, provided that applications for residential construction or development on a lot with previously-existing permitted residential development must be accompanied by engineering report analyzing pre- and post-development changes to stormwater runoff and impacts to adjacent and downstream properties.

#### III.E OSSF:

1. Authority to regulate and permit On-Site Sewage ('OSS') facilities is held by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality ('TCEQ'). To the extent TCEQ may and does so delegate such authority to each the COUNTY and the CITY, respectively within the ETJ, the CITY shall have the exclusively authority as so delegated to it by TCEQ. The CITY shall assume responsibility for facility planning reports, including but not limited to any On Site Sewage Facilities, within the ETJ.

#### IV. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 1. **Fees.** The CITY shall have the right to charge applicants/developers reasonable fees, sufficient to cover the full cost of services provided by the CITY under this Agreement and otherwise in the administration of regulations that apply to subdivisions in the CITY's ETJ. If any fee, Certificate of Deposit, Letter of Credit, warranty or bond is to be forwarded to Caldwell County in accordance with this Agreement, the CITY shall promptly forward the fee, Certificate of Deposit, Letter of Credit, warranty or bond to Caldwell County Sanitation Department, 1700 FM 2720, Lockhart, Texas 78644.
- 2. **Time for action on submittals**. The COUNTY Director of Sanitation or authorized designee shall, within seven (7) business days of receipt, provide the CITY staff with written comments for approval or disapproval of subdivision plats, related permits or any other submittals made under section III of this Agreement, including permit applications regarding roads, drainage and right-of-way design, construction and dedication. The CITY and the COUNTY agree that time is of the essence and as such the CITY shall proceed to process all subdivision plat and related permits, including subdivision construction plans, as necessary to comply with state law and prevent default approval of any plat, permit or plan as contemplated herein.
- 3. **Transportation Plan**. The parties agree to exercise all regulatory authority consistent with any CITY or COUNTY Transportation Plan in place or as currently revised or amended, subject to applicable constitutional and statutory limitations. For subdivisions in which it appears to the CITY that a requirement for dedication of right-of-way pursuant to such Transportation Plan may exceed an applicable constitutional or statutory limitation, the CITY will notify the COUNTY, and the parties will cooperate to determine the extent of right-of-way dedication to be required, or an alternative method of securing the needed right-of-way. When enforcing subdivision regulations in the CITY's ETJ, the CITY shall facilitate the COUNTY's road maintenance program by requiring a road standard no less than the standards set out in the Caldwell County Development Ordinance.
- 4. **CITY Map**. The CITY shall quarterly provide a current map and digital drawing file defining the legal boundaries of its corporate limits and areas of ETJ. A current map as of the date of this Agreement is attached hereto Attachment "A". The CITY shall notify the COUNTY of any changes to the CITY's ETJ within ten (10) business days of the effective date of the change and provide an updated digital drawing file. Notice shall be provided by letter according to Section IV.9, below. A change in the area covered by this Agreement

shall not, however, affect any rights accrued under TEX. LOCAL GOV'T CODE Chapter 245 prior to the effective date of the change.

- 5. Collaborative interpretation. The CITY agrees to collaborate with the COUNTY regarding the interpretation of any rule or regulation delegated by the COUNTY under this agreement. Such collaboration may result in the granting of a variance on a case-by-case basis. However, the CITY shall not grant a variance to a COUNTY regulation, including roadway, drainage, right-of-way or dedication provisions, without the consent of the COUNTY. For the purposes of this agreement, consent shall be in writing by the COUNTY Director of Sanitation as required by COUNTY responsibilities defined in this agreement. The COUNTY agrees to not unreasonably withhold consent and to provide a response to the CITY within ten (10) business days, and further the COUNTY agrees that a lack of response after ten (10) business days shall be deemed a consent to the CITY's request.
- 6. **General Administration**. Administering this Agreement and the contact person for the COUNTY shall be the Director of the Caldwell County Sanitation Department, or his/her representative. Administering this Agreement and the contact person and representative for the CITY shall be the City Manager/Administrator.
- 7. **Alteration, Amendment or Modification**. This Agreement may not be altered. amended, or modified except in a subsequent writing signed by all Parties to this Agreement. A party seeking to amend this Agreement shall provide written notice of intent to amend to the other Party along with such proposed amendment. No official, agent, employee, or representative of either the COUNTY or the CITY has the authority to alter, amend, or modify the terms of this Agreement, except in accordance with express authority as may be respectively granted by either the Caldwell County Commissioners Court or the CITY.
- 8. **Non-delegated authority retained**. Any specific statutory regulatory authority of either the COUNTY or the CITY not covered or otherwise delegated in this Agreement shall remain the exclusive authority of the original entity.
- 9. **Notice**: All notices sent pursuant to this Agreement shall be in writing and must be sent by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested.

- 10. **Severability**. If any provision of this Agreement is found to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect the remaining provisions of this Agreement.
- 11. **Breach**. The failure of either Party to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall constitute a breach of this Agreement. Either Party shall be entitled to any and all rights and remedies allowed under Texas law for any breach of this Agreement by the other Party.
- 12. **Non-Waiver**. The waiver by either Party of a breach of this Agreement shall not constitute a continuing waiver of such breach or of a subsequent breach of the same or a different provision. Nothing in this Agreement is intended by either Party to constitute a waiver of any immunity from suit or liability to which it is entitled- under applicable law.
- 13. **Entire Agreement; Third Parties**. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the COUNTY and the CITY. No other agreement, statement, or promise relating to the subject matter of this Agreement and which is not contained in this Agreement or incorporated by reference in this Agreement shall be valid or binding. This Agreement is not intended to confer any rights on any third parties, and it shall not be construed as conferring any rights on any third parties.
- 14. **Terms used in Document**. As used in this document, the terms "Interlocal Cooperation Agreement", "Interlocal Agreement", "Agreement", and "Contract" are synonymous.
- 15. **Non-Defined Terms**. If not specifically defined in this Agreement, words and phrases used in this Agreement shall have their ordinary meaning as defined by common usage.

## INTRODUCTION / STATUTORY AUTHORITY.

- 1.1. This policy is adopted pursuant to §694.002, Texas Health and Safety Code, which provides that a county shall provide for the cremation of paupers. Caldwell County is authorized under TEXAS HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE, Section694.002, TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE, Section 81.027, and other applicable statutes, to provide cremation of indigent persons in Caldwell County and to assist the Next of kin of deceased individuals in obtaining burial where the Decedent and/or Next of Kin are unable to afford burial and meet the requirements of applicable Caldwell County policies.
- 1.2. Under §711.002(a), Texas Health and Safety Code, the following persons, in the priority listed, have the duty to cremate a decedent's remains, and are liable for the cost of cremation:
  - (a) the person designated in a written instrument signed by the decedent;
  - (b) the decedent's surviving spouse;
  - (c) any one of the decedent's surviving adult children;
  - (d) either one of the decedent's surviving parents'
  - (e) any one of the decedent's surviving adult siblings; or
  - f) any adult person in the next degree of kinship in order named by law to inherit the estate of the decedent.

1.3. Provision of Service. Indigent burials may be provided to eligible Caldwell County residents or those who died in Caldwell County, and assistance is provided to families who lack the Income or resources to afford any type of funeral expenses and who meet applicable eligibility requirements under this Policy. All indigent burials requests must have written approval by designated County staff prior to cremation services.

## 2. DEFINITIONS.

## 2.1. In this policy:

- (a) "Contracting funeral home "means a funeral home that has contracted with the county for the interment of paupers under this policy.
- (b) "County" means Caldwell County.
- (c) "Department" means the County Judge of Caldwell County
- (d) "Family member" means a person listed in §711.002, Texas Health & Safety Code, with the right, duty, and liability provided by that law for the interment of a decedent's remains.
- (e) "Interment" means the permanent disposition of remains, by burial or by placement of cremated remains in an urn or other container.
- (f) "Resource" includes cash, a bank account, real property, furniture, jewelry, and automobile, job income, insurance proceeds, and other possessions, assets, or death benefits. The term includes a legal claim that is pending or may be asserted in litigation on behalf of the decedent's estate or family members.

## 3. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS.

3.1. a PERSON WHOSE DEATH OCCURS IN THIS County may be certified as a pauper eligible for cremation by the County under this policy if the County Judge determines, after reasonable investigation, that;

- (a) the estate of the decedent does not have any resources that may be used to pay for interment; and
- (b) the decedent's family members cannot pay for interment because;
  - (i) they do not have resources that may be used to pay for interment;

Or

(n) their identities or whereabouts are unknown.

# 4. DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY/PROCEDURE/PARTIAL PAYMENT

- 4.01 Upon referral by All Faiths Funeral Services, at least one family member whose identity and whereabouts are known must complete an application for interment services, an authorization to furnish information, and any other forms that may be necessary to determine eligibility by the Department.
- 4.02. If the decedent's remains are not in the possession of a funeral home and the identities and where about of family members are unknown, the Department shall perform the investigation of resources, including investigation of possible benefits from the sources listed in Section 4.04.
- 4.03. The Department shall review the information and forms submitted to it and may conduct its own investigation to determine if the decedent is eligible for cremation as a pauper under this policy.
- 4.04. The County Judge shall determine whether a decedent is eligible to be cremated as a pauper at the County's expense.
- 4.05. If the County Judge determines that a pauper's estate or family members have resources to pay a portion but not all of the expense of interment, a contribution towards the expense must be made or applied for by the estate, family members, or funeral home. The amount of the

contribution must be deducted from the bill submitted by the contracting funeral home to the County. A family member must transfer or assign resources for any required contribution to the contracting funeral home.

- 4.06. If a decedent's estate or family members have a claim against a party and litigation is pending or anticipated, the County Judge may:
  - (a) Treat the claim as a resource and deny eligibility; or
  - (b) Grant burial assistance and require a representative of the decedent's estate to transfer or assign its interest in the proceeds from such claim to the extent of the County's expense for interment.
- 4.07. The County may request reimbursement or file suit seeking recovery of the County's cost for interment as a pauper if the County Judge determines:
  - (a) The existence of resources or family members not reported at the time of application; or
  - (b) That a person with a duty to inter had resources to pay but refused.
- 4.08. County costs ought to be recovered may include, but are not limited to, the cost of burial or cremation, the cost of County staff time spent contacting family members and processing the application or request, legal expenses, and any other costs incurred by the County in connection with the interment.
- 5. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA
- 5.1 General Requirements

- (a) Purpose. This Section sets forth the unified criteria to be used for identification of Households which meet the minimum Indigent Burial Program eligibility requirements in order to receive assistance under this Policy. Determination of eligibility will be determined by Department according to applicable Department guidelines.
- (b)Income. Household gross Income, as defined herein, must be at or below 21% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines for the 30-day period.
- (c) Eligible Decedent. An Eligible Decedent:
  - 1. must be a Caldwell County resident at the time of death; or
  - 2. must have died in Caldwell County.
- (d) Next of Kin. Applicant must provide proof the applicant is the legal Next of Kin as defined in TEXAS HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE ANN., Section 711.002, "Disposition of Remains, Duty to Inter."
- (e) Age. Applicant must be at lease 18 years of age or an Emancipated Minor.
- (f) Resource/Assets. Households must have assets or resources more than the allowable limit of \$2,000.00.
- (g) Applicant must make an attempt to make financial arrangements with the Funeral Home prior to requesting services from the County.
- 5.2 Initial Contract. Caldwell County requires that anyone requesting Indigent Cremation Assistance first contact a contracted Funeral Home of their choice and tries to make financial arrangements using their own resources. The legal Next of Kin needs to meet in person (or via fax, if out of town or if there are extenuating circumstances), with the Funeral Home to try to arrange a lower cost/most economical funeral arrangement. If this

cannot be accomplished, the Funeral Home will refer the individual to the Caldwell County Department.

- 5.3 Next of Kin Determination.
  - (a) Identification. In identifying the Next of Kin as the Individual responsible for the disposition of remains, the County will follow the guideline set forth in Texas Health and Safety Code Ann., Section 711.002, "Disposition of Remains; to Inter," which currently reads as follows: Unless a Decedent has left directions in writing for the disposition of the Decedent's remains as provided in Subsection (g), the following persons, in the priority listed, have the right to control the disposition, including cremation, of the Decedent's remains, shall inter the remains, and are liable for the reasonable cost of the internment:
  - (b) the person designated in a written instrument signed by Decedent;
  - (b) the Decedent's surviving spouse;
  - (c) any one of the Decedent's surviving adult children;
  - (d) either one of the Decedent's surviving parents;
  - (e) any one of the Decedent's surviving adult siblings; or
  - (f) any adult person in the next degree of kinship in the order named by law to inherit the estate of the Decedent.
- 5.4 Guidelines. The county will use the following guidelines in attempting to locate the Next of Kin:
  - (a) Initial Effort. Pursuant to applicable law, the person with control of the body of the Decedent must make a reasonable effort to find the Next of Kin. Documentation of any such efforts made prior to

- referral to County shall be provided to County. It is expected that family, friends and the Funeral Home will make an effort to determine the Next of Kin and notify County of their findings.
- (b) Family. County will make a good faith effort to identify and find the Next of Kin.
- 5.5 Verification/Documentation. In determining and/or verifying the identity of the Next of Kin, the County will utilize information and documentation provided pursuant to Department guidelines.
  - (a) Status of Application. In determining and/or verifying the existence of a Common Law Marriage and the age and/or Emancipated Minor status of the applicant, the County will utilize information documentation provided pursuant to Department guidelines.
  - (b) Single Application. If an Applicant, who is a legal Next of Kin, is denied assistance, another application may not be accepted by another legal Next of Kin.
  - (c) No Next of Kin Referral.
    - (I) Available Next of Kin. If the legal Next of Kin does not begin or complete the application process, or if no Next of Kin is available, the County will bury the remains of an eligible Decedent as a "No Next of kin" referral. If a next of kin is available, a statement from the legal Next of Kin to relinquish their rights will be needed to proceed. That letter of relinquishment needs to include:
    - (II) Name of legal Next of Kin
    - (III) Date
    - (iv) Name of Decedent
    - (v) Statement of permission for the county to inter the remains in the form of a singed affidavit identifying the affiant as the Next of Kin, waiving all rights to the remains and indemnifying the county against any claims related to the cremation.

- 5.6 Referral. When no Next of Kin can be identified to apply on the Decedent's behalf, the referral from the Nursing home or other entity will be considered a No Next of Kin referral. Entities will provide as much information as possible on the Decedent for the Department to complete an inquiry to locate the Next of Kin.
- 5.7 Information. The county will not provide any information for NO Next of Kin Referrals regarding inquiries for services for the Decedent. The Funeral Home may give out information per their policies.
- 5.8 Next of Kin Location. If a no Next of Kin referral begins, and prior to interment, Next of Kin is located, the Funeral Home or medical examiner's office must contact the Department immediately. Any steps taken will be stopped and the next of Kin will need to apply to determine eligibility.
- (g) Abandoned Body. If a body is abandoned by the Next of Kin or no Next of Kin is identified, the county will proceed pursuant to applicable law.
- 6. Application.
- 6.1 Forms. Applicant will read and sign the "Duties and Responsibilities of Participant" and will complete the Application form which will be reviewed as set forth in the Policy.
- 6.2 Residency Requirement. Requirements are as follows:
  - (a)Place of Death: Decedent must be a Caldwell County resident at the time of death; or have died in Caldwell County.
  - (b) Out of county Resident. If the person died in Caldwell County but was a resident of another county, every attempt will be made to bury the person in the County of residence or collect reimbursement from that county for the cost of services provided by Caldwell County.
  - (c) Nursing Home Resident. If the Decedent is in care at a nursing home or other care environment in a surrounding county, as a result of lack of Caldwell County resources to provide the service, a lack of room or non-acceptance of insurance, the

- person may considered a Caldwell County resident, if the Decedent has been in care at the facility no longer than 90days.
- (d) Verification of Residence. Department will utilize information provided or available to verify and document fulfillment of residency requirements for Decedent and/or Applicant using applicable county guidelines.

## 6.3 Income and Resources Requirements.

- (a) Income Test. An income test will be applied to the legal Next of Kin and his/her Household making the application on behalf of the deceased who by law has the right to control the disposition of the Decedents remains. The income test will consist of reviewing all income begin received by the Applicant's Household at the time of application in order to determine the Applicant's eligibility for assistance under this Policy. The gross Income must be at or below 21% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines.
- (b) Decedent's Income. The Decedent's Income will be considered in the Income test only if he/she resided in the Applicant's Household at the time of death otherwise the decease's Income is always considered a resource.
- (c) Application by Non-Family Member. The Income test will not apply in those situations where there are no surviving relatives know and friend is having to make application on behalf of the deceased. In that situation, only available resources of the deceased will be considered.
- (d) Verification of Income/Resources: Applicant must provide proof of gross Income for the entire Household. In the exceptional case when proof of income is unavailable, an Applicant must sign a declaration of Income statement. Proof of income/resources, forms for documentation, and type of documentation will be provided pursuant to Department guidelines.
- (e) Maximum Resource Amount. The total resource amount may not to exceed \$2000.00.

- (f) Insurance Policies: In those situations where the values of the available insurance policy/policies is less than \$2000.00 the family may be referred to the Funeral Home for the possible consideration of a private hardship burial funeral arrangement.
- (g) Decedent's Income. The Decedent's gross Income is always considered a resource unless the Decedent lived in the Applicant's Household. If the Decedent has a financial resource available that is below the \$2000.00 limit, the County will request, in writing, reimbursement up to the amount of the funds expended by the county to inter the remains. Verification of Resources/Assets will be made by Department pursuant to Department policies and procedures.

### 7. CONTRACTING FUNERAL HOME.

- 7.01. The County may contract with a funeral home to provide for the interment of paupers.
- 7.02. If another funeral home is holding the remains of a pauper, a Department representative and a family member, if available, must sign a form authorizing the contracting funeral home to remove the remains from the holding funeral home. A fee not to exceed \$50.00 will be paid to the holding general home by the contractor as a first —call.
- 7.03. The contracting funeral home may not charge a pauper's estate or family members for interment expenses or services in excess of those provided by it's contract with the county.
- 8. FUNERAL RESPONSIBLITIES/CONTRACT.
- 8.01 Contracted Funeral Home. All Faiths Funeral Services 8507 N. IH-35, Austin, Texas 78753.
- 8.02 Removal of the Body. The Funeral Home will provide for removal of the Decedent's body from place of death within Caldwell County.

8.03 Cremation Standard Fees. \$795.00 Basic Professional Services of funeral Director and Staff, obtaining legal documents and other paperwork necessary to complete the arrangements, removal of the deceased from place of death (within Caldwell County) \* Standard removal and transportation to the funeral home, transfer of body to crematory, standard cremation fee with alternative container provided by funeral home, return of cremation remains to funeral home. This service does not include: viewing; merchandise such as Casket, Urn; outer burial container, clothing, sundries, or any cash advance items.

- (a) \$50.00 Out of County Courier Fee.
- (b) \$37.50 Approximated mileage to Caldwell County locations.
- (c) Standard removal applies to decedents weighting 299 lbs or less, requiring only one staff person for transfer. Additional charges may be applied for weights of 300 lbs or more. Cremation will occur at the convenience of the Funeral Home and the crematory but within 7 (seven) days of the receipt of the necessary authorizations. Included in this pricing is the "standard" fee of Onion Creek Memorial Park and Crematory. Remains weighing in excess of 350 lbs may be rejected for cremation at Onion Creek at their discretion, and outside contractor would then be used and their charges would be in addition to those already mentioned.
- 8.04 Documentation. The Funeral Home will file all required documentation per appropriate County, State and Federal laws. Required Caldwell County documents include affidavits confirming the cremation and any changes to the service, an invoice for reimbursement and any other documentation required under this Policy or reasonably requested by the County.

## 9. LIMITATIONS.

- 9.01 Prior Approval. No approval of assistance prior to death will be provided.
- 9.02 Ground Burials. The Caldwell County Cremation Policies do not include ground burials as an option.

9.03 Death Certificate. Funeral Homes will not give the Applicant, family or any legal Next of Kin the option to request copies of death certificates through their business. Copies of the Death Certificate are available through the Texas Depart of Health or your local County Clerks office.

10. DEPARTMENT FILES AND FORMS; BILLING.

10.01. The County Judge may adopt forms as necessary or desirable to implement this policy.

10.02. Upon authorization the Department will obtain a purchase order number for the approved amount and forward this number to the contracting funeral home. A bill should be sent by the contracting funeral home directly to Department within 95 days.

10.03. The Department shall keep in its files:

- (a) the completed application form;
- (b) the denial form from the caseworker, if application was denied; and
- (c) other documents provided by family members or service
